CHAPTER 15

Future Ready Iowa Grant

Established in 2018, the Future Ready Iowa Grant (FRG) is a non-need-based grant program that assists students who enroll in programs of study aligned with statewide high-demand jobs at Iowa Regent Universities or independent colleges/universities in Iowa. Awards are prorated for students enrolling on a less than full-time basis. Please see the Iowa College Aid <u>Data Center</u> for a history of state appropriations.

A. ELIGIBILITY

1. College/University

To be eligible to participate in the FRG, an institution must be a university governed by the state Board of Regents, an Iowa private college/university as defined in Iowa Code Section 261.9, or an approved virtual institution. Participating colleges/universities must offer eligible programs of study aligned with a high-demand job.

An eligible institution must require students to:

- Attend and orientation session, in-person or virtually, for the eligible institution;
- Register for courses with the assistance of an advisor and participate in available academic advising sessions;
- Create a graduation plan if required in the program of study;
- Participate in available career advising sessions if required in the program of study, including creation of a career plan when possible;
- Market eligible Future Ready Iowa programs of study on the institution's website;
- Report information annually to Iowa College Aid.

Students attending the colleges/universities listed are eligible to receive the FRG.

Each college/university must complete an initial application for participation in the FRG program. College/university officials must submit the application and supporting

documentation establishing accreditation or accreditation plans by October 1 prior to the application year in which they want to participate. If the college/university application is approved, students at the college/university may begin submitting need analysis applications (FAFSAs) the following October to apply for funds. In summary, if an FRG application is received prior to October 1 and is subsequently approved, the earliest students attending that college/university could apply for FRG funding would be the following October 1.

2. Student

In addition to the general eligibility requirements found in Chapter 1, an eligible FRG recipient must be at least 25 years old on July 1 preceding the academic year. The eligible student must enroll continuously on at least a part-time basis (6 hours minimum). Continuous enrollment is required during the fall and spring terms of enrollment and the student must attend at the required level of enrollment; summer enrollment is not required for a student to meet the continuous enrollment provision. However, a student enrolled in at least 6 credit hours during the summer term can receive a FRG award.

Any student who establishes (attends) the required minimum enrollment and partially withdraws, but does not completely withdraw, will be allowed to continue to receive the FRG and will be considered to have met the minimum enrollment threshold for continuous enrollment.

If a student who is awarded FRG attends courses during a semester but withdraws from all courses after the add/drop date would still not meet the continuous enrollment requirement in subsequent terms.

If a student is enrolled in a modular program and it is anticipated the student will be eligible for FRG at the time of award, the institution may disburse FRG based on the anticipated enrollment in late start courses. In the event a student does not attend a course or set of courses, FRG must be reduced to reflect accurate enrollment for courses attended and the student will lose future eligibility for FRG if the minimum enrollment threshold is not maintained during that term of enrollment. Schools should follow their refund/recalculation policies and award accordingly.

An otherwise eligible student may enroll in fewer than 6 credit hours in the term that the program of study will be completed if fewer than 6 credit hours are required to complete the eligible program of study.

3. Program of Study

Annually, the Iowa Workforce Development Board will update and approve the list of statewide high-demand jobs used for the FRG. Iowa College Student Aid Commission (Iowa College Aid) staff translate these high-demand jobs (using standard occupation classification codes, or SOC codes) to aligned programs of study (using classification of instructional program codes, or CIP codes). Iowa College Aid staff will work with participating colleges/universities annually to update the list of eligible programs of study offered at each institution.

B. STUDENT APPLICATION PROCESS

Applicants who have not received the FRG in a prior year must complete both the Iowa Financial Aid Application and the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), as described in Chapter 1, on or before the corresponding deadline(s). Applicants will be funded in date received order.

Students renewing their FRG award must complete only the FAFSA on or before July 1. It is not necessary for a student renewing their award to submit an lowa Financial Aid Application.

C. SELECTION OF RECIPIENTS

On-time applicants will be designated for an award by Iowa College Aid. If all applicants cannot be served due to funding limitations, Iowa College Aid will prioritize based on the following criteria:

- Eligible renewal students by application date
- Eligible new applicants by application date

In the event all students in a given priority group can't be funded, applicants will be ranked by the date of submission of the FRG application (earliest to latest).

lowa college/university officials can access a designated roster of recipients by logging in to ICAPS® and clicking on 'Rosters'. Only students on the 'Designated' roster can receive a FRG payment. College/university officials should use the awarding instructions in this chapter, in conjunction with general guidance in Chapters 1-3, to award the FRG. College/university officials should verify the following criteria prior to making an award:

• The designated student is admitted into and enrolled in coursework that is part of a baccalaureate degree program with a CIP code that matches a CIP code on the list of eligible programs of study (identified at the end of this chapter).

D. AWARDING

The 2023-2024 maximum FRG award is \$3,000 for students enrolled full-time. Part-time students may receive assistance prorated based on their enrollment level.

College/university officials credit payments to student accounts on a per term basis. The following chart provides the maximum award allowed per enrollment level based on the maximum award of \$3,000.

Enrollment Level	Semester	Quarter
Full-time (12+ credits)	\$1,500	\$1,000
Three-quarter time (9-11 credits)	\$1,125	\$750
Half-time (6-8 credits)	\$750	\$500

If the award breakdown in the chart above results in different amounts per term, the higher dollar award should be provided in the first term of enrollment.

E. AWARD OFFERS

College/university officials must provide financial aid offers to all FRG recipients. Financial aid offers must clearly indicate the award amount and will include the following award notification statement:

"In the event that available state funds are insufficient to pay the full amount of each approved grant, the lowa College Student Aid Commission has the authority to administratively reduce the award."

F. RENEWAL AND LIFETIME ELIGIBILITY

FRG recipients will be considered for subsequent awards if the recipient completes the FAFSA by July 1, maintains continuous enrollment, and continues to meet all other FRG eligibility requirements.

Recipients of the FRG may renew their award for up to 4 full-time semesters (or the quarter equivalent) as long as they continue to meet all other eligibility criteria. Part-time students may receive up to 8 semesters (or the quarter equivalent) in assistance. Full-time and part-time semesters will be calculated using enrollment statuses reported by college/university officials in the lowa College Aid Processing System (ICAPS).

ICAPS determines the semester maximum by the usage of points. The FRG has a maximum limit of 2 points. The following chart indicates the point values given per term based on the enrollment status indicated in ICAPS.

Points Established by Enrollment Status			
Enrollment Status	Credits	Quarter Points	
Full-time (F)	12+	0.333	
Three-quarter time (P)	9-11	0.25	
Half-time (H)	6-8	0.167	
Less-than-half-time (L)	3-5	0.083	

G. DISBURSEMENT OF FUNDS

Chapter 3 provides a complete description of the payment process. The FRG is a non-need-based program and payments may be applied to any expense within the student's cost of attendance.

H. CHANGES/CORRECTIONS

Any changes in awards must be provided to Iowa College Aid electronically via ICAPS by the reporting deadlines established in Chapter 3 of the Iowa Student Financial Aid Guide.

I. VERIFICATION/COMPLIANCE

College/university officials are responsible for completing required federal verification procedures and for coordinating all aid to ensure compliance with student eligibility and allowable award amounts.

One disbursement of state-funded student financial aid may be made prior to completing the verification process as long as college/university officials have no reason to believe application information is inaccurate. If verification indicates that students are ineligible for aid, refunds must be made to state-funded programs.
