COURSE CURRICULUM

<u>COURSE DESCRIPTION</u>: AP Seminar is the first course in the AP Capstone experience and an opportunity for students to engage in rigorous, interdisciplinary study of a focused Social Studies topic. Students use an inquiry framework to explore a variety of disciplinary texts and artifacts, synthesize information, develop their own perspectives and communicate through written and oral presentations, both independently and collaboratively. Ultimately, the course aims to equip students with the power to analyze and evaluate information with accuracy and precision in order to craft and communicate evidence-based arguments, through a focused exploration of a Social Studies topic.

Per College Board policy, classroom teachers will be responsible for scoring the Team Multimedia Presentation (TMP) and Individual Multimedia Presentation (IMP); however, these scores are *not* shared with students.

The work that students complete during second semester will primarily be in completion of the required performance tasks that constitute 55% of a student's overall AP Score. Their grade for second semester, however, will be based on the assessment of students' performance in a variety of in-class activities that support students' preparation, practice and processing of materials needed to complete the performance tasks.

- Individual and Group Assessment: In general, students are assessed on their
 individual performance of identified skills. However, student groups receive a
 single score on the Team Multimedia Presentation (TMP); this practice will be
 followed in the Unit 3 (Modified TMP) Assessment as well. Student groups will be
 able to revise their Unit 3 Assessments as needed, as per course guidelines.
- Late Work: Due to the nature of the course and the expectations and deadlines
 established by the College Board, <u>all Unit Assessments and Performance</u>
 <u>Tasks must be submitted by the stated due date</u>. Students who have excused
 absences from school must communicate with their teacher and are expected to
 submit assignments upon their return.
- AP Capstone Policy on Plagiarism and Falsification or Fabrication of Information: A student who fails to acknowledge the source or author of any and all information or evidence taken from the work of someone else through citation, attribution or reference in the body of the work, or through a bibliographic entry, will receive a score of 0 on that particular component of the AP Seminar and/or AP Research Performance Task. In AP Seminar, a team of students that fails to properly acknowledge sources or authors on the Team Multimedia Presentation will receive a group score of 0 for that component of the Team Project and Presentation.

A student who incorporates falsified or fabricated information (e.g. evidence, data, sources, and/or authors) will receive a score of 0 on that particular component of the AP Seminar and/or AP Research Performance Task. In AP Seminar, a team of students that incorporates falsified or fabricated information in the Team Multimedia Presentation will receive a group score of 0 for that component of the Team Project and Presentation.
