## Prepare to discuss....

- 1. Make a copy of this Google Doc.
- 2. Change title to include date and group names.
- 3. Share new doc with all group members and Jessica.
- 4. Cut and paste your pre-writes into the doc.

### Answer the essential questions of the literature circle:

- What can we learn from this story about the human quest for happiness and meaning?
- What does it mean to live deliberately? What does it mean to be self-reliant? (Relate to book!)
- How can the path toward meaning be shaped by BOTH the natural world AND by our civilization? (Relate to book!)

#### Relate Chris's experience to our project:

- How might Chris answer the questions: What is the purpose of human life?
  What is my place in the world?
- How does Jon Krakauer use Chris McCandless' story to answer the question "What is the purpose of human life"?
- How did Chris's intertextual experience shaped his personal life's philosophy?
- Whose story is this really?

After your lit circle meeting, work individually on your reflection/synthesis assignment:

#### **Self Reflection**

- 1. How well did you participate in the literature circle experience? Were you prepared each time? Did you participate fruitfully? How did the analytical process go for your group?
- 2) What did you get out of this experience? Discuss the importance of the discussion groups in helping to form your interpretations of this novel. Be specific.

**Synthesis Paragraphs:** Make an interpretive claim about *Into the Wild*. Think about how your reading of the novel answers 1 or more of the essential questions. Write 2-3 robust TEA paragraphs, supporting your claim with evidence from the text. Connect your evidence explicitly to the claims you are making (#analysis). **Challenge**: Make an intertextual claim that connects *Into the Wild* with another text you have read in or out of class.
