3. ____ blood (blud)	C. Movement to and from or around something.
4. ____ arteries (arr-tuh-reez)	D. An organ that pumps blood.
5. ____ veins (vay-ns)	E. A lower chamber in the heart.
6. ____ valve (val-v)	F. An upper chamber in the heart.
7. ____ atrium (ay-tree-uhm)	G. Red fluid that goes to all parts of the body through arteries and veins.
8. ____ ventricle (ven-trih-kuhl)	H. Blood vessels that carry oxygen full blood from the heart to different parts of the body.

Example

The word **atrium** comes from the Latin word “atrium”, which means “entrance room”.
The atrium is like the main room in the heart.
