



(The title is set center and 17-point Times New Roman Bold, maximum 15 words. The first letter of all words in the title should be capitalized. Concise and informative

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(Abstracts with no more than 300 words should be supplied to reflect the content of the paper. A concise and factual abstract is required. The abstract should state briefly the context of the problem (background), the purpose/aim of the research, the principal methods, the results, and the major conclusion (contribution). An abstract is often presented separately from the article, so it must be able to stand alone. For this reason, References/citations should be avoided. Also, non-standard or uncommon abbreviations should be avoided, but if essential they must be defined at their first mention in the abstract itself.)

Divide your article into clearly defined and numbered sections. Subsections should be numbered 1.1 (then 1.1.1, 1.1.2, ...), 1.2, etc. (the abstract is not included in section numbering). Use this numbering also for internal cross-referencing: do not just refer to ‘the text’. Any subsection may be given a brief heading. Each heading should appear on its own separate line. The text uses 10-point Times or Times New Roman and 1,5 line spacing. Paragraphs should be justified. These guidelines, written in the style of a submission to *MuJoLaLi Journal* show the best layout for your paper using Microsoft Word. If you don’t wish to use the Word template provided, please use the following page setup measurements (3.0 cm top margin, 2.7 cm bottom margin, 2.5 cm for left and right margin) and use line number.

2. Methods

Provide sufficient detail to allow the work to be reproduced. Methods already published should be indicated by a reference: only relevant modifications should be described. Please describe whether the study is experimental or exploratory. Name the number of samples and give courtesy to whom you obtain the sample. State seasonal variation of the habitat (if applicable) or date of sampling. Human materials should be collected in conformation with standard ethics and with written informed consent.

3. Results

Results and Discussion should be written separately. Results should be clear and concise. State the obtained results based on the methods.

3.1. Sub Heading

Results should be clear and concise. Show only the most significant or main findings of the research. Discussion must explore the significance of the results of the work. Adequate discussion or comparison of the current results to the previous similar published articles should be provided to show the positioning of the present research (if available).

Figure

Ensure that each illustration has a caption. Supply captions separately, not attached to the figure. A caption should comprise a brief title (not on the figure itself) and a description of the illustration. Keep text in the illustrations themselves to a minimum but explain all symbols and abbreviations used.

Tables

Every table should have a caption. Headings should be placed above tables, left justified. Only horizontal lines should be used within a table, to distinguish the column headings from the body of the table, and immediately above and below the table. Tables must be embedded into the text and not supplied separately. Below is an example which the authors may find useful.

Equations

Equations and formulae should be typed in Mathtype and numbered consecutively with Arabic numerals in parentheses on the right-hand side of the page (if referred to explicitly in the text). They should also be separated from the surrounding text by one space.

4. Discussion

This should explore the significance of the results of the work, not repeat them. Discuss your data by comparing the current reported data with previous results, but avoid extensive citations and discussion of published literature. Highlight similarities, as well as differences, and the uniqueness of your findings. End the discussion by giving a conclusion and future research in that particular topic.

5. Conclusions

The main conclusion of the study may be presented in a short Conclusions section, which may stand alone. It should not repeat the Results, but instead provide significant findings and contributions to the study.

Acknowledgments

Provide acknowledgments accordingly. List here those individuals or institutions who gave help, and assistance during the research (e.g., providing grants, laboratory facility, writing assistance, or proofreading the article, etc.). In the case of the grants, please provide the number and year of the grant received.
