Grade 10 Honors World Literature Curriculum Overview

Narrative: The Sophomore English/World Literature Course is designed to draw upon literature from a diverse number of cultures, thereby exposing students to their richness. These situations will be explored through novels, nonfiction works, short stories, poems and drama, all of which introduce people and places from across the globe. These various literary works will be studied from a thematic approach. World Literature places emphasis on critical reading, writing and presenting effectively. The five-paragraph writing module, as endorsed by the MCAS exam, is emphasized for the first half of the year, whereas more experimental writing is emphasized after the MCAS's completion. Themes and style are explored through literary devices, as seen in novels such as *Night* and *The House on Mango Street*.
