Weekly one-hour private lesson, building on the skills from Level 1. In Level 2 students will focus on refining fundamentals in scales and etudes, and level-appropriate repertoire, which will be performed for the jury at the end of the semester. Instructor Approval and completion of Viola - Level 2 (MUAP 1279) are required. Please contact Karoline Leal by email for approval to register and to schedule a lesson time.

Course Purposes & Instructional Methodology

The purpose of private lessons on viola is to develop proper technique to facilitate the student's ability to play high-level repertoire from both the classical canon and contemporary classical music. To accomplish this, we will cover many related skills, including the following:

- Developing good daily practice habits and techniques for improving core foundational skills on the instrument.
- Understanding different playing styles for distinct periods of music ie: baroque, classical, romantic, etc.
- Developing strategies for optimum performance in a variety of performing scenarios, with particular focus on solo and chamber music.
- Planning for the future, either in terms of career path or transferring to a 4-year university.
- Advising on the purchase of instruments or bows as deemed necessary for continuing personal advancement.

Required Textbooks & Other Useful Materials

- Student-owned or rented viola and bow in good playing condition.
- A chromatic tuner and metronome (can be app-based on a phone/iPad).
- Any assigned etude books, scale methods, and repertoire. These will vary according to the student. Some materials are in the public domain and may be accessed at www.imslp.org, others will require purchase.
- Black concert clothing for performances.

Student Learning Outcomes

The focus of this course is to continue working on facility in classical-style viola playing. At the beginning of the semester, objectives for the student will be discussed and laid out on an individual basis. Depending on coursework done in Level 1, some repertoire may be continued from the previous semester. At the end of the second semester of applied viola lessons, the student will be able to:

- Exhibit knowledge of fundamental techniques, including proper posture and adequate use of bow to play intermediate level pieces.
- Play with a reasonable sense of musicality, with understanding of phrasing and intonation.
- Perform competently in a solo setting with or without piano accompaniment.
- Be able to read treble clef fluently in appropriate contexts.
- Have mastered all foundational scales and arpeggios in two octaves and select keys in three octaves.
- Have played select etudes from the standard technique canon, such as *Kreutzer*, *Mazas*, *Sevcik* or *Wolfahrt*.
- Examples of repertoire that might be performed at this level are the *Bach Cello Suites (1-2)*, Classical or Baroque Sonatas such as the *Flackton Sonata in G Major* or *Eccles Sonata in G Minor*; and/or solo works with piano such as *Rachmaninoff Vocalise*, *Vivaldi Concerto in D minor*, *Vaughan-Williams Fantasia on Greensleeves* or *Bruch Kol Nidrei*.
- For students that are taking applied viola as a secondary instrument (and therefore only in their second year of playing), more basic repertoire may be considered appropriate. Works found in the *Suzuki* series books 3-4 would be acceptable.
- For transferring students, all solo works and concerto movements shall be memorized. Works played with piano or duet may be performed with or without music.

Program Learning Outcomes

The Student Learning Outcomes are associated with the following Program Learning Outcomes:

- Develop instrumental skills through coaching, pedagogy, and instruction.
- Develop performing skills through proper instruction on preparation, expression, and the practice of these skills through performance opportunities in and outside of ACC.
- Demonstrate the ability to communicate through musicality in performance.
- Develop the habits necessary to succeed as a professional musician, including but not limited to the conditions and demands they will face.

General Education Competencies

The General Education Competencies utilized in this course are as follows:

- *Communication Skills*. Students will develop, interpret, and express ideas through written, oral, visual, and sung communication that is adapted to purpose, structure, audience, and medium. They will do this through in-class exercises and performances, and reading and written assignments.
- *Critical Thinking*. Students will gather, analyze, synthesize, evaluate and apply information for the purposes of innovation, inquiry, and creative thinking and performance. They will do this through in-class exercises, performances, and reading and written assignments.
- *Personal Responsibility*. Students will identify and apply ethical principles and practices to decision-making by connecting choices, actions and consequences. They will do this through in-class exercises, performances, and reading and written assignments.
- *Teamwork*. Students will consider different points of view to work collaboratively and effectively in pursuit of a shared purpose or goal. They will do this through in-class exercises, performances, and reading and written assignments.

