English Language Arts	Math
Lesson One: Letter R - Click here for a Video on writing the letter "R" - Find things around your house that begin with the letter R. - Have your child practice writing the letter "R" each day on paper or other surface. - Complete pages 50-51 in the Handwriting Without Tears workbook. *Remember to start the letter at the top (see the video above for how to correctly form letter) - If you have playdough, practice building the letter R by rolling out playdough to make a big line, little curve and little line. Lesson Two: Name Writing - Practice writing your name. You can write on paper, with chalk on the ground, a stick in the dirt, on a magna doodle, etc. - Spread white foam shaving cream or pudding on a table so that it covers a section of the table big enough to write their name. Practice writing their name with their finger in it. - Use magnetic letters to spell your name. - Work on your last name if the first name is too easy.	Lesson One: 2D Shapes -Triangle Important words to know or use: sides, vertices Tell your child there are 3 vertices(points) and 3 sides on a triangle. - Build a triangle out of something (toothpicks, pipe cleaners, sticks, etc.) - Draw a triangle on paper. - Find something in your house that is shaped like a triangle. - Here is a good video about shapes: Jack Hartman Shapes Lesson Two: Oral counting 1-30 Here is a video about counting: "Surprise Eggs Count to 30" Easter Egg Video, 123 Counting, Numbers Song, Kids Learning Rhyme - Have your child practice counting aloud to 30. Help them if they need help. - Do 30 Jumping jacks counting each time you jump. - Count each step as you walk 30 steps. With each step count, "1, 2, 3..." all the way to 30!
Science	Social Studies
Lesson: Observe changes in the sky Important words to know or use: day, night, clouds, sun, moon, stars, dark, light - Talk to your child about the differences in night and day. Ask these questions: What do you see in the sky during the daytime? What do you see at night? - Draw a picture of the day time and a picture of the nighttime. - Watch this video: Night to Day Time Lapse Video	Lesson: Rules & Procedures for Learning at Home - Come up with rules that will help your child be a successful learner at home! - Keep the rules short and simple (5 rules or less) - You can add physical movements to help them remember the rules, such as: - Helping Hands (hold your hands in front of you) - Listening Ears (tug on one earlobe) - Quiet Voices (put your finger to your lips) - Eyes Looking (point to your eyes)
