In June 2024, Denisse was selected as a Hispanics in Philanthropy Lideres Fellow. Denisse serves as the co-Board Chair for Shout Mouse Press, an organization that supports youth in the D.C., Maryland, and Virginia (DMV) area dedicated to centering and amplifying the voices of marginalized youth through writing workshops, book publication, and public speaking opportunities. Additionally, he partnered with the mayor, superintendent of schools and community stakeholders from his hometown of Poughkeepsie, New York, to launch the Poughkeepsie Children's Cabinet, a collective impact organization that convenes leaders across sectors to develop a citywide cradle-to-career agenda for children, youth, and families. Rob is also a co-founder of the Poughkeepsie Service Accelerator (PSA), a place-based service year collaborative that aims to attract and retain local talent to pursue social impact careers in the Mid-Hudson Valley region of New York State.

In January 2024, Rob was selected as a Presidential Leadership Scholar. Rob is a member of the Board of Directors of the Children's Funding Project, a former World Economic Forum Global Shaper, and a former Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation Millennium Scholar. In January 2025, Rob joined the StriveTogether Board of Directors. He holds a B.A. from Harvard College, an Ed.M in Education Policy and Management from the Harvard Graduate School of

NAZ is made up of more than 30 partner nonprofits and schools, collaborating and working toward a single goal — to support and prepare low-income North Minneapolis children of color to succeed in school, college, career, and life. NAZ continues to scale up to serve more students and families while turning the social service model on its head and leading the creation of a college-bound culture across the community. Sondra is a 29-year resident of North Minneapolis and a national leader committed to comprehensive place-based solutions and anti-racist, results-based accountability. She and her team work tirelessly to ensure the integration of effective prenatal-to-professional solutions across the NAZ Collaborative, to scale and sustain results across North Minneapolis, and to achieve the systems and policy changes needed for families and scholars to truly share in the prosperity of the Twin Cities Region. Under her leadership, NAZ was named a federal Promise Neighborhood, achieved membership status in the StriveTogether Network, and has become a nationally recognized model for comprehensive place-based solutions for community transformation and systems change. Sondra co-founded the Education Partnership Coalition

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and serves on the Minneapolis Federal Reserve's Inclusion Advisory Board, the Leadership Team of Generation Next, and the Great MN Schools Board of Directors.

Reverend Vanessa Oliver Ward is the President of the Omega Community Development Corporation (Omega CDC) and Pastor Emerita of the Omega Baptist Church. As President of the Omega CDC, she oversees the organization's mission of breaking the cycle of

intergenerational poverty by catalyzing change in Northwest Dayton. Under her leadership, the Omega CDC served as co-developer with MVAH, nka Pivotal, in the construction of an 81-unit, \$13M affordable senior housing facility, Omega Senior Lofts, and as developer of the \$11M Hope Center for Families, which focuses on 2-generational whole family wellness. In addition to Omega CDC, other partners of the Hope Center include Dayton Children's pediatric clinic, Sinclair Community College and Mini University, a daycare center. In 2023, Omega CDC was awarded a \$28.7M Promise Neighborhood Grant from the U.S. Department of Education; the first in the State of Ohio. The Hope Zone Promise Neighborhood serves as a major accelerator to the work Omega CDC has led, driving improved educational and social outcomes specifically for children and families in Northwest Dayton, where the need for investment is great. Omega CDC serves as the backbone convener with over 40 partner agencies delivering services to over 5,200 children.

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As the Emma Bloomberg Senior Lecturer in Public Policy and Management at Harvard Kennedy School, Dr. de Jong's research and teaching focus on the challenges of making the public sector more effective, efficient, equitable, and responsive to social needs. A specialist in experiential learning, Jorrit has taught strategic management and public problem-solving in degree and executive education programs at HKS and around the world.

for its animation), he created the National Magazine Award-nominated series Op-Video, and then co-founded Vox Video in 2014. Over the next 8 years, he built their award-winning YouTube channel and created Emmy-nominated streaming series like Level Playing Field on HBO, and Explained on Netflix, the most prolific docuseries on Netflix with 70 episodes.



James Watson

Producer, The Creator Journalism Project; Co-Founder, Poughkeepsie Children's Cabinet

James Watson is an Emmy Award-winning journalist with more than a decade of experience helping some of the world's largest media companies launch new ventures on television and in print, including CBS News, NBC Olympics and The New York Times. James was a

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member of the production team behind "60 Minutes Sports," a spinoff of the legendary Sunday evening newsmagazine produced by CBS News. While at CBS News, he was involved in the production of nearly 20 stories for "60 Minutes Sports" and "60 Minutes." Prior to joining CBS, James covered three Olympic Games for NBC. He was also a member of the founding editorial team of Play: The New York Times Sports Magazine, where he worked with leading writers such as David Foster Wallace.

