Welcome and call for agenda items Happy Constitution Day!</p> <p>Book recommendation: “The Cult of the Constitution” by Mary Anne Franks “Lost amid the clamor of academic and judicial battles over how to interpret the Constitution is its effect on the most vulnerable....Mary Anne Franks finds that effect by exploring the constitutional fundamentalism underlying much of constitutional law.” -- <i>Harvard Law Review</i></p>

<p>III. Announcements and/or updates on intellectual freedom issues Open forum. All are invited to share.</p> <p>a. Tamara has finished this year’s annual report on challenges in Oregon. It was sent out on Libs-OR and the IF-News liststervs in the last week of August. Likely an undercount. IFC might consider a survey about reporting hesitancy.</p> <p>b. The ALA’s Intellectual Freedom Round Table has announced that, beginning in 2022, the Eli M. Oboler Memorial Award will be given annually. The award will now honor journal articles in even-numbered years (2022, 2024...) and books in odd-numbered years (2023, 2025...). The Oboler committee is now seeking nominations for the 2022 journal article award.</p> <p>The Oboler award honors a literary work or series of works in the area of intellectual freedom. This can include matters of ethical, political, or social concerns related to intellectual freedom. The article may be stand-alone or a series of thematically connected articles published on the local, state, or national level in English or English translation.</p> <p>The articles submitted for the 2022 award should be dated either 2020 or 2021. Submission deadline is December 1. The award is \$500 and a certificate and is presented at the ALA Annual Conference each year.</p> <p>The award was named for Eli M. Oboler, the extensively published Idaho State University librarian known as a “champion of intellectual freedom who demanded the dismantling of all barriers to freedom of expression.” The award was given first at the 1986 Annual Conference in New York.</p>	<p>Perry - create survey</p>

<p>IV. Recent challenges in Oregon</p> <p>Open forum report.</p> <p>a. Oakland Public Library - Pride flag display controversy. On 6/11/21, the ALA OIF shared that they had a report of a written challenge to Pride flags up at OPL. OPL staff Rachael Grindberg also shared the incident on Libs-OR and received several excellent responses, including from Emily on behalf of OLA IFC. The City Manager backed off of an initial proposal to require only state and federal flags to be displayed.</p> <p>b. Chetco/Curry Public Library - On 9/11/21, the IFC was notified of a possible burgeoning "Anti CRT" protest movement about the library's sponsorship of Jason Reynolds for an upcoming author virtual event. Perry replied on behalf of IFC with some public relations ideas on how the library could position itself for a media controversy and be supportive of staff. CPL Director Jeremy Skinner reported on 9/14/21 that the complaints appeared to be from a small out-of-area group. No further complaints had been submitted but library staff were prepared with talking-points.</p> <p>c. Newberg School Board bans Pride flag and Black Lives Matter (not specifically libraries, but First Amendment related issue)</p> <p>In August, Newberg School Board had voted 4-3 to ban "political symbols" including Black Lives Matter and Pride flags. The ban includes symbols on clothing but makes an exception for the American and Oregon state flags.</p> <p>9/14/21 Update:</p> <p>"Leaders of the Oregon School Boards Association recently admonished school board members across the state to uphold their oaths of office and follow all laws, even those they disagree with.</p> <p>They conveyed that message in an open letter - signed by the association's executive director, president and the head of its board members of color caucus - that took clear aim at the notable number of school board members who have directed school employees to defy mask mandates intended to keep children safe from COVID-19. It also called out, without naming them, the four members of the Newberg School Board who directed their superintendent to ban displays of Pride and Black Lives Matter symbols in Newberg schools.</p> <p>...Friday's letter left no room to interpret it as anything but an assertion that all board members are obliged legally and morally to uphold mask mandates and other COVID-19 safety measures, as well as the First Amendment.</p> <p>"We are sworn to follow the law - whether we like that law or not," the trio of association leaders wrote. "Whether the issue involves court-sanctioned health safeguards during a deadly pandemic or constitutionally protected forms of speech, our oaths bind us. We must do better, even in the face of divided and sometimes hostile communities."</p>

Provides historical context on development of IF policy over decades.</p> <p>Banned Books Week 2021 events across country.
