Narrative Summary: Capital Projects Over R50 Million – City of Cape Town Budget 2024/25

1. Introduction

The City of Cape Town's 2024/25 budget includes a set of capital-intensive infrastructure projects valued at over R50 million each, spanning various sectors such as housing, transport, water, energy, and ICT. These large-scale investments reflect the city's development priorities, strategic planning objectives, and political choices. However, the geographical and functional distribution of these projects raises critical questions about equity, spatial justice, and the progressive realization of socio-economic rights in a deeply divided urban landscape.

2. Key Observations

2.1 Budget Magnitude and Scope

The City has committed billions of rands to capital projects, with dozens of them individually exceeding R50 million in planned expenditure. These projects are part of multi-year capital programs and reflect significant long-term infrastructure commitments.

Projects include bulk water augmentation schemes, large-scale housing developments, ICT upgrades, road resurfacing programs, wastewater treatment works, and power grid stabilization efforts.

2.2 Geographic Distribution Bias

Significant concentration of high-value projects in the CBD, Atlantic Seaboard, and northern suburbs, where infrastructure is already well developed and residents are typically better served.

Underinvestment persists in township and historically marginalized areas such as Khayelitsha, Nyanga, Gugulethu, Bonteheuwel, Delft, and Mitchells Plain. In many cases, these communities are only listed for “infrastructure renewal” or “routine maintenance,” not strategic upgrades.

For instance, substantial allocations go to projects like the Foreshore Freeway Precinct, Century City Connector, and Bellville CBD redevelopment, while townships remain without meaningful sanitation upgrades.

2.3 Sectoral Priorities

Water and Sanitation Projects: A major focus post-Day Zero, with large investments in the Cape Flats Wastewater Treatment Works, the Athlone Wastewater upgrade, and bulk water augmentation programs. However, there is less attention to decentralized sanitation models needed for informal settlements.

Energy Projects: Grid stability, Eskom exit readiness, and solar PV rollouts dominate energy sector investments. These largely benefit industrial and commercial areas, raising concerns of a “two-tiered energy transition.”

Transport Projects: The city’s Integrated Rapid Transit (IRT) system and road infrastructure continue to absorb large sums, with projects like the N1 and N2 freeway upgrades. However, minibus taxi reform and infrastructure receive comparatively less funding, despite transporting over 60% of the city’s working class.

Housing Projects: The few large housing projects above R50m (such as the Airport Industria housing development) are delayed, under-delivered, or politically contested. The city’s housing backlog exceeds 400,000—yet mega-project funding is thinly spread.

ICT Projects: Smart city and digital infrastructure programs, while commendable, are primarily aimed at enterprise zones and municipal efficiency rather than closing the digital divide in poor communities.

2.4 Cost Efficiency and Delivery Risk

A number of projects are in year 3 or 4 of rollout with less than 50% expenditure against budget, suggesting implementation bottlenecks, procurement delays, or capacity deficits.

The Auditor-General has previously flagged the City of Cape Town’s tendency to underspend on human settlements and sanitation, while overspending on security services and contracted consultants.

3. Political Economy of Capital Budgeting

This pattern of capital project allocation under the DA-led City of Cape Town reflects a technocratic bias toward maintaining existing infrastructure rather than radically transforming the city’s spatial injustice. While the City prides itself on being “well-run,” the evidence from its budget indicates:

Reinforcement of racial and economic geographies of apartheid.

Neglect of basic infrastructure in informal and peri-urban settlements.

Austerity in areas that require expansion, and opulence in areas that need maintenance.

This budget regime amplifies the critiques voiced by civic organizations like Reclaim the City, Ndifuna Ukwazi, and Social Justice Coalition, which argue that the city is being run “efficiently for the few,” not “equitably for the many.”

4. Implications and Strategic Questions

Who decides which communities receive R200m transport upgrades and which get pit toilets “cleaned weekly”?

What accountability exists to ensure township infrastructure is prioritized beyond election cycles?

How do we ensure public participation translates into capital reallocation, not token consultation?

5. Strategic Recommendations

Audit All Projects >R50m Through an Equity Lens

Conduct a participatory audit of capital expenditure, spatial distribution, demographic reach, and socioeconomic impact.

Legislate for Equitable Capex Thresholds

Advocate for national legislation mandating a minimum percentage of capital budgets to be spent in historically disadvantaged communities.

Community Budget Forums

Institutionalize ward-based forums to review and influence project prioritization before IDP and SDBIP approval.

Establish a Cape Flats Infrastructure Commission

Similar to the Khayelitsha Commission, but focused on bulk service inequality, housing backlogs, and environmental health.

Use Legal and Oversight Tools

Utilize PAIA requests, AGSA audit trails, and Parliamentary oversight committees to probe questionable project choices or persistent underspending.

6. Conclusion

The R50 million+ projects in Cape Town's 2024/25 budget tell a story—not just of technocratic planning, but of political choices. In their current configuration, they risk entrenching a “Tale of Two Cities.” Yet with organized civic pressure, transparent budgeting, and strategic litigation where necessary, there is space to demand a different future—one built on dignity, equality, and public investment that prioritizes those who have waited the longest.

