It has been great to have whānau back in our school supporting different outdoor opportunities for our ākonga. We are seeing regular sports, and other events and training each week. This, together with the warmer weather and sunnier days seems to have brought more whānau into our school. We are still missing some key aspects of school operation due to the country still being in 'Orange' covid settings, and are looking forward to the possibility of even fewer restrictions in Term 4. The thing we are looking forward to most, is whānau in classrooms so we can share learning and celebrations kanohi ki te kanohi (face to face).

Last week a whānau member asked about why we had not started our Friday assemblies with everyone in the hall yet since other schools were doing this. This is one of the events we have all been missing! As a school we have had to find a balance between wanting to get back to our 'normal events' and keeping staff and ākonga safe. Until recently we have had several positive covid cases in our school each week and know that gathering 440 children, staff and whānau into an inside space when there



are possible positive covid cases in our school community was too much of a risk. While we know not having things like assemblies together has an impact, we have prioritised having staff and ākonga in school learning.

The Ministry of Education has recently started a promotion 'Every School Day Is A Big Day' encouraging regular attendance at school. As a school we are really behind this and see many positives for our ākonga when they attend school regularly both for their learning and wellbeing. There is more about this in this newsletter.

Promoting Attendance

'Every School Day is a Big Day' is a Ministry of Education campaign to encourage school

attendance. The campaign is a part of 'kia kotahi te ū ki te ako – all in for learning', which is an on-going nation-wide strategy with a focus on supporting ākonga to attend school regularly.

Our OPS staff notice that arriving before 8.45am in the morning and attending school regularly makes a noticeable difference to our ākonga's learning and wellbeing. We have even found links between school attendance and learning achievement outcomes for our ākonga.



We do appreciate the effort it can take some days to get your children moving and to school on time! We do also acknowledge that in our current climate with covid and winter illness, we are all facing more challenges than usual to have regular attendance.

Arriving on time and being at school regularly can help with...

- Supporting learning Often learning is building on prior knowledge that occurs
 over a number of days. Missing some of the prior learning can impact ākonga's
 understanding of a new concept or strategy. A lot of learning occurs in smaller
 groups learning with the teacher, and we know that the regular focus on specific
 learning has a positive impact on ākongas learning.
- **Supporting wellbeing** Children benefit from a predictable routine. It makes them feel safe when they know what to expect. Regular attendance, and therefore a regular routine at school, is one way of supporting your child's wellbeing.
- Supporting your anxious child When your child feels like they are prepared for the day and know what is happening each day it can reassure them and help settle anxiety. Irregular attendance may mean your child feels unsure about what to expect each day. Arriving after the rest of the class have settled into learning for the day can also be unsettling.

This artwork is a sun set.

We started by drawing the sun.

Then we used the side of the chalk pastel to do the orange. We make circles using yellow, orange, red and violet and purple and dark blue.

Then we went over the sun part and blended the colours. After the sky part we made the reflection in the sea. Using the corners of chalk pastels we made squiggles in the reflection.

We used our fingers to blend. We had to wipe our fingers

before we used them each time. We had to draw and wipe our fingers in the same direction. The chalk pastels have to be clean. The clouds were made by using the corner tip of the pastel. Osmo in the Classroom

Over this term Room 12 has been trialling Osmo, an app based collaborative learning platform with the classroom iPads. The children are working together and individually on reading, maths, and creative drawing games. So far the drawing and story play has been most popular. The app is able to take drawings from the



children and animate
them within the story. The app uses
mirrors and the camera to see their
creations, interacts with the learners,
then gives them real time feedback.
It has been exciting to try the new
technology and think about how we
can continue our collaboration as
the Kea Learning Community
continues to grow.

Rongo – Te reo Māori pronunciation app

Launched last month by Te Hiku Media, Rongo is here to help users pronounce te reo Māori correctly.

For many people speaking Māori correctly can be overwhelming and one of the hardest parts of learning te reo Māori.

Rongo is an aural-first experience, combining traditional Māori teaching methods such as listening then repeating to create the learning environment. Rongo provides real-time feedback with 24 lessons designed to improve te reo Māori pronunciation.

The user is challenged first to listen carefully then to imitate the correct



pronunciation. The words will only appear on screen as extra support and the written list of phrases will be available to the student at the end of the lesson.

The method was seen as very effective in a study at the University of Otago where first year students in Māori performing arts were taught waiata and haka in the dark. Findings revealed increased improvement and retention with kupu, as well as excellent pronunciation. This was viewed as an amazing result considering most of the students were also visiting international students.

Peter-Lucas Jones, CEO of Te Hiku Media says, "Te Hiku Media is excited about getting this tool into the hands of Māori language learners. They can tackle pronunciation in the privacy of their own home, in the car or by the beach. Wherever they feel comfortable and safe."
