

Henry David Thoreau Read to Someone

Thoreau & The Nature Guardians

Characters:

- Alex, a bright-eyed kid with a mission to understand the planet's protectors for a school project.
- Aunt Clara, a nature enthusiast and storyteller, full of wisdom about historical environmentalists.

Act 1: The Tale Begins

(A cozy living room setting, shelves filled with plants, nature paintings, and a prominent globe. Alex is sketching a tree when Aunt Clara enters with a tray of cookies.)

Alex: "That's a lot of apples!"

****Act 4: Nature's Champions Worldwide****

Alex: "Trees make everything better, don't they?"

Alex: "All these people seem different but also kind of the same."

****Act 5: Our Turn to be Guardians****
