All class periods will have a team, and channels can be created for individual groups of students

Alley Chai - Upland Terrace

- Always begins with a morning check-in- a written message, a Google Form asking students how they are feeling, a “question of the day.” She can follow up with individual students based on their answers, and shares answers to the question of the day in the next morning check-in.
- She gives students a daily to-do list, with a weekly schedule calendar.
 - She lists the most important tasks first on the daily calendar

- Alley uses emojis from the website linked above when she writes feedback on student work.
- During her morning meeting check-in, she challenges students to find a specific emoji she used in her feedback to them.
- Students let Alley know what assignment the emoji was in.
- Students get a reward for finding the emoji.

Alley's comments:

It worked really well and got the kids actually looking at all my comments since they have to search each one until they find the emoji. This is a good way to motivate students to look through the feedback teachers leave them.

- Daily Assignments-In Google Classroom each topic is a day, and within each date items 1-9 correlated each day (i.e. 5 is always math, etc.) (Valerie Turner)

- Always make sure the key information for the day is at the top of the stream for students (Taylor Layton)

- Melanie Mancini - half hour daily Google Meet to check in, read a story, go over math and ELA
- Debra Rossi - use the [Remind App](#) to make sure students don't forget Zoom call or Google Meet

- Some students prefer paper-pencil writing, others prefer adding it on Google Slides

- Final project or performance test
- Choice list - must do vs. may do
- Laura Heffernan - choice for students on how to respond (type, record, or write and take a photo)
- Carly Sorenson - uses Canvas and video to let students share what they're doing
- Valerie Turner - students can take pictures and turn them in via Class Dojo
- Nicole Wadsworth - THIS or THAT which each activity

Q3: How can we structure our lessons and online platforms so students feel like they can be successful with distance learning? (SKIPPED)