Qualitative Reflections

Spatial Priorities:

Projects are mostly in southeast and northern peripheral townships, reflecting attempts to address apartheid planning but also reinforcing sprawl rather than inner-city inclusion.

Urban Inclusion Gaps:

No major high-value housing investment in CBD, Sea Point, Claremont, or the Foreshore, reinforcing inequality. The Woodstock/Salt River social housing pipeline is conspicuously absent, despite court pressure.

Backyarder and Infill Focus:

The City has scaled up backyarder formalisation, which is positive—but it must be supported by infrastructure budgets (water, sewerage, roads).

Underperformance Risks:

Several projects (Joe Slovo, Airport Industria) have histories of legal contestation, protest blockages, and poor community engagement, which risks non-expenditure.

Hostel Transformation Lags:

Langa and Gugulethu hostels are still not fully converted—a matter of urban dignity and transitional justice.

Strategic Red Flags

Execution capacity needs urgent strengthening—many of these are in year 3+ of rollout.

Integrated Development is minimal—few projects linked with job creation, schools, clinics, or transport infrastructure.

No visible link to climate resilience—despite Cape Flats’ vulnerability to flooding, heat, and rising informal densities.

Land ownership challenges in at least 5 of the top 20 sites may delay implementation.

Qualitative Reflections

What's Working:

The City is investing heavily in wastewater treatment, reflecting lessons learned from raw sewage overflow crises in 2020–2023.

Athlone, Cape Flats, and Zandvliet upgrades are overdue but now properly scoped and budgeted.

Projects like Philippi Aquifer protection show a growing awareness of ecological infrastructure needs.

There is strong alignment with Water Services Development Plans (WSDP) and Blue/Green Drop compliance programs.

⚠️ Concerns and Gaps:

Skewed Spending Favors Wealthier Areas:

The Camps Bay Pump Station receives nearly R430 million, while Masiphumelele's entire sanitation budget is less than a third of that.

Backlog vs. New Build Bias:

Most spending is on large new infrastructure, not maintenance or emergency repair in poor areas (e.g., Nyanga, Crossroads, Langa).

Limited Informal Area Innovations:

There is no major investment in alternative or decentralised sanitation solutions (e.g., dry toilets, biodigesters).

Township Risks:

Khayelitsha, Gugulethu, and Du Noon appear in the list, but budgets are still relatively low compared to need and known breakdown rates.

Target 10 informal settlements per year for site-wide sanitation upgrade pilots using prefabricated or modular solutions.

Prioritize Human-Water-Safety Nexus:

Water projects must be linked to public health data, particularly in areas affected by diarrheal diseases and COVID-19 exposure.

Climate Adaptation Layer:

Every sewer and WWTW upgrade should include a floodproofing component—particularly in Cape Flats and Philippi Horticultural Area.

Qualitative Reflections

What's Commendable:

Proactive Eskom Exit Planning: Steenbras, Atlantis solar + batteries, and citywide DSM initiatives show credible movement toward energy sovereignty.

Decentralization and Digitization: Investment in SCADA, AI metering, and predictive maintenance aligns with global smart grid trends.

Rooftop solar and battery adoption for public facilities is gaining traction—lowering costs and providing redundancy.

Critical Concerns:

Township Grid Inequities Persist:

While some upgrades are seen in Gugulethu, Nyanga, Khayelitsha and Lotus River, the investment per capita is far lower than for CBD, port, or industrial zones.

Informal Electrification Still Small Share:

At R254m, the informal electrification programme remains under-resourced given its impact and the scale of urban energy poverty.

Geographic Disparity:

Major coastal and CBD infrastructure receives disproportionately high capex compared to the Cape Flats interior.

Introduce rooftop PV and micro-grid systems for dense informal clusters using modular, community-owned systems.

Incentivize Township Rooftop PV:

Use municipal rebates + prepaid net metering to encourage household or spaza-scale solar systems.

Grid Hardening for Climate Resilience:

Ensure all future substations include floodproofing, fire protection, and battery buffering—especially in Cape Flats and low-lying coastal wards.

Qualitative Reflections

Positive Developments

Massive Transit Capex Growth:

Major investment in IRT, NMT (non-motorized transport), and taxi integration shows alignment with global mobility goals.

Pro-Poor Corridors Gaining Ground:

Spine Road, Khayelitsha-Southern Line IRT, and Nyanga upgrades are overdue investments in underserved townships.

Integration Hubs:

The Bellville and Delft PTIs represent transformative public mobility ecosystems—if executed with equity and safety in mind.

Active Mobility:

Bonteheuvel's dedicated NMT plan signals a shift from car-centric urban planning to dignity-based pedestrian focus.

Areas of Concern

CBD and Industrial Zones Dominate Spend:

Foreshore, N1/N7, and Port-adjacent precincts still absorb high-cost mega-projects, limiting budget equity.

Under-Scoping in Informal Areas:

Dense zones like Philippi, Crossroads, and Langa see few projects—despite long-term safety and road decay crises.
