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Lesson Plan: Discovering the Main Idea in a Text

This lesson plan is designed to be interactive and engaging, helping students to grasp the concept of the main idea through various activities and collaborative work.

Lesson Title: Discovering the Main Idea

Grade Level: Upper Elementary (Grades 4-6)

Objective: Students will be able to identify the main idea of a passage and support it with supporting details.

Materials Needed:

Lesson Outline:
