This is an online course.

You will be expected to use the internet on an almost daily basis. This course has a Moodle website (http://classes.lanecc.edu) and the MindTap website, both of which are REQUIRED and will be used extensively during the term. You will use an internet-capable device to:

- Complete textbook section reviews, primary source document, map, and weekly chapter quizzes
- Read, listen, and view historical materials from a variety of websites
- Send/Receive Moodle messages to/from the instructor

Course Objectives

World History is the story of peoples on a global stage. This course will look at the origin and diffusion of civilizations in the ancient world including Asia, Africa, Middle East and Mediterranean, Europe and the Americas. Themes and topics will include world religions, early empires, communication, interaction and exchange. These survey courses will use the global approach, which focuses on the big picture and looks at the convergence of peoples across the earth's surface into an integrated world system begun in early times and intensified after the rise of capitalism in the early modern era. All of the courses will consider the connections of select topics and concepts to the shaping of our present world.

- 1. Apply analytical skills to social phenomena in order to understand human behavior. Identify and consider important concepts, movements, and themes to understand peoples of ancient and medieval societies from 5000 BCE to late Medieval times
- 2. Apply knowledge and experience to foster personal growth and better appreciate the diverse social world in which we live. Analyze how diverse peoples in the Ancient Near East, Africa, Asia, the Mediterranean, Europe, and the Americas created religious systems, social structures and political institutions. Note the variety of interactions between various groups and individuals on the global stage and how they dealt with change and issues common to all
- 3. Understand the role of individuals and institutions within the context of society. It will demonstrate when and where the concept of the individual came about and who first looked at how the individual functioned within a society. Look at function of institutions in society, how they are unique or not, and how they influence behavior of individuals or are used by individuals. Ask the question of why individualism was not a concept for many in ancient societies, how that changed, and why this is even an outcome for a Social Science class
- 4. Assess different theories and concepts, and understand the distinctions between empirical and other methods of inquiry. Demonstrate a functional appreciation of various interpretations of history and how they came to be. Identify different schools of thought and the many "lenses" used to look back and study history
- 5. Utilize appropriate information literacy skills in written and oral communication. Students evaluate and use relevant evidence to illustrate and support questions and perspectives about the past as well as conclusions they draw from them
- 6. Understand the diversity of human experience and thought, individually and collectively. Identify and consider the universals and the diverseness in human experience over time. Demonstrate knowledge of geographical

	 time and place and how that changes. Be familiar with processes by which individuals and peoples change over time 7. Apply knowledge and skills to contemporary problems and issues. Identify correlations/analogies between the past and our own time. Consider issues common to all eras and human experience
Procedures	This online course format will require your participation throughout the week. You will create a textbook publisher account using your @my.lanecc.edu email address in order to access the MindTap website where you will complete much of your coursework. You must keep to the schedule of readings, chapter exercises, weekly quizzes, and exams.
Instructor Contact	I am accessible via email, phone/voicemail, Zoom online meetings, or in person at scheduled appointments; however, I urge you to use Moodle messaging to contact me. Emails often get "lost" in LCC's email spam filter, while Moodle messages always reach me, and I check for messages multiple times each day, weekends included. Moodle also keeps a clear history and transcription of all of our student-instructor communications, which is important in an online class. By default, Moodle will forward Moodle messages and class "reminder" announcements to your email address, and I will use the Announcement Forum in Moodle to contact students on a regular basis throughout the term. Lane requires you to use your "@my.lanecc.edu" Google-based email address, so you should DEFINITELY check that account often throughout each week of the term.
VERY IMPORTANT INFORMATION	No late work is accepted in this course. The course calendar contains EVERY SINGLE ASSIGNMENT, QUIZ, AND EXAM DEADLINE for the entire term, so mark your calendars now. You have various online exercises and tests to complete each week during the term. Each is due by the deadline listed on the class calendar linked in Moodle. You will take your exams on one of two assigned days AND times. If you miss either of those assigned days and times, you MUST take the makeup exam
	by traveling to campus to complete the exam in person, in the ITS Testing Lab in CEN311. No notes or study aides of any kind can be used in the lab, where you will be required to provide an official photo I.D. to complete the test. See the course calendar for exam days and times.
Evaluation <i>MindTap Online</i>	Together, these chapter exercises and quizzes will constitute 50% of your course grade. Although the number of points will differ from week to week, each chapter's worth will be evenly weighted at 5% of your overall class grade. Therefore, 5% x 10 chapters = 50% of your grade.
	Chapter Exercises provide a check of your textbook reading comprehension. <i>In MindTap, these exercises are called View It: Image Analysis, Learn It, Practice It, and Apply It, which includes a chapter test.</i> You will be given just one attempt on each of the chapter section exercises, so be sure you have read and studied the materials and are prepared in advance. Although each exercise has no time limit, there is a deadline by which all chapter exercises must be completed. See the course calendar.
	Assigned video links will require students to watch and listen to the materials online.

Evaluation Exams	You will take two non-comprehensive Exams , each constituting 25% of your final grade in the class. Even though you will take the exams at home, the exams are timed (90 minutes) and consist of 100 objective type (multiple choice and true/false) questions. You should prepare for the exams by organizing your notes or study aides BEFORE you attempt the exam.
