Biography: Bond received an associate degree from Cascadia Community College, a bachelor's from the University of Washington, an M.B.A. from the Drexel University College of Business and Administration, and a J.D. from the University of Maine School of Law. Bond was president of FairTrade Vacations from 2005 to 2016. She was a family law attorney as of the 2022 election.

### KEY MESSAGES

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Bond criticized political bickering and campaign ads. She asked supporters to invest in the community while mentioning her campaign instead of donating to her campaign.

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Bond said she would enjoy reading proposed legislation for a living: "Hire me to devote my work week to turn nonsense into common sense."

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Bond said climate change and healthcare were among her priorities. On

Biography: Golden served tours in Iraq and Afghanistan as a Marine. He graduated from Bates College. Golden worked as a staffer for Sen. Susan Collins (R-Maine) on the Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee.

### KEY MESSAGES

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Golden noted that he was the only House Democrat to vote against the Build Back Better Act. He said, "I have voted against the Biden administration more than any other Democrat in Congress. I voted against my own party more than any other Democrat in Congress."

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Golden said he'd worked to pass the 2021 infrastructure bill, lower prescription drug prices for seniors, prevent healthcare cost spikes, and increase oil and gas production.

Biography: Poliquin received a bachelor's degree from Harvard University. He owned several businesses and managed pension funds. Gov. Paul LePage (R) recommended Poliquin as state treasurer, and the legislature selected him for the position.

### KEY MESSAGES

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Poliquin said, "If you want to make a change, I represent that difference. We will stop this out-of-control spending to drive down inflation, we will reopen the supplies of oil and natural gas ... and we will secure our border to make sure we take care of America first."

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Poliquin said, "Biden and all Democrats created this mess" of inflation and that "Maine needs a congressman who will stand up to Biden and help Maine families."

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the latter, she said, "Let's update and improve the ACA [Affordable Care Act] while we thoughtfully consider and CBO [Congressional Budget Office] score a few models – there may be elements of single-payer, universal, market features, and/or things we haven't come up with yet."

Craven's background in care for disabled adults and volunteer experiences with hospice work informed her recent bills to eliminate the waiting list for older and disabled Mainers who are eligible to receive home-based care. She also spearheaded an act to create a Rare Disease Council.

Born in Ireland, Craven came to this country alone at the age of 17. Married and a working mother, she earned a bachelor's degree in social services and a master's degree in adult education at the University of Southern Maine.

Her work life in Lewiston included waitressing at Steckino's Restaurant, serving as a cashier at Cottle's supermarket and ultimately becoming the director of respite care at John F. Murphy Homes.

Her volunteer work over the decades has made her a recognized figure in every corner of L/A, from dancing the Irish jig at nursing homes on St. Patrick's Day and ushering at the The Public Theatre in Lewiston to serving on many community boards, including as chairwoman for Museum L-A, vice chairwoman of the Maine Hospice Council and as a member of the Historic Preservation Review Board of the city of Lewiston and the board of trustees for the Lewiston Public Library.

Another focus for McCarthy will be more support from the state for service center cities such as Lewiston.

"These cities provide services and host a multitude of nonprofit organizations that also benefit the surrounding communities while adding to the burden of taxpayers in these service center cities," he said.

McCarthy is also a member of the board of directors for the Auburn-Lewiston Municipal airport. He formerly served as the president of the Lewiston High School swim boosters as well as the boys soccer boosters.

consider it a success when I can get them passed. When we are successful funding schools or education, balancing the budget without harming anyone, and passing bills that I am proud to sponsor or co-sponsor I consider it a success.

\$2.6 billion in federal aid dries up. Balancing the budget without raising taxes or dipping into the Rainy Day fund will be another measure of success.

A goal of mine is a Parents Bill Of Rights. Parents should have a voice in what their children are exposed to in our school systems. They need to have input into the curriculum and be made aware of in advance of what their children will be taught.

The housing shortage is another area that needs to be focused on. Successfully addressing this issue will temper the skyrocketing cost of rent, keep more financially stressed individuals in their homes and provide more rental options.

The high cost of building public housing needs to be looked at. Projects in Lewiston cost upward of \$350,000 per unit to build.

Creation of programs to address the homeless crisis facing Lewiston and other cities around the state is another problem area that needs serious attention. Mental health issues and substance abuse are the main drivers of homelessness and intensive outreach programs to help those in trouble are needed.

What would be your top priority as district attorney if elected?

The top priority for any district attorney must be public safety. It is what the people elect them to do, and it is what I have been doing for more than 15 years now. I will continue to work collaboratively with law enforcement, and I will continue to build bridges into the community to establish relationships and locate resources to effectively combat crime. To ensure the greatest degree of public safety possible, my office will balance holding people accountable for criminal conduct, as well as collaborate on alternative sentencing and treatment whenever appropriate to address root causes of criminal behavior.

Would you support dismissing all nonviolent misdemeanor charges against defendants in Androscoggin, Franklin and Oxford counties in order to reduce the backlog of criminal cases docketed in those counties? Why/why not?

I would not. The Legislature enacts laws. The people do not elect a DA to disregard them. Such a policy has too great a potential to embolden criminals, increase crime, erode public confidence, destabilize public civility, and diminish public safety. This would be object failure of responsibility to the public.

If not, what measures would you support to bring down the caseloads?

We need a collaborative effort. Courts need to provide more time for hearings, trials and limit repeated continuances. Prosecutors

New Beginnings in Lewiston. I am an avid runner having run hundreds of races and competed in several triathlons over 20 years.

What would be your top priority as district attorney if elected?

1. New ways to break the cycle of domestic violence with intervention programs. Rates of domestic violence cases are unchanged in my 35 years in practice. Giving survivors a unified message that the abuser is at fault. 2. Getting all offenders into real substance use treatment earlier. Many clients have 10-20 convictions when they come to me. Almost all have addictions. The revolving door of jail is very expensive. 3. Taking the taxpayer into account when making policy decisions. New \$125 million jails are not the taxpayers' responsibility. 4. Bail reform: Minor offenders sitting in jail at huge taxpayer expense.

Would you support dismissing all nonviolent misdemeanor charges against defendants in Androscoggin, Franklin and Oxford counties in order to reduce the backlog of criminal cases docketed in those counties? Why/why not?

I support an immediate review of these cases and would work to resolve them quickly. Some can be dismissed. Some can be easily resolved by plea. This is not difficult to achieve. This backlog costs taxpayers millions of dollars across the state. The DA must be

need a stricter screening process where every case receives immediate scrutiny rather than blanket dismissals after approval. Where appropriate, we need substantive discussions between parties focused on early disposition of cases.

Would you support as district attorney not seeking cash bail for defendants charged with nonviolent misdemeanor crimes, and why?

Generally, nonviolent misdemeanors receive summonses. The rare instance an arrest occurs, usually results in a no-cash personal recognizance bail. On Oct. 7, Androscoggin County jail housed 147 inmates. Zero being held solely based on nonviolent misdemeanors. Suggesting people are regularly held on nonviolent misdemeanors and low bail is false.

mindful of the taxpayer.

If not, what measures would you support to bring down the caseloads?

People sit in jail long past any sentence they would have received if the courts were not clogged. Time-served sentences in these cases is the responsible taxpayer thing to do. Offering defendants reasonable pleas at their initial appearance will slash the backlog. No more felony indictments for minor nonviolent offenses.

Would you support as district attorney not seeking cash bail for defendants charged with nonviolent misdemeanor crimes, and why?

I support this. Taxpayers waste millions on this problem. People can be getting treatment and doing community service. People don't fail to show up for court concerned about losing \$100 bail. They don't show up because of severe substance use and mental health issues. Fix that and we have less victims and save millions.

The voters in each of Maine's 16 counties elect three, five or seven commissioners to four year terms to oversee the operation of county government. Each commissioner serves a separate district within the county. Commissioners are the counties' chief elected officials, are ultimately responsible for the fiscal operations and policy decisions affecting county government. Additional duties include municipal tax abatement appeals and hearings on maintenance of town roads. They also serve, in effect, as the municipal official in Maine's many unorganized territories.
