

# 1. A Bill to Provide Recurring Stimulus Payments

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2 SECTION 1. United States taxpayers will receive recurring stimulus checks until Congress has  
3 determined that COVID-19 is sufficiently under control to warrant tapering or complete elimination of  
4 recurring payments.

5 SECTION 2. United States taxpayers and their families who were eligible for earlier coronavirus  
6 stimulus checks will be eligible for recurring stimulus payments as determined by the Internal Revenue  
7 Service.

8 SECTION 3. All eligible U.S. adult citizens will receive \$1000 stimulus checks each month and each  
9 eligible child of U.S. adult citizens will receive \$500 stimulus checks each month.

10 SECTION 4. The Department of the Treasury and the Internal Revenue Service shall oversee  
11 implementation of this legislation.

12 SECTION 5. This legislation takes effect immediately.

13 SECTION 6. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## **2. A Bill for Worldwide Vaccine Distribution**

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2 SECTION 1. The United States will share 25% of its surplus vaccine stock through direct donations and  
3 share another 25% of its surplus vaccine stock through COVAX's multi-lateral pool.

4 SECTION 2. Surplus stock consists of vaccine supplies that are above-and-beyond that needed to fully  
5 vaccinate the United States' population with one or two shots, based upon the vaccine's dosage for full  
6 vaccination. Stock for a third booster shot may not be pulled from the portion of the surplus designated  
7 for donation.

8 SECTION 3. The Department of State and the Department of Health and Human Services will oversee  
9 the distribution of vaccine surpluses.

10 SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect immediately.

11 SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

### **3. A Resolution to Prohibit the Use of "No Knock" Warrants**

1. **WHEREAS**, "no knock" warrants often elicit confusion and disarray amongst both
2. civilians and police officers; and
3. **WHEREAS**, in recent years there have been numerous instances of "no knock" warrants
4. resulting in death or injury to unarmed civilian or a police officer; and
5. **WHEREAS**, there is no uniformity in how individuals working under law enforcement
6. agencies across the United States can be held accountable for injuries or deaths caused in
7. correlation with the use of a "no knock" warrant; be it
8. **RESOLVED**, that the Congress assembled shall ban the use of "no knock" warrants
9. within the United States.

## **4. A Resolution to Encourage Municipal Ownership of Internet Services**

1 WHEREAS the U.S. Senate passed a bipartisan infrastructure package with \$65 billion for Internet  
2 connectivity; and

3 WHEREAS consumer advocacy groups argue that cities should build their own Internet services to  
4 expand connectivity nationwide; and

5 WHEREAS municipal broadband is that which is partially or fully owned by local governments; and

6 WHEREAS municipal broadband is not motivated by profits but by providing services to its residents;  
7 and

8 WHEREAS the original American Jobs Plan included the promotion of competition by eliminating  
9 “barriers that prevent municipally-owned or affiliated providers and rural electric co-ops from  
10 competing on an even playing field with private providers”; and

11 WHEREAS the digital divide must be narrowed; now, therefore be it

12 RESOLVED by the Congress here assembled that municipal development and ownership of Internet  
13 services should be encouraged and that individual states should support the efforts of municipalities,  
14 including, but not limited to, easing regulatory burdens or eliminating outright bans of municipal  
15 Internet ownership.

## **5. A Bill to Provide Wildfire Aid**

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2 SECTION 1 Aid will be provided to Algeria, Greece, and Turkey to combat wildfires.

3 SECTION 2. \$10 billion in aid may be in the form of direct payments, firefighting supplies and 4  
equipment, personnel, or some combination thereof.

5 SECTION 3. The Department of State will oversee the distribution of funds and enforcement of this  
6 legislation.

7 SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect immediately.

8 SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## 6. A Bill to Ban Law Enforcement From Lying to Minors in Interrogations

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1           **SECTION 1.**   Police will no longer be allowed to deceive minors during  
2           interrogations to provoke a confession in order to promote the reliability of  
3           youth witness testimonies.

4           **SECTION 2.**   Minor being defined as a person under the age of 18, and  
5           deceive being defined as lying performed by an officer or interrogating  
6           personnel to provoke a confession.

7           **SECTION 3.**   The implementation of this piece of legislation will be  
8           enforced by the Department of Justice (DoJ).

9           A. The DoJ will ensure this is enforced by regulating the education of  
10          interrogation methods to local law enforcement officials both in  
11          training and currently active.

