

Summary of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education Meeting of November 20, 2025

Core Points

- Memorial and Opening Remarks
 - The meeting opened with a tribute to Mrs. Katherine Cat Boyd, a longtime custodian at Santa Monica High School (Samo High) who recently retired and passed away. She was remembered for her kindness, dedication, and positive impact on the school community over 30 years. Details about her memorial services were shared, and heartfelt condolences were extended to her family and colleagues.
- Board Meeting Administrative Actions
 - The board addressed procedural items including approval of the agenda with some adjustments, approval of minutes from the previous meeting, and roll call of members present both in person and via Zoom.
 - Close session items included discussion of easement and license terms for a solar purchase agreement, and a final settlement involving reimbursement for parents' educational expenses totaling up to \$39,939 plus attorney fees.
- School Presentations and Recognitions
 - Roosevelt Elementary School presented on its focus areas including community connection, growth, resilience, and project-based learning (PBL). Highlights included the implementation of GRIT values (Growth, Respect, Integrity, Tenacity), a successful Hispanic Heritage Month festival, and hands-on learning projects such as the "Mission Monarch" butterfly garden.
 - The City of Santa Monica's Safe Routes to School program presented the Golden Sneaker Award to Grant Elementary for highest student participation (85%) in sustainable transportation initiatives (walking, biking, bussing). The program promotes healthy, green commuting and environmental awareness.
 - Santa Monica High School principal Dr. Maré Cruz highlighted academic achievements including National Merit Scholarship semi-finalists and commended scholars, improvements in standardized testing results (CASP), and expansion of Advanced Placement (AP) participation with high success rates. New academies in Health & Wellness and Law & Public Policy were introduced with community partnerships. The school emphasized project-based learning and structured collaborative conversations to enhance academic rigor and student engagement. Facility upgrades were also noted.
 - National Merit Scholarship recipients from Santa Monica High School were formally recognized and awarded certificates.

- Superintendent’s Report and District Updates
 - Superintendent Dr. Shelton shared highlights from recent events, such as the Malibu Optimist Youth Appreciation Breakfast and early learning exhibitions at Webster Elementary, emphasizing student optimism and project-based learning in early education.
 - Updates on capital improvement bonds were provided, including a recent refinancing that saved taxpayers nearly \$4.5 million and progress on a \$130 million bond approved by Malibu voters.
 - The district’s Emergency Operations Coordination Center (EOCC) effectively managed responses to recent atmospheric river storms, enabling schools to remain open safely.
 - The Ocean Park Schoolhouse was named as a new campus for Olympic High School and Off Campus Learning Center, with moves scheduled over breaks for smooth transitions.
 - Thanksgiving holiday dates and well-wishes were announced.
- California School Dashboard Presentation
 - Dr. Alyssa Grady, Director of Assessment, Research, and Evaluation, presented the 2025 California School Dashboard data. This system reports on seven state indicators of school and district performance, including academic achievement, attendance, suspension rates, English learner progress, and graduation rates.
 - The district maintained or improved performance in most areas, notably maintaining high English Language Arts (ELA) and math scores with no subgroups in the “red” performance category, and earned a green rating in science for the first time.
 - Chronic absenteeism remains a noted challenge, particularly in certain student subgroups.
 - Participation rates in state assessments improved, reducing penalties associated with low participation.
 - The importance of accurate data reflective of all student groups was emphasized, alongside strategies to increase test participation and address absenteeism.
- Data Utilization and Next Steps
 - Dr. Williamson described using both quantitative data from the dashboard and qualitative “street data” – student, staff, and family feedback – to inform school improvement plans and ensure that instructional goals match lived classroom experiences.
 - The district celebrated exiting “differentiated assistance” status for certain English learner subgroups due to academic progress, but committed to continued support via new English learner curriculum, coaching, focus groups, and progress monitoring.
- Policy Updates Presentation

- Updates to eight student services policies and administrative regulations were presented. Changes align district policies with recent state laws, clarify language, and reflect current practices. Key updates included:
 - Parent rights regarding instructional materials and privacy, including protections against collection of social security numbers and immigration status.
 - Admission and residency policies, including provisions for military families and displaced students due to natural disasters, with protections under McKinney-Vento law.
 - Attendance exemptions, exclusions, and leaves with updated gender-neutral language and clearer definitions.
 - The district will continue updating policies throughout the year.
- Board Bylaws Update
 - The second round of revisions to board bylaws (9000 series) was reviewed, covering topics such as governing board elections, resignations, filling vacancies, oath of office, orientation, training, legal protections, conflicts of interest, and board policies.
 - The updates incorporated recent legislative changes, clarified procedural elements, and ensured alignment with best practices.
 - Notably, new ethics training requirements for board members effective January 2025 were introduced.
- Resolution for National Inclusive Schools Week
 - The board unanimously approved a resolution recognizing December 5-9, 2025, as National Inclusive Schools Week, emphasizing unity, inclusive practices, accessibility, and celebration of progress in supporting all students.
- Closing Comments and Adjournment
 - Board members expressed gratitude and optimism about district progress and community involvement. Thanksgiving well-wishes were extended.
 - No public comments were made on agenda or non-agenda items.
 - The meeting adjourned with members wishing everyone a safe and restorative holiday.

Key Conclusions

- Strong Commitment to Community and Student Well-Being
 - The district's tribute to Mrs. Katherine Cat Boyd and emphasis on community celebrations, family engagement, and inclusive practices illustrate a deep commitment to fostering a supportive and connected educational environment.
- Academic Progress and Innovation

- Resilience in Crisis Management
 - The district’s proactive response to severe weather events and natural disasters, along with policies protecting displaced families, demonstrate preparedness and a student-centered approach to challenges.
- Recognition of Excellence and Continuous Improvement
 - Celebrations of student achievements, such as National Merit recognitions, and acknowledgment of progress in state accountability measures reinforce a culture of excellence while recognizing areas for growth.
