As emerging readers, kindergarten students are beginning to grasp essential foundational literacy skills, which are crucial for becoming proficient readers and writers. Literacy activities for emerging readers might include singing songs, playing rhyming games, reading aloud, and practicing letter sounds, handwriting, and building words.

Our literacy program can be divided into two main categories: **Word Recognition** and **Language Comprehension**