Nearly a decade ago, James returned to his hometown of Poughkeepsie, NY. In 2019, James partnered with Poughkeepsie's Mayor, Superintendent of Schools and community stakeholders to co-found the Poughkeepsie Children's Cabinet, a cradle-to-career place-based partnership nonprofit that convenes cross-sector leaders and community members to develop a citywide agenda for children, youth and families. James was also a co-founder of Lead for Poughkeepsie, an AmeriCorps-sponsored public service fellowship program created to attract and retain homegrown talent to pursue social impact careers.

James holds a B.A. from Boston College. He is also a graduate of the Columbia Publishing Course at the Columbia University Graduate School of Journalism. He is a two-time Emmy Award winner and four-time nominee.



Geoffrey Canada

Founder and President, Harlem Children's Zone; Founder, William Julius Wilson Institute, Harlem Children's Zone

Geoffrey Canada is renowned around the world for his pioneering work helping children and families, and as a thought leader and passionate advocate for education reform across the country.

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Canada created the Harlem Children's Zone, a birth-through-college network of programs that today serves more than 13,000 low-income students and families in a 97-block area of Central Harlem in New York City.

The unprecedented success of the Harlem Children's Zone has attracted the attention of the media and leaders around the world. In 2011, Canada was named one of the world's most influential people by Time magazine and as one of the 50 greatest leaders by Fortune magazine in 2014. President Barack Obama created the Promise Neighborhoods Initiative to replicate the Harlem Children's Zone model across the country,

After 30 years with the organization, Canada stepped down in 2014 as Chief Executive Officer of the Harlem Children's Zone but continues to serve as President.

In June 2020, Canada founded the William Julius Wilson Institute (WJW), which serves as the national platform to help communities impacted by poverty across the country design and implement their own place-based programs. Currently, we are implementing an innovative initiative focused on narrowing the racial wealth gap and building economic mobility in the Black community.



Mayor Monroe Nichols City of Tulsa, Oklahoma

Mayor Monroe Nichols was sworn in as the 41st Mayor of Tulsa on December 2, 2024, serving as Tulsa's first African American mayor. Nichols first called Tulsa home when he began attending the University of Tulsa, where he received a Bachelor's degree in Political Science and Economics. Shortly after, he received a Master's degree in Public Administration from the University of Oklahoma. Throughout

his career in government, private business, higher education, and the nonprofit sector, Nichols has focused on creating better outcomes for residents. Before serving as mayor, Nichols represented House District 72 in the Oklahoma House of Representatives and served

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as Chair of the Oklahoma Legislative Black Caucus. Mayor Nichols is focused on several key areas that he plans to prioritize over the next four years, including ending homelessness, improving student outcomes, expanding economic opportunity, making Tulsa the safest big city in America, increasing affordable housing and improving relations and co-governance with tribal governments.



Paul Reville

Francis Keppel Professor of Practice of Educational Policy and Administration; Founder and Faculty Director, EdRedesign, Harvard Graduate School of Education

Professor Paul Reville returned to the Harvard Graduate School of Education as the Francis Keppel Professor of Practice of Educational

Policy and Administration in 2013, having just completed nearly five years of service as the secretary of education for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. As Governor Deval Patrick's top education advisor, Reville established the Executive Office of Education and had oversight of higher education, K-12, and early education in the nation's leading student achievement state. He served in the Governor's Cabinet and played a leading education reform role on matters ranging from the Achievement Gap Act of 2010 and Common Core State Standards to the Commonwealth's highly successful Race to the Top proposal.

Prior to joining the Patrick Administration, Reville chaired the Massachusetts State Board of Education, founded the Rennie Center for Education Research and Policy, co-founded the Massachusetts Business Alliance for Education (MBAE), chaired the Massachusetts Reform Review Commission and the Massachusetts Commission on Time and Learning, and served as Executive Director of the Pew Forum on Standards-Based Reform, a national think tank which convened the U.S.'s leading researchers, practitioners, and policymakers to set the national standards agenda. Reville played a central role in MBAE's development of and advocacy for Massachusetts' historic Education Reform Act of 1993. Reville has been a

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member of the HGSE faculty since 1997 and has served as Director of the Education Policy and Management Program.

Reville is a board member and adviser to a host of organizations, and a frequent writer and speaker on education reform and policy issues. He edited the book entitled, A Decade of Urban School Reform: Persistence and Progress in the Boston Public Schools. He holds five honorary doctorate degrees.



