Last week we hosted a group of 14 principals from Taupo who spent time with our Senior leaders and went to see learning in our Learning Communities. This group was led by Neill O'Reilly who has supported some of the professional learning in our school over the last couple of years. We feel really proud that the mahi of our staff, ākonga and whānau is being recognised in this way. We got some awesome feedback from the group about the caring, settled and learning focused environment of our school.

We were excited to hear that our new building which earlier this year won the

Auckland Architecture awards in the 'Education' section has been shortlisted as a finalist in the New Zealand awards! 2024 New Zealand Architecture Awards shortlist

The National Awards Programme's shortlist this year includes 48 shortlisted projects across 12 categories. Our school's building is one of two schools in the category, with the rest being universities.

Education, learning and achievement has been a hot topic in the media in the last year. There have been a number of changes earlier this year which have reinforced what we already had in place as a school - no cellphones in school, an hour a day of reading, writing and maths and a 'structured literacy' approach.

Some quite significant changes were announced more recently related to new curriculums and a 'new' approach to our mathematics in New Zealand - 'Structured Mathematics'. At this stage no one in schools is aware of exactly what this is.

Some pretty concerning data was reported about mathematics achievement in New Zealand. There have been questions raised by many school leaders about the validity of this data.

In our OPS strategic planning Maths had already been identified as a future area of focus for us in our strategic planning, with one of our leaders investigating research and current approaches being used in NZ and overseas. (At the end of 2023 79% of our OPS ākonga were working at or above the expected Maths curriculum level.) However, our plan was to complete the very intensive professional learning and implementation of Literacy first. I have concerns about the impact on staff workload and wellbeing in our school, (and all schools) focusing on more than one **major** area of professional learning at the same time.

We have had to take a bit of a 'wait and see' approach to recent announcements about changes in NZ education due to minimal detail being shared with the education sector. We will continue to watch with interest as more information is shared and work through the implications for our school, ākonga and whānau.

A new draft Mathematics Curriculum was shared last week. Unlike other curriculum changes, there has not been time or opportunity for all schools to feedback and start to get a feel for the changes coming. The new maths curriculum must be used from the start of 2025. The Ministry of Education has said there will be Teacher Only Days in Term 1 for teachers to learn about this, however at this stage we have no idea how many TODs and when they will be.

We are particularly interested to see the research supporting the new approach to Maths and what support will be available for school as far as professional learning facilitation and resources.

While there has been mention of literacy resource support in our 2025 operations budget, we need resources now as we are already implementing the approach - as required by the government. A team of our staff, with representatives from each Learning Community, are busy reviewing resources to support our Structured Literacy programmes at OPS. Our BOT approved \$13,000.00 of money we will fundraise this year to purchase resources to support literacy in our school. Unfortunately our very carefully planned day to day operating funding from the Ministry of Education is not sufficient for this spending. We look forward to sharing more with you in future newsletters about our purchases.

One of our major fundraisers this year will be our 2024 Colour Fun Run. You will have received an email about this recently. Your support for this will be highly appreciated - with money raised going towards Literacy Resources. There is <u>information about this in this newsletter</u>

Funds raised from last year's Fun Run, Beats By Bingo and grant applications are being used for a new sports and PE shed. A team is working on this with the plan to have it in and in use before the end of this year.

Whanau Connect - Feedback From Whānau

We are really pleased with the feedback we received from our recent Whānau Connect. Kaiako (teachers) have continued to meet with whānau who were not able to make it over the two nights we held this.

We appreciate the 175 responses we had to the quick survey after whānau connect meetings. Staff are now taking time to look through the comments made. We have shared more about the feedback we received later in this newsletter.

97% of those who responded chose either 4 or 5, with 82% choosing 5.

When we hold Whānau Connect and share written reports again in Term 3 2025 we will increase the time, based on feedback received.

One of our Learning Communities trialled the use of examples of writing and reading to show expectation level to help whānau understand curriculum levels. This is something we will continue to develop in our school.

We had one reply wanting to talk more formally about curriculum coverage and content. We were not able to follow this up because the feedback form had no name on it. As always, you are welcome to get in touch with a member of the Learning Community or a Leader for more discussion.

An Update From Our Board of Trustees

We're delighted to share that the Board is progressing well and our school is on track to meet goals set out in our 2024 annual implementation plan. We receive regular updates at each meeting from the school leaders and staff which ensures transparency and keeps us confident in our progress.

We have some news regarding the Board's composition. Our current Presiding Member (Chair) Brad Erceg, a valued member of our team, will be stepping down at the end of the year as he relocates to Sydney. We've made the pragmatic decision to keep his role vacant for now, as we manage our workload effectively. Our focus is on the upcoming Board elections in mid-2025. Wellbeing Term 3 Focus



<u>Last term</u> we shared that our Year 3-6 ākonga have recently completed an online wellbeing survey (<u>wellbeing@school</u>), which measures the 'school-wide climate and practices'.

After reviewing the results we decided to focus in Term 3 on one of the 11 areas of the survey which looks at the school climate of culture.

All of our Learning Communities will have the same focus each week, however the way the learning occurs may be different depending on the age of the ākonga. All of these focus areas link strongly to our OPS We CARE - Collaboration, Acting safely and responsibly, Respecting people, places and things, and Empathy.

