This section should be written clearly in Baskerville Old Face 12pt, justified, 1.5 spaces. The results should be presented in a continuous flow, starting from the main findings to the supporting ones. All units of measurement must adhere to the applicable international system. Diagrams, tables, images, and graphs may be included, accompanied by explanatory narratives.

This section includes: patient demographic description, medical history. Diagnostic assessment, symptoms and signs, treatment or intervention, follow-up and other important detailed results. Ethical approval and consent to participate. [Baskerville 12pt, justified, 1.5 spaces]

DISCUSSION

This section presenting rare or important cases, discussion related to the case. How the results of the case report contribute to the development of science. It should discuss the findings by comparing the current data with those from previous studies, incorporating relevant facts, theories, and opinions. No statistical or mathematical symbols should be included. The discussion should focus on addressing the research hypothesis, highlighting the similarities, differences, or uniqueness of the findings. Reasons behind these findings should be thoroughly explored. The implications of the results should be outlined

to clarify their impact and contributions to the field of study. The section should conclude by acknowledging the limitations of the research.

Case resport results are presented in the form of graphs, tables, or descriptive. Analysis and interpretation of these results is required before they are discussed. The table is written in the middle or at the end of each descriptive text of research results/acquisitions. If the width of the table is not enough to be written in half a page, it can be written a full page. Table titles are written from left to right, all words are capitalized, except for conjunctions. If more than one line is written in single space. For example, it can be seen in Table 1.

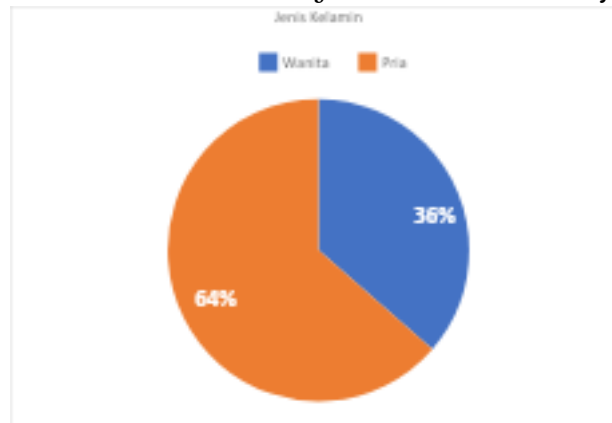
