Creating and Submitting your OWN Educational Resources to HSHRF

Earn 5 volunteer/service hours per resource!

Eligibility:

- Must be a <u>high school student</u> in grades (9-12) to submit resources and gain volunteer hours with us
- International high school students are permitted to submit and gain volunteer hours with us

Benefits:

- Gain 5 volunteer/service hours per resource for creating good-quality, meaningful educational resources relevant to the health research community
- See your name published on the HSHRF platform under the resources tab (unless you indicate that you want your resource to by made by anonymous)
- Educate others on your topics of interest!

Guidelines:

- This is an <u>individual</u> activity. Work on creating a resource by <u>yourself</u>.
 Teams of more than one student are not permitted and you will automatically not be qualified for volunteer hours.
- All submissions need to be sent through email in the resource's <u>ORIGINAL</u>
 Google Slides or Google Docs format, giving HSHRF editing access.
 PDFs or other formats will not be accepted

Resource Quality and Content

Content requirements

- We expect that all resources sent to us with a meaningful health research topic (we encourage that these are relevant and specific)
 - → Categories of topics can be broad or specific. Examples include sharing your personal research journey, research skills, or about a certain health/research topic WITHIN the health research field.
 - → Sample topics include:
 - 5 Tips to start your research journey from the perspective of a HS health researcher
 - What is research writing?
 - A guide for HS students Parts of a research paper.
 - A guide for HS students (in the health perspective)
 - Intersecting research and journalism under the umbrella of health
 - What is Logos Ethos Pathos in research?
 - How can I intern at a health-related institution as a high schooler?
 - How YOU can start your health research journey
 - How I Started my Health Research as a high schooler
 - How to make your health research unique "Niche health research topics that no one has mentioned"
 - What is APA? How do I do it? How do I cite?
 - How can I collaborate with peers around the world?
 - Note: Of course, it is encouraged that you come up with your own ideas!
- Length varies per slideshow, and there is no maximum requirement. However, we require a minimum of 5 slides and recommend 5-10 slides.
- Text must be free of grammar mistakes and any demeaning/disrespectful/ political content

Visual requirements

- Must be *mildly* visually appealing and organized

- <u>Disclaimer</u>: Visually, your resource does not need to look spotless or super artistic

How to submit your resource and gain hours:

- 1. After you have created your finished Google Docs or Google Slides, <a href="mailto:emailto:
- 2. In the body of your email, you must list your first name and last name, and the high school you attend in x city and y state (or your country if you are an international student).
- 3. Once you've sent your resource, submit the volunteer hours request form.
- 4. The HSHRF team will verify your hours in 1 week at the latest.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

- 1. Can I submit as many resources as I want to earn more volunteer hours?
 - A. The answer is yes! As long as you follow these directions carefully and submit good-quality resources, you may send as many resources to hshealthresearchforum@gmail.com and claim the volunteer hours you have earned for your hard work.

2. What if the topic I wanted to do is already taken or on the resources page already?

- A. You cannot just copy what has already been made on the hshrf.org/resources page. If you truly want to write about a topic that has been touched upon in another resource, try your best to find a topic or original idea that has not been done, or twist it
 - Example scenario: Let's say you wanted to create a resource about the topic of research questions but a resource on the HSHRF page was about the topic "Qualities of a good research question."
 Instead, you'd probably want to create a resource about "Discipline-Specific Research Question Topics"
