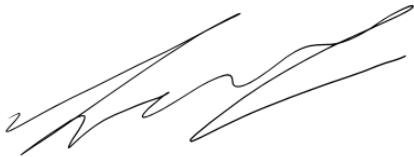

Mission and Vision Statement

Mission: The Ruth Asawa San Francisco School of the Arts is a college preparatory school that provides an experience uniquely rooted in dynamic arts programs that reflect our city's cultural diversity. Promising young artists and thinkers collaborate with teachers, professional artists, and their community to explore and develop their personal identity through art, insight, and movements that reflect and influence the world around them. Academic and Arts classes inform each other, balancing creative play with dedicated discipline, and building expertise in both classical and contemporary areas of study. Students devote themselves to studying how art, academic inquiry, and authentic expression impact civic engagement and social justice in local and global communities. Ruth Asawa School of the Arts is dedicated to the values of Respect, Openness, Safety and Engagement.

Vision: The Ruth Asawa San Francisco School of the Arts is a public, audition-based, alternative high school in the San Francisco Unified School District committed to equity and excellence in the arts and academics for all of our community members.

Who is Ruth Asawa?

Ruth Aiko Asawa (January 24, 1926 – August 6, 2013): Ruth Asawa was an influential American artist and activist renowned for her intricate, handcrafted wire sculptures that exemplify her innovative approach to art. Her educational philosophy was deeply rooted in the belief that art education should be accessible and transformative, fostering creativity and critical thinking in students. Asawa championed the idea that art education should be an integral part of the curriculum, not just a supplemental activity. She advocated for hands-on, experiential learning where students could explore materials and techniques, encouraging them to find their unique artistic voices. This philosophy was evident in her role as an educator and her efforts to promote art in schools, underscoring her commitment to nurturing artistic potential and integrating art into the broader educational landscape.

History of Ruth Asawa School of the Arts

Ruth Asawa School of the Arts, has a rich history tied to its namesake's legacy. Established in 1982, it was originally known as the School of the Arts and was the result of efforts to provide a dedicated institution for arts education within the San Francisco Unified School District. In 2010, the school was renamed to honor Ruth Asawa, a celebrated art educator whose advocacy for the arts significantly influenced the local educational landscape. She was one of the two co-founders of our school and we reflect her belief in the importance of integrating the arts into education, offering a curriculum that emphasizes artistic and creative development alongside academic subjects. The naming of the school pays tribute to Asawa's legacy and her impact on fostering artistic talent in young students. We invite practicing artists as faculty. The artist as part of the faculty and blocks devoted to the arts disciplines is what sets the school apart from other high schools.

R.O.S.E. Values

Ruth Asawa School of the Arts has four values which form the foundation of our work as a school. We believe these ethical principles are more important than academics, and that our graduation and college access rates mean nothing if our graduates do not live by these basic human values. ***We also expect all in our community to uphold these values, including all staff and community partners.*** RESPECT, OPEN, SAFE, ENGAGED.

Academic School Counseling

What is Academic School Counseling?

Academic School Counseling provides students with support in three main areas of focus: academic, college and career, and social-emotional. Our Academic School Counselor provides the following services and interventions to support students for success.

Counseling Focus Area	Types of services and interventions provided by counselor
Academic	• Annual individualized meetings with students about their academic progress • Evaluate Individual student transcripts to determine if a student is on/off-track for graduation • Register students for credit recovery • Outreach and enroll students in Early College classes at CCSF • Connect students with academic tutoring services
College & Career	• Connect students with opportunities to explore different college and career paths (e.g., field trips, meet and greets, presentations, fairs, etc.) • Host presentations and individualized meetings to share information about the different types of colleges and options available after high school (e.g. 2- or 4-year colleges, trade programs, workforce, etc.) • Research and apply to jobs and internships that peak student interest • Support students directly with applying for college, financial aid, and other post-secondary programs
Social-Emotional	• Check-ins with students about their overall well-being • Facilitate mediation meetings to address student conflict • Provide short-term counseling sessions • Referrals for students and families to additional support services (e.g. Wellness, community organizations, etc.)

How do students make an appointment?

