The Role of Fluency in Second Language Reading Comprehension: Building Input and Language Experience for Learners

Reading L2 texts comprises a significant means of input and language experience for learners. Learners can use reading to obtain information from a variety of written sources and to interact as full interlocutors with other users of the language. Yet many with limited experience reading L2 texts read slowly and laboriously, likely because of poor word recognition skills. For these and for other reasons, the development of reading fluency has taken a position of growing importance in L2 reading research, and has emerged as a significant pedagogical and program issue. One method thought to increase reading fluency is repeated reading (RR) in which learners repeatedly read a 500-word text with an audio model in order to automatize lower level comprehension processes, and thus free learners' attentional resources to invoke higher order comprehension processes. RR has been shown to increase L2 learners' reading fluency and comprehension in studies in Japan and Vietnam (with English), and in the U.S. (with Japanese). Points of discussion are: 1. What reading fluency is; 2. What its role in reading comprehension is; 3. How to work with reading fluency in classrooms with adult learners; 4. How to find materials suitable for reading fluency development, and 5. How to implement reading fluency methodologies into language education programs.

Greta Gorsuch is a professor of applied linguistics at Texas Tech University. She has lived and taught in Japan, the Philippines, the United

States, and Vietnam, and has been teaching ESL/EFL for 32 years. Her research interests are in second language education, course evaluation, materials design, testing, reading and speaking fluency. Her articles on these topics have been published in TESOL Quarterly, English for Specific Purposes, System, Language Teaching Research, TESL-EJ, Reading in a Foreign Language, Asian EFL Journal, Journal of Faculty Development, Foreign Language Annals, Reading Matrix, Journal of Teaching English for Specific and Academic Purposes, Journal of Creative Practices in Language Learning and Teaching, and Educational Policy Analysis Archives. She is also author and editor of Tests that Second Language Teachers Make and Use (Cambridge Scholars Publishers), and co-author of Second Language Course Evaluation, and Second Language Testing for Student Evaluation and Classroom Research (Information Age Publishing). She has written original fiction for adult literacy learners and ESL learners, including Post Office on the Tokaido (Gemma Open Door); and The Bee Creek Blues, Lights at Chickasaw Point, and The Storm (The "American Chapters" series, Wayzgoose Press).

What we can learn about teaching online from organisations and teachers working in challenging contexts?

In the field of learning technologies we are usually pushing the boundaries, trying to see what is the next 'big thing', to find the perfect tool to support our teaching. At the same time worrying that tools like Al and robots will remove the need for language teachers. There are, at the same time, many places in the world where people are teaching languages in classes where there might be 80-90-150 learners (and more) where even the technology of the textbook is not normalised.

While I am very interested in the next 'big thing' and the future of technology supported language teaching, I have also always believed we should be much more mindful of the contexts we are working and the teachers and learners and what they know and understand about technology and use this as a starting point for anything we do.

Over the last few years, I have been working to support teacher development in a range of challenging contexts including Pakistan, refugee camps in Jordan and under-resourced contexts in sub-Saharan Africa. We have been exploring what might be considered low tech tools like WhatsApp and Zoom (before it became the synchronous technology of choice). This talk will then present some of what we have learned from these projects and will place this within the context of the field of education for emergencies which I believe has a lot to tell us in our Covid-19 afflicted world.

Exploring the potentials of Using Interactive Fiction Games in the ESL Classroom

Interactive fiction is a genre of video games that involves a non-linear narrative that can't be told without the interaction of the player. In interactive Fiction games, textual input is used as a means of communication with the game. This makes interactive fiction games potential tools for employing language tasks all over the gameplay (Perriera, 2018). In this session, the presenter will give examples of Interactive fiction games she created for her students using Quest Engine and how the students interacted with the game and how that also impacted their learning and vocabulary retention. The presenter will also discuss the potentials of integrating Interactive fiction games and the ESL

classroom and the possible challenges to ESL students and teachers as well.

Amany Alkhayat is a research assistant at the Gizmo EdTech Lab, TC Columbia University, and a Udemy Instructor. She's also the CEO of Linguatech Inc. She's the Technology Enhanced Language Learning SIG Founder and Chair at NYS TESOL, USA. Her research interests are focused on Technology in the classroom, designing technology assisted learning/intervention, using conversational agents/chatbots in the EFL/ESL Classroom, and Intelligent Tutoring systems. Her 2017 book chapter is in the edited volume, Teaching English Reflectively with Technology, by Dr. Hubbard and Dr. Ioannou-Georgiou and entitled Exploring the Effectiveness of Using Chatbots in the EFL Classroom. In 2017, She self-published a Kindle ebook, Become a Tech Savvy Teacher: A Comprehensive Guide to Using Technology and Improving Students' Scores.

DIGITAL STORYTELLING

This session provides an overview of digital storytelling and how it has been used for a college level course. The pedagogical aspects of walking students through the construction of a digital story will be discussed. Some examples of how students have incorporated multiple modes - texts, visual, audio and video, will be shown to invite responses from participants.

