ABSTRACT

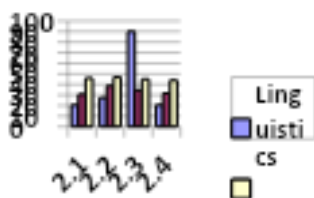
