Course Overview

The TOK course, a flagship element in the Diploma Program, encourages critical thinking about knowledge itself to try to help young people make sense of what they encounter. Its core content is questions like these: What counts as knowledge? How does it grow? What are its limits? Who owns knowledge? What is the value of knowledge? What are the implications of having or not having knowledge? The first semester of study in the TOK course will culminate in an internally assessed TOK exhibition. The second semester will culminate with a 1600-word TOK essay that answers a prompt presented by the IB.

The extended essay will also be completed during the TOK course.

Course Aims & Objectives

AIMS - The aims of the TOK course are to:

- develop a fascination with the richness of knowledge as a human endeavor, and an understanding of the empowerment that follows from reflecting upon it
- develop an awareness of how knowledge is constructed, critically examined, evaluated and renewed by communities and individuals
- encourage students to reflect on their experiences as learners, in everyday life and in the Diploma Program, and to make connections between academic disciplines and between thoughts, feelings, and actions
- encourage an interest in the diversity of ways of thinking and ways of living of individuals and communities, and an awareness of personal and ideological assumptions, including participants' own
- encourage consideration of the responsibilities originating from the relationship between knowledge, the community, and the individual as citizens of the world.

Objectives - Having followed the TOK course, students should be able to:

- > analyze critically knowledge claims, their underlying assumptions, and their implications
- generate questions, explanations, conjectures, hypotheses, alternative ideas, and possible solutions in response to knowledge issues
- > demonstrate an understanding of different perspectives on knowledge issues
- > draw links, and make effective comparisons between different approaches to knowledge issues
- demonstrate an ability to give a personal, self-aware response to a knowledge issue 6. formulate and communicate ideas clearly with due regard for accuracy and academic honesty.

A NOTE ABOUT COGNITIVE DISSONANCE:

Cognitive dissonance refers to a situation involving conflicting attitudes, beliefs, or behaviors. This produces a feeling of discomfort, leading to an alteration in one of the attitudes, beliefs, or behaviors to reduce the discomfort and restore balance etc. Students may be exposed to conflicting attitudes and opinions in the class. I will make every attempt to present both (multiple) sides of each issue discussed without bias. The goal of the class is to encourage critical thinking strategies and evidence-based learning for all students. Conversations regarding family values on topics covered in class are encouraged. Please contact me with questions regarding the course curriculum and content if they arise.

Assessments

Assessments for TOK will include those prescribed by the IB programme in addition to those designed by the instructor. All assignments are designed to meet the goals of the IB Programme and TOK and to prepare students for successful completion of the IB assessments. All papers and presentations will be evaluated using IBO rubrics unless otherwise noted.

In the Junior year, students will complete the TOK exhibition. In the Senior year, students will write a 1600-word essay in response to prescribed titles published by the IB. Together these two assessments comprise the total IB score for the course, which can earn students up to three points toward the IB Diploma.

Electronic Devices Schoolwide Policy

- Cell Phones/Electronic Devices Personal Electronic items of value are the responsibility of the student.