Graduation Requirements & A-G College Eligibility Requirements

Students must complete **230** credits in order to earn a high school diploma. These credits include:

- A-G coursework (150 credits)
- Additional required classes (30 credits); 1 semester of college/career, 1 semester of health education, and 2 years of PE
- Electives (50 credits, 10 of which must be from the A-G categories)

High School Graduation Requirements & A-G College Eligibility Requirements

SFUSD adopted a policy that aligns high school graduation and the A-G requirements. To ensure that all students take college preparatory courses and have the option of applying to a wide range of colleges and universities, students must meet these requirements with a D or better in order to earn a high school diploma. To be UC/CSU eligible, students must complete these courses with a C or better.

What is A-G?

A-G are 15 year-long college preparatory courses established by the University of California (UC). These are the minimum required courses students must take during high school in order to be eligible to apply to UCs/CSUs. SFUSD's high school graduation requirements are aligned with A-G; however, there are slight differences.

Grading Philosophy

These grading principles are tools that help to drastically decrease bias in the grading process. It is designed to truly assign grades based on what students know and not factors that do not directly reflect student knowledge. In addition, our approach increases clarity for students and gives direct insight into their academic progress throughout the school year.

These principles are adapted from *Grading for Equity* by Joe Feldman and *Street Data: A Next-Generation Model for Equity, Pedagogy, and School Transformation* by Shane Safir and Jamila Dugan. Students and teaching staff also provided feedback through surveys that influenced decisions about which areas should be included in Ruth Asawa School of the Arts's grading philosophy.

Grading Principle	Purpose
Update grades every two weeks	Regular and frequent updates allow for students and families to have a better understanding of where they are at and removes the guesswork.
Allow for retakes and retaking only content missed	Supports a growth mindset and fosters hope. This practice values knowledge, not environment or behavior.
Homework given, but not graded	Homework is for skill building and/or an opportunity for extra time to finish assignments and learn at your own pace. Homework builds accountability, responsibility, and self-motivation needed for college/career without adding stress onto a grade. It puts the emphasis back on learning and builds independent thinking.
Participation and effort are not graded	Participation and effort are related to behavior. Grading behavior perpetuates implicit bias. There are issues of equity around why students do or do not participate. Grading does not equate to learning more. Grades are ineffective in shaping behavior.
Students have opportunities to provide input on what they are learning and what is graded	Grading should be explicit, visible, understandable, and bias-resistant. Ambiguity creates mistrust. Students should understand how to get the grade they want.

Grade Changes

Student grades are determined by the teacher of the course. Student grades are final unless there is a finding of clerical or mechanical mistake, fraud, bad faith, or incompetency. To challenge a

student's grade, the parent/guardian must submit a written request to the Assistant Superintendent for the school. This request will be determined within 30 days of its receipt. If the grade is not changed, the parent/guardian may submit an appeal to the Board of Education within 30 days of the refusal to change the grade. (CA Education Code 49066, 49070)

What is the Ruth Asawa School of the Arts Wellness Program?

The goal of the Wellness Program is to provide support for students so they may succeed academically and be healthy in body, mind and spirit. To accomplish this, the Wellness Program will coordinate and provide non-judgmental, student-focused health, mental health, and substance abuse services and programs for students on campus.

- In addition to the above staff, we will coordinate with counselors, case managers, group facilitators, and interns from community based organizations (CBOs) and universities who will provide support services for students on a weekly basis.

When is the Wellness Center open?

The Wellness Center will be open M-F 8:30-3:30 pm by appointment and for drop-in (with a pass from the teacher). We make sure that all students have a pass to the Wellness Center. We have tons of health information and resources – stop by!

What types of services are provided for students?

Students will be able to participate in a variety of services including mental health and substance abuse counseling, nursing services, case management, support/empowerment groups, conflict mediation, referrals to community agencies and more. The Wellness Center is committed to student's academic achievement and educational outcomes as well as their physical and emotional well being. The type and content of Wellness services to be provided to youth are CONFIDENTIAL!

Early College

Early College supports high school students to enroll in college classes at City College of San Francisco (CCSF) while still in high school. Students can earn both high school and college credit for Early College courses. Tuition is free and textbooks are loaned for recommended courses. Students must have a minimum of 120 high school credits (entering 11th grade) to participate, except for the Advanced World Language program. Speak with our Academic School Counselor if you are interested or have questions about Early College.