Suriati Abas is a visiting assistant professor of education at Hobart and William Smith Colleges. She has been involved with technology integration in K-12 schools for more than ten years. Her courses are mostly focused on new literacies, and understanding both theoretical and practical aspects of multiliteracies. She has published articles on the use of new technologies in classrooms in several peer-reviewed journals. She also has a book chapter written on digital storytelling. Contact her at abas@hws.edu

Maha Hassan Task-based story writing

This interactive presentation aims at improving Writing skills through Storytelling using task-based learning. Storytelling is an important element that helps students practice using the new vocabulary and grammar learnt and thus develop their Speaking skill. This can also be used to help students use the newly learnt items to develop their Writing skill as well, thus consolidating the final step of Bloom's Taxonomy 'Creating'.

Through this presentation I will engage the teachers in a sequence of tasks for writing a collection of short stories introducing the different elements for doing that using the vocabulary and grammar learnt through Graphic Organizers/App of Graphic Organizers and Thinking Maps. Thus help them become aware of the practical application and benefit of using Task-Based Learning in class.

Maha Hassan is an Educational Consultant, Teacher Trainer and Founder/Ceo of Teaching ESL Hub (formerly Maha ESL Community). She is also the Newsletter Editor for IP & SEN IATEFL SIG. She was nominated for Lead 5050 Women in International Education Award – WIE

Teaching CLIL (Content and Language Integrated Learning) remotely

CLIL (Content and Language Integrated Learning) is becoming more and more popular in Europe and in the world. Starting from the state of the art of CLIL in Italy, where it has been compulsory since 2010, the pillars of CLIL will be highlighted, mentioning the added value of some of the teaching techniques and strategies adopted in a CLIL environment.

The main challenges linked to COVID-19 emergency will be mentioned, providing suggestions, links, repositories and webtools that could be useful to teach CLIL remotely during these unprecedented times.

Letizia Cinganotto is a full time Researcher at INDIRE (National Institute for Documentation, Innovation and Educational Research), Italy. She holds a PhD in synchronic, diachronic and applied Linguistics and has far-reaching experience in continuous professional development for teachers and head teachers.

She is a member of different working groups and scientific committees on CLIL and languages both at national and international level (Italian Ministry of Education, European Commission, OCSE, Council of Europe, ECML).

She has presented papers at national and international conferences and published articles and chapters in peer-reviewed journals and recently three volumes on CLIL. She is a member of the ECML "Pluriliteracies" consultancy team.

Daniela Cuccurullo is Adjunct Professor of English and of didactics and multimedia teaching at the University of Naples, School teacher of English, teacher trainer, e-tutor, forum moderator and author of digital contents.

Engaged in research on teaching English as a second language through multimedia and CALL/MALL/MALU, she has presented papers at national and international conferences and is the author of essays on didactics and English literature, reviews and translations. DIG (Desert Island Game) is a free add-on English language activity, run through Whatsapp and Gdrive, which offers fun and collaborative ways of improving participants' English through the experience of teamwork. DIG is divided hierarchically into multi-lingual groups defined by CEFR levels, ranging from B1+ to C2+, whereby stronger gamers help weaker ones through up-down peer-to-peer support.

The gamers are young adults and adults who are either working towards Cambridge First, CAE, Proficiency or IELTS 7.5, using English as the only means of communication, written and spoken between them.

The interactions between groups are achieved through task-based initiatives, called traps, bombs or barrages, in which language based tasks are sent from one group to another in the form of a gap-fill or cloze, word transformation, essay writing, with special focus on listening and speaking through group discussion.

Daniel Foster da Silva has been an EFL teacher and entrepreneur for more than 35 years.

He is currently based in Catania, Sicily where he teaches at a private language school and is also a Cambridge Speaking Examiner. He has used blended learning approaches and platforms since early 2000



Samples of actual student learning experiences are demonstrated and/or shared with participants. Participants are encouraged to rethink their approach to a lesson, project, or training that they are planning to deliver and to reflect on the session.



In this symposium we will explore successful cases of using OpenSim in Language Teaching. OpenSim is the open source version of Second Life and used to be behind its big brother in visually appealing graphics design and performance. This is no longer the case. OpenSim has become a beautiful 3D world designed for education (in contrast Second Life is mainly commercial). It now is a true alternative to its expensive big brother. It is a user generated world and students and teachers can easily create 3D objects there.

Annalisa Di Pierro, Italy

In this presentation I will show how it is possible to use virtual worlds for an immersive teaching-learning according to a student-based approach. The reality of the class is expanded in Opensim through activities carried out in virtual worlds where the students become avatars and overcome physical and cognitive obstacles that can slow down the learning in the real lessons. The students can participate in an active and creative way enhancing their motivation and improving their competences.

Annalisa Di Pierro is a teacher of English at a Technical High School in Pisa, Italy, eTwinning ambassador, eTwinning group "Methodologies and Digital Tools" coordinator, teachers' trainer and expert in new methodologies and digital tools for education, Erasmus+ and eTwinning projects coordinator in her school.

As Chief Learning Officer at Billions of Us, he helps people change the way they learn and work in a world that has changed. Modern tools like Zoom and Slack do a great job at keeping us all connected, but we don't feel like we're with each other. Perceptually immersive virtual worlds give us back a sense of being with people in places, and John leverages this powerful concept at Billions of Us to teach organizations how to improve collaboration by increasing emotional bandwidth, empathy and creativity.

Teaching through not to the Machine.






