Careers and Higher Education Provider Access Policy Statement

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1. Aims

This policy statement aims to set out our school's arrangements for managing the access of education and training providers to students for the purpose of giving them information about their offer.

It sets out:

- Procedures in relation to requests for access
- The grounds for granting and refusing requests for access
- Details of premises or facilities to be provided to a person who is given access

2. Statutory requirements

Schools are required to ensure that there is an opportunity for a range of education and training providers to access students in years 8 to 13 for the purposes of informing them about approved technical education, qualifications or apprenticeships.

Schools must provide a minimum of 6 encounters with technical education or training providers to all pupils in years 8 to 13 (see more detail in section 2.1 below).

Schools must also have a policy statement that outlines the circumstances in which education and training providers will be given access to these students.

This is outlined in section 42B of the <u>Education Act 1997</u>, the <u>Skills and Post-16 Act 2022</u> and on page 43 of guidance from the Department for Education (DfE) on <u>careers guidance and access for education and training providers</u>.

This policy shows how our school complies with these requirements.

2.1 The 6 encounters schools must offer to all pupils in years 8 to 13

Schools must offer:

2 encounters for pupils during the 'first key phase' (year 8 or 9)

- All pupils must attend
- Encounters can take place any time during year 8, and between 1 September and 28 February during year 9

2 encounters for pupils during the 'second key phase' (year 10 or 11)

- All pupils must attend
- Encounters can take place any time during year 10, and between 1 September and 28 February during year 11

2 encounters for pupils during the 'third key phase' (year 12 or 13)

- Pupils can choose to attend
- Encounters can take place any time during year 12, and between 1 September and 28 February during year 13

These encounters must happen for a reasonable period of time during the standard school day. Schools can continue to provide complementary experiences, but encounters outside of school hours won't count towards these requirements.

Schools must ask each provider to provide the following information as a minimum:

- Information about the provider and the approved qualifications or apprenticeships they offer
- Information about what careers those qualifications and apprenticeships can lead to
- What learning or training with the provider is like
- Answers to any questions from pupils

The school will be arranging events which comply with the statutory requirements as detailed in the table at 4.2 below.

2.2 Meaningful provider encounters

Our school is committed to providing meaningful encounters to all pupils.

1 encounter is defined as 1 meeting/session between pupils and 1 provider.

Meaningful live online engagement is also an option at our school.

3. Student entitlement

All students in years 8 to 13 at The Judd school are entitled to:

- Find out about technical education qualifications and apprenticeship opportunities, as part of our careers programme which provides information on the full range of education and training options available at each transition point
- Hear from a range of local providers about the opportunities they offer, including technical education and apprenticeships, e.g. through activities and events such as options events, assemblies and taster events
- Understand how to make applications for the full range of academic and technical courses

4. Management of provider access requests

4.3 Granting and refusing access

Access will be granted when the opportunities are considered of benefit to the students and appropriate and timely to the students' development. To arrange access contact our Careers and Higher Education Advisers, Catherine Swindin or Linda Yue.

4.4 Safeguarding

Our safeguarding/child protection policy outlines the school's procedure for checking the identity and suitability of visitors.

Education and training providers will be expected to adhere to this policy.

4.5 Premises and facilities

The school will make the main hall, classrooms or private meeting rooms available for discussions between the provider and students, as appropriate to the activity. The school will also make available AV and other specialist equipment to support provider presentations. Virtual access is also easily available preferably using Google Meet as a platform for these presentations and meetings. Other

platforms will be considered. This will all be discussed and agreed in advance of the visit/presentation with the Careers and Higher Education Adviser.

5. Previous providers

Previously we have invited 2 providers of information on technical pathways from the local area to speak to our pupils.

6. Pupil destinations

The most recent statistics we have show that 98% of our year 11 pupils stayed in education, 95% chose Sixth Forms, 2% moved to Further Education Providers and 1% chose another education provider. Last year, 223 year 13 pupils went on to university, 1 in the local area.
