Multiple Choice Test Correction Instructions

To earn all your points back, you will need to follow the instructions described below.

Instructions: You can do test corrections to earn back missed points on your test. For each question you missed, you will: write the number of the question you missed, the answer you gave, the definition of that answer, and the page number in the textbook you found the definition. Then you will write the correct answer, the definition for that correct answer (stating why that is the correct answer), and the page number where you found the answer. If you find the definition outside of the textbook, provide the information for that source. Below is an example of how your test corrections should be formatted to earn back your points:

My answer: E) large republic theory

Definition of "large republic": Madison explained that a large republic, where there is more power in a central government that is farther from the people, would be best because the large size of the country would make it difficult for factions (people with the same ideas) to rise up and take over the government.

Correct Answer: A) Judicial Review

Definition of "Judicial Review": Because of the principle of judicial review, the Supreme Court now has the power to review laws and determine whether the law is constitutional or unconstitutional. This is the correct answer because Judicial Review gives a check the power of Congress (which makes the laws) and the President (who enforces the laws). With judicial review, no one branch of government can have all the power over the laws of the land.

For the Free Response portion of the tests, you can earn back half points for each missed point you correct.

What do I need to rewrite? Only the points that you missed.

- 1. If you missed the point because you failed to write in complete sentences or if your writing was illegible, simply rewrite your answers in legible complete sentences.
- 2. If you missed the point because you provide incorrect information, you need to:
 - a. Provide the correct information in a complete sentence.
 - b. Tell me where you found the information (I need a page number from the textbook or an exact internet URL of where you found it.)
 - c. Explain the difference between the answer you gave and the correct answer.
- 3. If you missed the point because you did not provide an answer at all, you need to:
 - a. Provide the correct information in a complete sentence.
 - b. Tell me where you found the information (I need a page number from the textbook or an exact internet URL of where you found it.)
 - c. Explain why you did not answer the question, i.e. did you run out of time, did you not understand the question that was being asked, etc.
- 4. If you believe your SAQ, DBQ, LEQ, AAQ, or EBQ was incorrectly graded:
 - a. Show me what you wrote (re-type it or take a picture of the section)
 - b. Show me what the rubric said (re-type it or take a picture of the section)
 - c. In this circumstance, you can earn back your full point.
