Compare and Contrast Essay: "The Monkey's Paw" & "The Third Wish"

"The Monkey's Paw" by W.W. Jacobs and "The Third Wish" by Joan Aiken are very similar stories. The plot and theme of the two stories are very similar. The way the wishes were used by the main characters is very different. The similarities and differences can be seen through looking carefully at the various examples in the stories and through examining textual evidence.

The plot of "The Monkey's Paw" and "The Third Wish" is very similar. In "The Monkey's Paw" Mr. White was impetuous with his wishes, but in "The Third Wish" Mr. Peters pondered about his first wish. For example, Herbert suggests that Mr. White wish for 200 pounds. Herbert says, "'If you cleared the house, you'd be quite happy, wouldn't you?' with his hand on his shoulder. 'Well, wish for 200 pounds, then; that'll just do it'" (Jacobs 91). Mr. Peters did not want to use his wishes without thinking first, so he pricked his tongue with a thorn from a rose (Aiken 103). Mr. White and Mr. Peters, the main characters of each story, used their wishes in very different ways as seen by their actions.

The theme of "The Monkey's Paw" and "The Third Wish" is very similar as well. The message of both stories is to be careful what you wish for. The reader can infer this because in both stories, the wishes led to negative consequences. In "The Monkey's Paw," we can infer this from the very beginning. The Whites knew that the paw had negative history behind it when Mr. White's friend, Sergeant Major Morris, arrived with the monkey's paw. Sergeant Major Morris said, that the paw "...had a spell put on it by an old fakir" (Jacobs 88). He went on to say, "He wanted to show that fate ruled people's lives, and that those who interfered with it did so to their sorrow." (Jacobs 88) This is powerful bit of foreshadowing that helps the reader understand where the story might go, but also, to be careful what you wish for. The most specific examples of the theme, "be careful what you wish for," are in the consequences that each character is met with once s/he makes his/her wish. In "The Monkey's Paw," Mr. White wishes for 200 pounds, the equivalent of one thousand dollars, however, he receives it only after his son Herbert is killed in an accident. The money comes to him from Herbert's former employer as compensation for his death. In "The Third Wish," Mr. Peters wishes for a wife or companion, however he receives one in the form of a swan. Based on the events of both stories, it is clear that the message is to be careful what you wish for. In both stories, the characters faced negative consequences after making wishes.

Topic Sentence: The way the wishes were used in "The Third Wish" and "The Monkey's Paw" were very different. In The Monkey's Paw, the Whites were hasty in their wish-making and wished right away for money, then for Herbert to come back, and finally for Herbert to go away.

(Jacobs 91-99) In the Third Wish, Mr. Peters wishes for a companion, then for Leita to be turned back into a swan, and he dies without using his last wish. (Aikens ___).

"The Monkey's Paw" by W.W. Jacobs and "The Third Wish" by Joan Aiken are two short stories with elements that are both similar and different. Overall, the two stories are very similar and differ only slightly. The two elements where I found them to be most similar were the plot and theme.