Bill Crim Chief Executive Officer, United Way of Salt Lake

Bill Crim serves as President and CEO of United Way of Salt Lake (UWSL) and Utah's Promise. He joined UWSL in 2004 to help lead its transformation to an organization focused on creating economic opportunity through collaborative, aligned action – and became CEO in 2015. Bill was instrumental in building UWSL's public policy influence and helped develop Promise Partnership Utah, the nationally recognized partnership infrastructure for improving

cradle-to-career education outcomes. In 2013, Bill helped facilitate the country's first "pay for success" transaction for early childhood education, helping make high-quality preschool available to thousands of additional low-income children in Utah. Bill is a frequent speaker on the topics of "collective impact," outcomes financing, and the power of data and shared accountability for results to transform communities. He is a lifelong resident of Utah and a graduate of the University of Utah.

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Libby Schaaf

50th Mayor, City of Oakland, CA (2015-2023); By All Means Senior Fellow, EdRedesign, Harvard Graduate School of Education

Libby Schaaf served as the 50th Mayor of Oakland from 2015 to 2022, where she set records in reducing gun violence, fixing infrastructure, and increasing housing. She founded The Oakland Promise, one of the nation's most comprehensive cradle-to-career initiatives, to

dramatically increase college access and economic mobility for Oakland's youth. Schaaf also launched the Oakland Fund for Public Innovation and the Oakland Thrives Leadership Council, which continue to drive cross-sector solutions for the city.

A champion of economic security, she was a founding Mayor and inaugural Fellow at Mayors for a Guaranteed Income. She now teaches public-private partnerships and public finance at UC Berkeley's Goldman School of Public Policy, and she serves as a Senior Fellow with the EdRedesign Lab at the Harvard Graduate School of Education. Recognized for her courageous stands, Schaaf was named to the Politico 50 list of the most influential people in American politics.



Mayor Cherie Wood South Salt Lake City, Utah

Mayor Cherie Wood is a trailblazing leader and lifelong resident of South Salt Lake, where she became the city's first female mayor in 2010. With deep roots in her community and a passion for equity, she launched Promise South Salt Lake, a groundbreaking initiative providing free youth, adult, and family programs that empower over 2,000 individuals annually. Mayor Wood's philosophy—"What I wish for my family, I wish for everyone in my community"—guides her

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relentless commitment to education, safety, health, and prosperity. In the wake of tragedy, she led the creation of the Hser Ner Moo Community Center, catalyzing a movement of resilience and opportunity. Under her leadership, South Salt Lake has become a national model for community development, earning honors like United Way's "Changemaker" and the 2025 Pioneers of Progress Award. Mayor Wood's vision has redefined civic service—placing people at the center of policy, partnership, and progress.

Jennifer Blatz President & CEO, StriveTogether

Jennifer Blatz is the president and CEO of StriveTogether, a national nonprofit working in about 70 communities across the United States to put millions more young people on a path to economic mobility.

Jennifer is a nationally recognized leader and expert in building place-based partnerships to improve outcomes for children, cradle to career. For more than two decades, she has designed, developed and implemented strategies that drive large-scale community improvement through partnership with local leaders and organizations.

At StriveTogether, Jennifer was instrumental in launching the national Cradle to Career Network and creating the StriveTogether Theory of Action™. She led the development of the organization's current strategic plan with a bold vision: to put 4 million more young people on a path to economic mobility by 2030. Under Jennifer's leadership, StriveTogether was named a global Social Innovator of the Year by the Schwab Foundation for Social Entrepreneurship, an honor she accepted at the 2024 World Economic Forum.

Before leading StriveTogether, Jennifer was a founding member of StrivePartnership, serving Cincinnati and Northern Kentucky. Through her contributions, StrivePartnership became one of the most notable collective impact initiatives in the country. Jennifer began her career in the education sector. As executive director of Ohio College Access Network, she led a network

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of community-based programs focused on improving access to and attainment of postsecondary education.

Jennifer's work has been published in the Stanford Social Innovation Review, Social Innovations Journal, The Hechinger Report and The 74, among others. She serves on the boards of Partners for Rural Impact and Raising A Reader, as a LEAP Ambassador and as a member of the Cincinnati Business Courier Leadership Trust.

Jennifer has been named a YWCA of Greater Cincinnati Rising Star and a Cincinnati Business Courier Forty Under 40. She is a graduate of United Way of Greater Cincinnati's Volunteer Leadership Development Program, the Billions Institute Skid Row School for Large-Scale Change and the Cincinnati Chamber of Commerce Women Excel Leadership Program.

President & CEO, Partners for Rural Impact; By All Means Senior Fellow, EdRedesign, Harvard Graduate School of Education

Dreama Gentry unabashedly works to ensure rural children, families and places are seen, heard, and invested in. She is the founder and CEO of Partners for Rural Impact (PRI), a national intermediary that works to ensure the 14 million children and youth living in rural

America are on a path to upward mobility.

A graduate of Berea College and the University of Kentucky College of Law, Dreama serves on the Economic Mobility Alliance Steering Committee and the National Comprehensive Center Advisory Board.

Cecilia Gutierrez
