What were the IMMEDIATE RESPONSES?

- 1. The president televised a warning.
- The authorities evacuated 800,000 people. Many sought refuge in an indoor stadium in Tacloban. BUT although this has had a reinforced roof to withstand typhoon winds they died when it was flooded.
- The government ensured essential equipment and medical supplies were sent out BUT in one region these supplies were washed away.
- 4. Emergency aid supplies arrived three day later by plane BUT only once the airport was reopened.
- 5. It was a week before power was restored in some regions and partially in others.
- 6. Within two weeks, over one million food packs and 250,000 litters of water were distributed.
- 7. A curfew was imposed two days after Typhoon Haiyan to reduce looting.
- 8. Thirty-three countries and international organisations pledged help, with rescue operations and an estimated US \$ 88.871 million. Celebrities such as the Beck hams, The X Factor and larger multinational companies and organisations, such as Coca-Cola, Wal-Mart, Apple and FIFA donated and used their status and influences to raise awareness and public donations.
- 9. More than US \$1.5 billion was pledged in foreign aid.

What were the LONG-TERM RESPONSES?

- In July 2014, the Philippine government declared it was working towards the country's long-term recovery.
- 2. 'Build Back Better' is the intention that buildings would not just be rebuilt, but upgraded and therefore protected in the event of future disasters.
- 3. A 'no build zone' along the coast in Eastern Visayas so part of the coast is allowed to flood naturally
- 4. A new storm surge warning system to ensure evacuation in time and public awareness
- 5. Mangroves replanted so their roots stabilise the coastal area and they act as a barrier for the surge
- 6. Plans to build the Tacloban-Palo-Tanuan Road Dike- a ridge of higher land that also acts as a dam to the surge but keeps traffic above it.

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
