2026 CPTSC Diversity Scholarship Winners

The CPTSC Executive Committee is pleased to announce this year's Diversity Scholarship Award winners: Gideon Kwashie Kwawukumey and Kalpana Shrestha. This recognition honors their dedication, excellence, and commitment to diversity within the field of technical and scientific communication.



Gideon Kwashie Kwawukumey (he/his) is a broadcast journalist and doctoral candidate of Rhetoric, Writing, and Technical Communication at Virginia Tech. His research examines transnational environmental technical communication, sonic technical communication, multimodal rhetoric, linguistic justice in Technical Communication. His work seeks to expand knowledge production in Technical Communication, Rhetoric, and Writing to include multi-marginalized perspectives. Gideon has received multiple honours including ATTW Amplification Award, CCCC Scholars for the Dream Award, and RSA Gerard Hauser Award.



Kalpana Shrestha (she/her) is a Ph.D. student in Rhetoric, Writing, and Professional Communication at East Carolina University. Her research examines how the design of communication tools and systems shapes access, decision-making, and engagement across academic, technical, and clinical settings. Drawing on justice-oriented and participatory approaches, her work specifically explores how clinical instruments, digital platforms, and AI-supported writing technologies can be designed to foster inclusive, culturally responsive, and accessible communication practices that better support multilingual and historically

marginalized communities. Her work has been recognized with the CCCC Scholars for the Dream Travel Award and the CFSHRC Nan Johnson Travel Award.

2026 Distinguished Service Award



Sean D. Williams, PhD, is Professor of User Experience in the College of Integrative Sciences and Arts at Arizona State University. Across three decades, his career in technical and professional communication has brought together teaching, scholarship, mentorship, program building, and service to the profession.

Williams has helped create and lead academic programs at three universities. At Clemson University, he co-chaired the committee that launched the PhD in Rhetorics, Communication, and Information Design and later served as Associate Dean of the Graduate School and Chair of the Department of English. He subsequently became founding Chair of the Department of Technical Communication and Information Design at the University of Colorado-Colorado Springs and, most recently, was founding Director of ASU's School of Applied Professional Studies. At ASU, he was responsible for the Technical Writing and Communication program, including the comprehensive redesign of the program's undergraduate and graduate curricula, and he helped to launch ASU's User Experience program.

Service to the technical communication community has been a consistent thread throughout his work. Williams served as Vice President of the Council of Programs in Technical and Scientific Communication from 2019–2023 and has contributed to the profession through external program reviews, editorial leadership, and service as a reviewer for universities and funding agencies. His recent scholarship on technical communication program administration—including the co-edited

collection *Where We Start: A Practical Guide to Technical Communication Program Administration*—extends that commitment by sharing practical knowledge with colleagues responsible for building and sustaining programs.

His scholarship has also explored information and user experience design, entrepreneurship and social media, and environmental communication, including the edited collection *Technical Communication for Environmental Action*. He has chaired or served on more than 80 graduate committees and received the Society for Technical Communication's Jay R. Gould Award for Excellence in Teaching Technical Communication.
