Kia ora ai te reo Māori Hei reo kōrero mō Aotearoa. Māori Language is a Living national taonga for all New Zealanders.

Our Aims:

- To grow our internal capacity in delivering Kapa Haka for our tamariki. To provide opportunities for the roopu to perform at festivals, powhiri, school events.the use of basic te reo Māori, waiata and Tikanga in a range of situations and integrate it into daily use in the classroom. To make this group accessible to all tamariki.
- To teach from level 1 of the curriculum and step into level 2 as we are able to within our teaching capabilities. <u>Objectives here.</u>
- To use Waiako as a rich resource, particularly in the junior classrooms.
- To recognise that teachers are also learners in this process and to provide as much PLD as possible to grow personal capacity.
- To incorporate a Māori perspective into our inquiry planning and school gatherings where possible. To include in our teaching the history of Aotearoa and our local history through the curation of stories unique to us.
- To ensure that Māori culture is valued in our school and that Māori children succeed as Māori. Guidance for all developments will be taken from Ka Hikitia, the Ministry of Educations strategy for empowering and revitalizing Māori culture and language in schools.

- To embed relationship based learning principles into our teaching. Building and growing cultural competency.
- To develop an environment that reflects our culture. Seen, heard, felt.
- To use the approach of tuakana/teina to assist learning across the school.
- To understand how we are connected to our environment and to use the model of Te Whare tapa Whā as our approach to holistic wellbeing.



- To appreciate and use the Māori principles and values alongside our pillars and dispositions, to understand how they are interconnected and complimentary.
- To ensure that Te Reo Māori is seen, heard and felt in our school.
- To bring to life the narratives of our place. To celebrate our place, establish connections and take action.
- To actively work together with whānau and key stakeholders to gather information about our school whakapapa and connect to our tūrangawaewae. Actively develop and visually represent a pepeha for our Kura.
- To recognise our vital role in the revitalisation strategy for Te Reo Māori and to actively work towards this as a team.
- We also have a commitment to assisting our community in their development through Te Reo Māori. We aim to have our school name and local places pronounced correctly. Jo Kake is working on a series of videos to grow community capacity. These can be found here and linked to via our blog.

Understanding that:

- 1. Languages are also vehicles of culture.
- 2. Languages mirror the way of life of the people who speak them.
- 3. Learning a language involves coming to understand and respect the values and culture of people.
- 4. That we play a key role in the revitalization of the language.
- 5. Languages are pathways for further learning and open doors to learning.


- Whanaungatanga (belonging)

2021 Current Focus:
