11:45am - 1:15pm | *Plenary #2* – The Signs of the Times challenge our Liturgical Life – *Lex orandi, lex credendi, lex vivendi*

The signs of the times of the ecological crisis have acquired the proportion of no less than a new geological epoch, the Anthropocene, interrogating profoundly the attention provided by liturgy to the created world and the mystery of Creation. The "Lex orandi, lex credendi, lex vivendi" axiom will be assessed, while proposing Southern and Eastern insights to enrich the exploration of the new feast, given that Christians from those regions are most attuned to Creation and suffer the harshest impacts of the ecological crisis. Attention will also be given to inadequate liturgical inculturation, still excessively Western in most regions.

"Creation Day" has gained much popularity in recent decades, but what should be its official title in liturgical books so as to merit the status of a liturgical feast/festival? This panel of liturgical theologians from various denominations will discuss both the Christological nature of the liturgical year and the Trinitarian dimension of the mystery of Creation, to then discern the question about the framing and title of the new liturgical feast/festival, particularly the articulation of its Christological-Trinitarian dimensions and of the different meanings of the word 'Creation' (the mystery of God's creative act and the created world).

A. This Feast's Ecumenical Significance: Unprecedented since 1456? – Historical Lessons and Opportunities for Unity

This Feast process has very few precedents in history, particularly after the 1054 schism. While there are comparable initiatives such as those of the common Western lectionaries (1960s - 1970s) and of the common Easter date (currently underway), the most recent precedent of a new liturgical feast that is shared across East and West probably is the Feast of the Transfiguration in 1456. Ecumenists from various traditions will discuss the ecumenical significance and opportunities of this Feast of Creation process.

C. Creation Day, the Season of Creation, and Ecumenical Action

Most denominations are already active in celebrating the Season of Creation (Sept 1 - Oct 4) that flows from Creation Day, so this workshop will be an opportunity to introduce the season and plan joint action during the larger season this year, with tangible resources and ideas for the Christian family to raise a prophetic voice to care for creation. A reference will be made to the similar nature of the Season of Creation and the "Week of Prayer for Christian Unity" – ecumenical observances that are not part of liturgical calendars, but are grounded in and inspired by liturgical feasts.

C. The 'Via Creationis', Science, and Creation Day – From conflict to harmony

With the backdrop of the turbulent history of the faith-science dialogue, this session will explore how Creation Day is helping (or could help) navigate that complex dialogue. In particular, this session will introduce and explore the 'Via Creationis' (also known as 'The Way of Creation'), a devotional practice that is becoming increasingly popular in Creation Day celebrations, inspired by the 'Via Crucis' while helping satisfy the pastoral need for deeper reflection on Creation and the compatibility of faith and science.

"Creation Day" has been traditionally celebrated on September 1st (or on the subsequent Sunday) in recent decades, in line with its symbolism as the liturgical feast that opens the Eastern Orthodox church year. This session will explore the question about the date of the feast/festival in other churches who will institute it in their respective liturgical calendars, i.e. if it should continue to be anchored on September 1st or if it should be anchored on the September equinox – or if other considerations are to be explored.
