Podcasting



For Educators

Podcasting is a great way to provide PD (see Kent ISD's Podcast PDx) and an alternative way to provide communication and learning to your learning community.

For Students

Podcasting can be a great way to showcase learning. Transform that written report into a spoken podcast and share it with an authentic audience.

Recording Equipment



A good microphone helps you capture audio that is easy to understand and listen to.

Headphones are important for removing echo and preventing echo cancellation from making your audio copy.

Check out the <u>REMC Save bid</u> to get a good pair of headphones at a great price.



Interruptions happen but you should try your best to remove noisy devices, pets, and vents from your immediate recording area.

Recording & Editing Software

2 zencastr

A great tool when you need to record a conversation, but can't be in the same room. **Zencastr** captures separate audio tracks so you can fine-tune later.



The podcast feature on **WeVideo** lets you record, edit and produce with ease on any device.



For full-featured editing on PC, **Camtasia** is our go-to.

WeVideo has tracks that are free to use in your productions on their platform. It's great for saving your students time.



Uppbeat has a great selection of royalty-free music and sounds that you can use on your podcast.



Free Music Archive is a huge library of music across many genres. Watch for tracks with Creative Commons licenses.