Grading

Your grade in this course will be determined by the following:

- Jury - 30% : an adjudicated performance at the end of the semester, where you perform at least one piece or portion of a piece that you have been preparing over the course of the semester for a panel of music department instructors. It will always be held the first Saturday in December (Fall) or first Saturday in March (Spring). Students are expected to dress appropriately in nice clothes

and show up in advance of their scheduled jury time. Students are also to fill out their jury form at least a week before their jury date.

- Lessons - 60%: attendance at your weekly lesson is mandatory.
- Preparation - 20%: if you consistently show up to lessons unprepared or having not practiced sufficiently, your grade will be lowered. Generally speaking, you should be practicing at least 90 minutes a day at Level 2. You will be expected to come to each lesson prepared on the assigned material and, if at all possible, warmed up on your instrument for thirty minutes or more prior to the start of the lesson.

Attendance

Like a foreign language, learning an instrument requires daily practice and consistent oversight, of which lesson attendance and personal practice time are crucial. Therefore, students are expected and required to attend every weekly lesson in the semester. Perfect attendance (no unexcused absences) is essential to receive an "A." Being over 10 minutes late to a lesson 3 times will be counted as an absence. After 3 missed lessons – excused or unexcused – your grade will drop by one letter.

Excused absences include the following: course-related field trips; illness that is documented by a doctor's note; death or serious illness in the immediate family as verified by someone other than the student; appearance in court; co-curricular and extracurricular activities recognized and/or sponsored by the College; or another extraordinary reason as deemed appropriate. To be excused, students are required to notify me at least 24 hours in advance of the absence, and earlier if possible. Unexcused absences will result in a lowered grade. In the event that I have a performance or other professional obligation, I will make arrangements with you to reschedule your lesson at a mutually convenient time.

All students registered in applied lessons are required to attend a minimum of 10 Friday Noon Recitals every Friday 12 noon - 1 pm during the semester in the Highland Recital Hall (2.2560). These recitals will be a mixture of student performances, faculty performances, and seminars of interest to Music students with guest speakers and artists. Students are required to attend a minimum of 10 Friday Noon Recitals per semester. Students will receive a semester schedule of these at the first Friday class meeting.

Communication. Students must check their email at least once per school day, and reply to the instructor within 24 hours. Please use appropriate and professional language in all communications with ACC faculty, and your peers. I will happily provide instruction or guidance on professional communication.

Dropping/Withdrawing. It is the student's responsibility to initiate all withdrawals in this course. The instructor may withdraw students for excessive absences (4) but makes no commitment to do this for the student. You may withdraw, or drop from a 16-week course with a grade of W any time on or before the end of the 12th week in the fall or spring 16-week session. Shorter semesters have prorated drop dates. If you drop a course before its census date, or official reporting date, the course is deleted from your enrollment, does not earn any grade, and does not appear on your transcript. If you drop a course after the

census date, a grade will be included on your transcript. Missed Exams & Late Work. Deadlines in my course are firm. I give you a course calendar at the beginning of the term that includes all deadlines for the course. Should a deadline change, I will inform you in writing and in person. Here are some rules of thumb to go by:

- *I forgot to complete an assignment. Can I make it up?* Written assignments are accepted up to 48 hours late, with a grade penalty. Projects, Group Projects and Presentations will not be accepted late. Please be very aware of your partners in group projects.
- *I missed an activity that we completed during class. Can I make it up?* No, there is no way to make up an in-class activity.
- *I missed a quiz, can I make it up?* No, quizzes and tests are not accepted late.

Incomplete Grade. If a student is unable to complete the course at the end of the semester due to an emergency or other unanticipated circumstance, I will consider awarding an incomplete grade for the semester. A new completion date will be given to the student, but it may not be later than the final withdrawal date in the subsequent semester. When the student completes the required work by the deadline, I will submit a form to change the student's grade from an incomplete to the earned grade. If an incomplete is not resolved by the deadline, the grade will automatically convert to an F.
