Is it really worth it to maintain your pool by yourself?

1. By cleaning yourself, are you wasting time?

Let's *dive* in. Normally, without issues, the average person spends 1-2 hours a week, maintaining their pool.

But, whenever those **issues** come up, it may take hours. Especially when you don't know the solution, you'll find yourself spending hours searching through troublefreepool.com, reddit threads and other forums, desperate to find a fix.



Lets say, every week you average 2 hours of maintenance. There's 4 weeks in a month, 12 months in a year. $2 \times 4 \times 12$, that's almost 100 hours spent per year!

Think what you can do in 100 hours, you could go on **vacation**, come home, throw a **pool** party, and still have time to spare.

2. At the end of the day, how much do you really save?

With a sacrifice of 100 hours yearly, surely the savings are **huge**, *right*? The average pool owner spends about 1200-1800 dollars a year on their pool.



Pool maintenance can range, but let's say even 200 a month. 200 x 12 is 2400.

That means you're saving just a *couple hundred dollars* for nearly **100 hours** of work, and that's assuming everything goes perfect.

If you're concerned with savings, you could easily work a **part time** job for just **a few weeks** and completely blow those savings out of the water.

3. Should you hire pool maintenance
