Hi Brooks! This was SO good!! The cinematography was stunning; everything was so crisp. Your shots were varied and well-executed, and seamless. And I really liked the music: both in the piece and at the end. It definitely added! I have two tiny edits: 1) the transition near the beginning (when Dahlia is looking at the letter in the car at night, then it swipes upwards to where she's reading the letter at the desk) felt almost slapstick-like and inconsistent with the rest of the film, and it was the only one that pulled me out of the story. 2) I would have liked to have had the text of the letter and of the wedding announcement stay on screen for a little longer; I was rushing to read them both and ended up going back and pausing; it was a bit stressful. Overall: I was engaged the whole way through the film. WHAT HAPPENS at the end?? We'll never know, I guess. Do you have an answer to the question "Is she really on to something, or has she just been listening to too many true crime podcasts?" I couldn't discern it, if so. Maybe you don't want to have one, which is perfectly good too. Great job!!

This was awesome, Brooks! The story, production value, music, all the little details—seriously impressive stuff. I found myself 100% invested in Dahlia's sleuthing, and I loved how small, seemingly mundane physical objects (the package for Stanley, the envelope, the tire, the mailbox) conveyed far more sinister goings on. The aesthetic of the snowy, rural community was also perfect for the premise (very much gave me Bruce Springsteen "Nebraska" vibes, which incidentally also features a song about a murderer). I'm curious where you actually filmed it!
