



COLLECTIVE WORSHIP POLICY

Policy on Collective Worship

1 Aims and objectives

- 1.1 The aims and objectives of collective worship are:
 - to enable children to consider spiritual and moral issues
 - to enable children to explore their own beliefs in light of other religions
 - to encourage participation and response;
 - to develop in children a sense of community spirit and British values
 - to promote a common ethos, with shared values, and to reinforce positive attitudes;
 - to teach children how to worship and celebrate religious observances.

2 Success Criteria

- Children are able to discuss and debate issues of faith and belief
- Children are able to discuss spiritual and moral issues
- Children understand British values in a modern society.

3 Collective worship

- 3.1 In line with the 1988 Education Reform Act, which states that collective worship should be 'wholly or mainly of a broadly Christian character', we normally base our assemblies on the teachings of Christ and the traditions of the Christian Church. However, we conduct our assemblies in a manner that is sensitive to the faiths and beliefs of all members of the school.
- 3.2 While most acts of worship in our school are Christian, we also hold assemblies that reflect the traditions of other religions that are represented in the school and the wider community. These include celebrating Diwali, Eid, Hanukkah and Chinese New Year.
- 3.3 Our assembly themes are carefully planned across the religious calendar. They also celebrate and acknowledge fundamental British values.

4 Organisation of collective worship

- 4.1 We hold 2 whole school assemblies each week.
- 4.2 We conduct assemblies in a dignified and respectful way. We tell children that assembly time is a period of calm reflection. We regard it as a special time, and expect children to behave in an appropriate way. We ask them to be quiet and thoughtful, to listen carefully to the teachings, and to participate fully in prayer and hymns.
- 4.3 The assemblies are normally conducted by the headteacher/deputy head or other members of staff, but are sometimes led by local clergy or other representatives of local religious groups.
- 4.4 We take the themes of our assemblies from the traditions of the Christian faith. We observe the festivals and mark the events of the Christian calendar and recognise and celebrate other faiths represented in our school community. Sometimes the themes of our assemblies are related to topics that we teach as part of the school curriculum, national observances and special themes. We plan our assemblies well in advance of the day they take place.
- 4.5 Our assemblies reflect the achievements and learning of the children. We encourage the children to participate in the assemblies by showing their work to the other children, and by raising issues that they have

discussed in their classes. Assemblies provide an opportunity to reward children for their achievements both in and out of school. They also play an important part in promoting the ethos of the school, which is that all children are valued, and all achievements are recognised. Each half term parents are invited in to celebrate their child's achievements.

- 4.6 Parents are also invited into school to watch class assemblies and special events such as the leaver's assembly. We encourage parental attendance as this promotes community spirit, and shows the school and the homes working together in support of the children's achievements.
- 4.7 Governors' attendance at our assemblies is always welcome.

5 Right of withdrawal

- 5.1 We expect all children to attend assembly. However, any parent can request permission for their child to be excused from religious worship, and the school will make alternative arrangements for the supervision of the child during that part of the assembly. Parents do not have to explain or give reasons for their request. This right of withdrawal complies with the 1944 Education Act, and was restated in the 1988 Education Reform Act.
- 5.2 The headteacher keeps a record of all children who have been withdrawn from collective worship.

6 Monitoring and review

6.2 This policy will be reviewed annually.