What Parents/ Caregivers Should Do When a Student Will be Absent:

If a student will remain at home, the parent/guardian **must do one** of the following;

- Submit an absence notification on the day of the absence via ParentVue ([Instructions](#))
- Send a written/excuse note to the attendance office
- School-specific attendance for Ruth Asawa ([Click HERE for printable version](#))

Or

(AFTER an absence you will not be able to report an absence through ParentVue and must send a note with your student.)

In all communications with the school regarding a student's absence please provide:

- Your name and identify yourself as the parent/guardian/caregiver of the student
- Student's name
- Date(s) of the absence(s)

- Reason for the absence
- Signature of a parent/caregiver and current date (if you are sending in a written note)

Families DO NOT need to submit doctor's notes for illness to receive an excused absence.

The student will receive an unexcused absence if the parent/caregiver does not submit communication for a valid excused absence.

A parent/guardian/caregiver of the student can submit a request for excused absence anytime during the school year.

SFUSD Board Policy 5113

We encourage parents/guardians/caregivers to review their student's attendance record regularly and communicate any discrepancies to the school.

Make-Up Work:

- It is the students' responsibility to request make-up work for missed work during the absence. They must complete the work within a reasonable amount of time. The teacher shall determine what make up work to assign, which may not necessarily be identical to the actual assignments they missed.
- If a student is absent for an extended amount of time, it is the responsibility of the parent/caregiver to notify the school and speak to the students' teachers to request, pick up, and return work. The advisor can work with teachers to arrange for work to be organized and made ready for the parent/caregiver to pick up.

Truancy:

- If a student is absent 10% of the school year, equivalent to 18 days, they are considered truant
- Legal Truant
 - 3 or more full day unexcused absences
 - 3 unexcused tardies or absences of 30 minutes or more in a school year
 - any combination of the previous

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- **Academic Honesty**
 - All students are expected to complete their own academic assignments and examinations. Any type of academic dishonesty, including but not limited to cheating, plagiarism, submitting work done by another as your own, or using unauthorized technology is prohibited. A student violating the academic honesty policy is subject to disciplinary action which can include but is not limited to point deduction or zero points on the assignment; lowered grade; detention; teacher may decline to write a letter of recommendation or report dishonesty in a letter, or rescind a recommendation letter already submitted. Social Media/Cyberbullying Policy

Social media has become an integral part of students' lives, offering a platform for connection and expression. However, it also presents new challenges, particularly with the rise of cyberbullying in schools. Unlike traditional bullying, cyberbullying can occur anytime and anywhere, amplifying the impact on victims who face harassment through texts, social media posts, and online messages. This relentless digital harassment can significantly affect students' mental health, academic performance, and overall well-being. Addressing cyberbullying requires a proactive approach involving education, open communication, and robust support systems within schools to foster a safer and more inclusive environment for all students.

- Cyberbullying includes, but is not limited, bullying through messages, texts, sounds or images. Sending or posting of unwanted comments, images, videos, and pictures that are done to intentionally harm or bully a student (whether it is based on protected class or not).
- Cyber sexual bullying/harassment includes when a student recipient receives an image and then shares that image to other students through text message, social media, or other electronic means, this is deemed to be cyber sexual bullying/harassment.

Ruth Asawa School of the Arts is an anti-bullying school which means we have a zero tolerance stance on bullying and harassment of any kind.

Cell Phone Policy

Flyers/Posters Policy

Flier Requirements

- Minimum: 8.5" x 11" max
- Max poster size: 17"x 22" max
- No obscenity, profanity, or hate speech of any kind (including imagery images).
- No culturally insensitive comments.
- 20 posted fliers MAX per organization per event (unless otherwise specified)
- Only use blue/painter's tape or staples allowed for posting
- Must be educational purpose

