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"Japan Studies 2: Modern Japanese Literature"

Purpose:

The aim of this course is to introduce students to major works and themes in modern Japanese literature in English translation. In the class, we read six short stories by Japanese authors from the Meiji Era (1868 – 1912) to contemporary times including Higuchi Ichiyō 樋口一葉, Akutagawa Ryūnosuke 芥川龍之介, and Murakami Haruki 村上春樹. Some of the themes we examine include gender, class, war, and globalization.

Course objectives:

- Deepen our knowledge of Japanese literature including key works, subjects, and themes
- · Critically analyze the elements of literary works including point of view, plot, and themes.
- Improve our academic-English ability by reading, writing, and discussing works of literature in English
- Learn to write about literature including how to construct arguments, use evidence from the text, and cite sources

Method of instruction

In this course, we read six short stories by Japanese authors in English translation. We spend approximately two weeks (two class periods) reading and discussing each story. Along with the reading, students will complete a study guide made by the instructor titled <u>Elements of a Story</u>. The study guide contains nine main points to investigate including narrative voice, plot, and themes. Students should type their answers to this study guide on the computer and bring the completed assignment to the next class.

In class, students will use Elements of a Story to discuss the story in groups. Students will also answer and discuss comprehension questions about the text to further their understanding of key themes and concepts. In addition, the instructor will guide students on how to write about literature. Toward this end, we will investigate examples of critical essays about literature, as well as learn how to construct arguments and support them with evidence from the text, and how to properly cite sources.

Some weeks, students will be asked to write their opinions on themes from the text in short written essays. Students should complete these by the following week and use them to discuss their opinions in class group-work. Midway through the semester there will be a quiz to measure students' knowledge and comprehension of the first three stories we read in class. Students are

also asked to submit a five-page written report about one of the class readings by the end of the semester. The report should demonstrate students' grasp of the historical context, content, and key subjects and themes.
