

Trade Unions for Energy Democracy (TUED) is a growing global network of unions working to advance democratic control and social ownership of energy, in ways that promote pro-public solutions to the climate crisis, energy poverty, resists the degradation of both land and people, and responds to the attacks on workers' rights and protections.

What Does TUED Do?

TUED delivers hard-hitting research and analysis, the aim of which is to help unions develop a strong and independent voice on energy transition and climate change—a voice that is firmly grounded in the facts and resolute about defending workers' interests and building a better world.

TUED strives to advance a vision for energy transition and climate protection that is rooted in the idea of public goods, and to build political support across the 200-million strong global labor movement for energy to be fully public and democratically accountable low carbon energy systems.

Our analysis shows the urgent need to pursue a public pathway that reclaims the energy sector and creates the conditions for a planned "just energy transition" for workers that is socially progressive and ecologically effective.

How Does A Union "Participate" in the TUED Network?

Unions currently "participate" in TUED; they do not affiliate. TUED asks unions to comply with the following:

- 1) The decision to participate in TUED must be formal, made by the union's appropriate decision-making body (be it national, regional, or at branch/local level). Copy this form, fill it out and email it back to us to confirm your union's participation.
- 2) Unions agree to have its name and logo visible on the TUED website.
- 3) Designate a person (and a named alternate, if possible) to receive TUED communications and to represent the union at TUED Global Forums (approximately every two months).
- 4) If finances permit, make a financial contribution. Roughly 35 unions have made contributions to TUED, and a growing number contribute on an annual basis. There is no fixed "membership fee." Contributions can be wired or mailed.

TUED Highlights from 2021 & 2022:

- October 2022: Convened a three-day international meeting with 70 trade unionists and allies in Nairobi, Kenya, titled: <u>Towards a Public Pathway Approach to a Just Energy Transition for the Global South</u> to launch "TUED South". View the Summary <u>here</u>.
- October and November 2021: Partnered with energy unions in France (FNME-CGT) and Public Services International (PSI) to develop and launch the <u>Trade Union Program for a</u> <u>Public Low-Carbon Energy Future</u>. More than 50 unions have signed on, including eight national centers. Contact us if your union wants to sign on.
- **February 2021**: Convened a 30-union Trade Union Task Force for a Public Energy Future. Forthcoming: Report of the Task Force, *A Public Pathway Approach to Energy Transition* Completion of work will be supported by PSI and Transnational Institute. Anticipated completion in early 2023

Why We Need Union Support

TUED is sustained by union contributions, but we need more unions to support our work. Financial support from unions is crucial not only *operationally* for the continued functioning and existence of the project, but also *politically*, to show union support for TUED's work in assisting the development of union responses to the climate crisis from a public pathway approach toward a just energy transition.

A decade ago, during its start-up phase, TUED received crucial support from a few progressive foundations aimed at helping TUED move toward a sustainable funding model based on union contributions alone. To date, 35 unions have made contributions, and a growing number make annual commitments.