Approval Process

- If you are planning to post or distribute fliers in reg boxes, please complete the following steps:
 1. You **MUST** receive initial approval from your advisors/supervisors/department heads
 2. Ensure your poster meets the requirements above
 3. Have your club sponsor/supervisor/department head submit an original digital copy to the Google Form for review.
 - a. The Admin Team will monitor requests and discuss approval every Friday during the Admin Team meeting.
 4. Once you receive approval, pick up a single approved copy (should include stamp and date of removal) from Emily del Real (main office) during standard office hours.
 - a. NOTE: All approved fliers will be printed in BLACK and WHITE.
 - b. COLOR FLIERS: Bring printed color copies to the main office AFTER you have received approval for your poster. The poster **MUST** match the digital copy submitted!
 5. Duration
 - a. Event posters will be approved for 10 business days (2 weeks)
 - b. Informational posters may be approved for 10-20 business days (2-4 weeks)
 - c. Posters requiring longer posting time should indicate in the notes

Posting and Distribution

- Fliers may be distributed through registry boxes or posted on classroom bulletin boards.
 - LIMIT 1 COPY PER REGISTRY.
- **ONLY APPROVED FLIERS ARE ALLOWED TO BE POSTED on bulletin boards and hallways. Date of removal and Ruth Asawa School of the Arts "Approved" stamp must be visible on all posters.**
- Posted fliers should be placed on **BULLETIN BOARDS with staples** and on **HALLWAY WALLS with rolled blue/painter's tape on the BACK of each flier.** Do not use tape on bulletin boards.
- Areas to avoid (posting here will result in an instant removal)
 - Murals (fragile and will chip the paint)
 - Over important signage including but not limited to: classroom tags, fire or exit signs, etc.
 - Anywhere deemed dangerous or obstructive (ie. over viewing windows, etc)
- Any unapproved posters will be removed immediately.

Removal

- ALL posted flyers and tape/staples must be removed by the removal date.

AI Policy

Artificial Intelligence (AI) Policy

Acceptable Use & Academic Integrity

Purpose:

The purpose of this policy is to ensure that our students understand the appropriate use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools which may support learning while maintaining the highest standards of academic integrity. AI can be a powerful tool but it must be used ethically and responsibly. **At Ruth Asawa School of the Arts, we expect all students to uphold our values of academic integrity in all academic and artistic endeavors.**

1. What is Artificial Intelligence (AI)?

Artificial Intelligence (AI) refers to computer systems or software that can perform tasks that typically require human intelligence. Examples include generating text, creating images, composing music, analyzing data, or simulating human conversation. Common AI tools include ChatGPT, DALL·E, Grammarly, AI-based translation tools, and other generative or assistive applications.

2. Academic Integrity & AI

Academic integrity means **producing your own original work, giving proper credit to sources, and demonstrating your own understanding** of the subject. Using AI to complete assignments, projects, or creative works without proper acknowledgment or in a way that misrepresents your own abilities is considered academic dishonesty.

3. Acceptable Uses of AI in Schoolwork

AI may be used by students in the following ways, provided that teachers have given permission and all use is disclosed:

- **Structure Support:** Drafting Outlines, or approaches for assignments.
- **Skill Support:** Receiving guidance on grammar, syntax, or coding structure without AI completing the entire task.
- **Research Support:** Summarizing or clarifying concepts, provided the student verifies the information with credible sources.

4. Unacceptable Uses of AI

The following uses of AI violate school policy and will be treated as breaches of academic integrity:

- Submitting AI-generated work as your own without acknowledgment.
- Using AI to complete entire assignments, essays, problem sets, or projects
- Citing AI as a source or for quotes
- Fabricating sources, citations, or data.
- Using AI in assessments, quizzes, or exams unless explicitly authorized.
- Using AI to create or share inappropriate, harmful, or discriminatory content.
- Using even when teacher explicitly states it cannot be used

5. Student Responsibilities

- **Be Transparent:** Clearly indicate when and how AI tools were used in your work.
 - eg - I used grammarly help with punctuation of this draft.
 - eg - I utilized Chat GPT to help with the outline of my essay.
- **Verify Accuracy:** AI outputs may be incorrect or biased; students are responsible for fact-checking.
- **Follow Teacher Guidelines:** Each teacher may have specific rules for AI use in their class.

6. Consequences for Misuse

Students who fail to follow this policy will face consequences aligned with the school's **Academic Integrity Policy**. Consequences may include:

- A failing grade on the assignment.
- Requirement to redo the work without AI assistance.
- Disciplinary action for repeated or severe violations.