Reinforcing Learning At Home

We know that learning has a more significant impact when whānau talk about and reinforce messages from school at home. We encourage you to talk to your child/ren about this learning each week. A really important part of this is helping your child/ren understand the week's focus and to have safe, useful strategies if something was to happen to them.

This week's focus: Week 5 -Pressure - responding to pressure from peers
Whakataukī- Haere taka mua, taka muri; kaua e whai- Be a leader, not a follower. Do not give in to peer pressure.

Next week's focus: Week 6 - Learning styles, respecting differences

Whakataukī- Tukua kia tu takitahi nga whetu o te rangi- Let each star in the sky shine it's own light.


Sharing From Learning Communities...

Week 3 - Honesty and Trust

The **Kea** `akonga enjoy storytime so we have integrated carefully selected rich picture books that allow discussion and reflections related to our wellbeing focus. In week 3 our wellbeing focus was honesty and trust. We read "Hippo Owns Up" and reflected upon some of the decisions Hippo made.

"You should tell the truth because otherwise other people might get in trouble."

• If you try to cover up it can make the problem worse, not better.



Week 4 - Inclusion - ways we can make sure everyone feels included

In week 4 **Kea Learning Community** read the story "Look what I've Got!" By Anthony Browne. We discussed the helpful and not helpful behaviours of the main characters Jeremy and Sam. We shared some ideas to reframe the story and make better decisions for Jeremy. We also learnt that Sam had used some helpful strategies when his friend was being unkind. We thought about some of the strategies we could use if someone was being kind to us.



- I think Jeremy was not being very nice to Sam. Maybe he doesn't know.
- Jeremy could say "would you like to ride a bike with me?"
- I could find a space and take some deep breaths if I am feeling angry.
- You could take turns.



In the **Piwakawaka Learning Community**, we can often say all the right things about We CARE, but it can be hard to actually do what we say. We talked really honestly about being inclusive and how that can sometimes be a challenge:

"Sometimes you'll be talking to a friend about something small and another friend comes along and wants to know what you were talking about. They might feel like it's a big deal, but it wasn't. It feels kind of pointless to say it all over again. But when you say 'oh it wasn't a big thing that we were talking about,' they can feel left out. It's all about how you say it so they don't feel sad."

"There's times when you might want to play a game with just 4 people, like 2 aside of football, and then a couple of your other friends want to join in later on, but it doesn't work because there's too many people. So then it's best just to stop playing or people get upset because they were left out of the game."

"We watched the story called 'My name is Sangoel.' It was about being inclusive because the other children weren't saying Sangoel's name correctly and it made him feel sad. But then he made a drawing on a t-shirt that taught everyone how to say his name. Everyone liked the idea and joined in. They made drawings to show how to say their names too. So everyone was being respectful of names and Sangoel felt included."

Week 5 - Pressure - responding to pressure from peers



This week **Kea** read about how Howard responded to his peers when playing games. We practised using good sportsmanship and positive interactions with our peers through playing *Snakes and Ladders*.



In the **Piwakawaka Learning Community**, we can often say all the right things about We CARE, but it can be hard to actually do what we say. We talked really honestly about peer pressure and different types (positive and negative) and how to manage these interactions. We also talked about peer pressure and how to get help especially if we are worried about being called a snitch.

One of our students suggested:

"You could tell a trusted adult what's happening but ask them to not say your name."

"Peer pressure is when someone is forcing you to do something you don't want to do. What you can do to avoid it is stay away from the person who does it OR just leave if you think someone is forcing you to do something you know is wrong or tell and adult"

"Peer pressure is when someone forces you or tells you to do something you know is not right, but that person tells you to do it anyway because it's "funny". A way to stop this is to tell the person you're not doing it and walk away." "Peer pressure is when someone encourages you to do something new Or asks you to do something you don't wanna do. When that happens you can say 'No!' in a nice way then walk away".

'Grandparents and Grandfriends' Afternoon Friday 8 November 2024 - 2.00pm-3.00pm

Grandparents and other older adults can be very important people in children's lives. Children feel a sense of pride and accomplishment when they know that people in their extended family and community are interested in their education and learning.

Before Covid and our building process, we held this special celebration and had a fantastic turn out. Children and adults both enjoyed this event and learned from each other. **Grandparents & Grandfriends Da**y recognizes the importance of our history, our community, and relationships across generations. This year we have timed it in the same week as our Book week. We are communicating this date very early to allow travel plans to be made well in advance.

This event is intended for children and their grandparents/step-grandparents or a special "grandfriend." Sorry – our space is limited, so parents and siblings are not able to attend this event.

We understand that not all children have grandparents, and that some grandparents will be unable to attend. We encourage these children to bring another special older adult – a family

friend, other relative like an aunt or uncle, or a neighbour. Some children are also happy to share their grandparent with a classmate.

It will be an informal event which will start in the hall with a welcome and some items from children. Children will then be able to take their Grandparent/ Grandfriend around the school, in their classroom as well as honour them by serving them a small afternoon tea.

All Out Showcase

We have one school organised group item. This will be similar to the performance at of new building opening last year - a series of 40 second dances from around 6 different cultural groups. If your children or whānau are interested in performing, please get in touch with the organising group and register your performance.

Who runs it?...and how do I get involved?

Does my child have to bring money?
