Blogging Platforms

blogger.com: Very user friendly and customizable; you can create multiple pages and have a customized search so families and teachers can easily find what they are looking for. Integrates with other Google tools! There is no option to password protect it.

tumblr.com: Built more for images and videos and sharing from around the web; but simple and customizable. Comment fields need to be added. Easiest way to password protect a school blog!

wordpress.com: Can be a simple platform or a complex one depending on what you're looking for; has the option of password protecting posts rather than the whole blog.

sites.google.com: Create a website with more than just a blog, including pages for different classes, different projects - really anything you can think of. Templates are available, or you can have a blank slate! You can choose who to share the link with, so it is private without a need for a password. Comment fields are optional.

Web 2.0 Tools

flickr.com: A site for sharing photos and videos. Easy to create organizational folders for different classes, projects, or activities.

voicethread.com: Allows you to upload images or video and add commentary; you can also add "student accounts" so that students can add commentary as well; the viewers, if you allow, can also interact with it. It is easily embedded in your blog for all to see!

google + hangouts : Allows a group video chat that is recordable. Have your class hangout with another class; have a parent read a book to your class; interview an expert who you might not otherwise be able to and add that conversation to your blog! Google account is needed.