12          B. To ensure full enforcement of this piece of legislation, interrogation  
13          sessions will be recorded to ensure interrogation principles are upheld.

14          **SECTION 4.**   This legislation will take effect at the beginning of the 2022  
15          fiscal year.

16          **SECTION 5.**   All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared  
            null and void.

## **7. A Bill to Support Climate-Vulnerable Island Nations**

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2 SECTION 1. Create an Island Nation Fund of \$100 billion for climate-vulnerable independent  
3 coastal

4 states to take active measures to repair damage and protect states from climate change disasters.

5 SECTION 2. The Alliance of Small Island States (AOSIS) and its 39 member states will submit  
6 funding

7 and action proposals to an Island Nation Congressional Committee.

8 SECTION 3. The Department of State will oversee enforcement and distribution of the funds.

9 SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect immediately.

10 SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## **8. A Resolution to Support the Middle East**

1 WHEREAS President Biden's recent actions in Afghanistan have contributed to political, social, and  
2 economic turmoil in the Middle East; and

3 WHEREAS members of Congress from diverse political perspectives have expressed concern and  
4 regret over the methods and timing of withdrawal of remaining United States' forces and its allies in  
5 Afghanistan; and

6 WHEREAS the Taliban were unable to secure Kabul's airport resulting in casualties to United States'  
7 military personnel and our allies; and

8 WHEREAS Middle East political, social, and economic stability is essential to the interests of the  
9 United States and its allies; and

10 WHEREAS United States' efforts to combat terrorism remain long after our withdrawal from  
11 Afghanistan; and

12 WHEREAS the United States has troops stationed throughout the Middle East; and

13 WHEREAS there are United States' citizens, allies, and vulnerable populations who will remain long  
14 after August 31; now, therefore be it

15 RESOLVED by the Congress here assembled that we implore the Commander-in-Chief of the United  
16 States' Armed Forces to increase personnel and equipment for our allies in the Middle East, including  
17 but not limited to troop deployment on or near Afghan borders, and to provide a check against other  
18 states, including Syria and Iran, that consider our departure from Afghanistan as a signal that we are  
19 abandoning our allies in the Middle East.

## **9. A Bill to Regulate Graduate Schools**

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

2 SECTION 1. Establish caps for Grad Plus loan programs of \$50,000 for a master's degree and \$100,000  
3 for a terminal degree (e.g., M.F.A, J.D. Ph.D).

4 SECTION 2. Eliminate loan forgiveness programs that waive remaining debt after a 20 to 25 year  
5 payoff period.

6 SECTION 3. The Department of Education will oversee the enforcement of this legislation.

7 SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect January 1, 2023. Forgiveness programs for those who took  
8 out loans prior to January 1, 2022 will remain intact.

9 SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## 10. A Resolution to Address Concerns with COVAX

1 WHEREAS COVAX has distributed fewer than 200 million doses worldwide at the time of the writing  
2 of this resolution, far short of its goal of 640 million doses; and

3 WHEREAS some supplies of COVAX vaccines have expired prior to distribution in countries lacking  
4 infrastructure for cold storage, delivery, and distribution; and

5 WHEREAS all nations, both wealthy and non-wealthy alike, are affected by uncontrolled spread of  
6 COVID variants; and

7 WHEREAS the needs for each country vary in terms of the assistance needed and the specific type of  
8 vaccines required to address the most prominent variants of COVID affecting their region; and

9 WHEREAS some nations have a surplus of vaccines while others wait for months to gain access to  
10 life-saving vaccinations; and

11 WHEREAS as Dr. Ayoade Alakija, co-chair of the African Union’s vaccine delivery program, has stated,  
12 “Covax hasn’t failed, but it is failing. We really have no other options. For the sake of humanity, Covax  
13 must work”; now, therefore be it

14 RESOLVED by the Congress here assembled that COVAX concerns must be addressed by the  
15 governing officers, partners, and nations which contribute to its success. The United States is prepared  
16 to offer additional resources and personnel to the success of COVAX as these concerns are addressed.  
17 These concerns include, but are not limited to, 1) ensuring sufficient supplies and protection of vaccines;  
18 2) ensuring cold storage chains; 3) training of health professionals to administer the shots; 4) ensuring  
19 appropriate methods of deployment from delivery to distribution; 5) mobilizing people to attend  
20 vaccination centers, when vaccines are available; 6) combat social media disinformation and  
21 misinformation campaigns; 7) Work with the World Health Organization to create a roadmap for rapid,  
22 yet realistic, vaccination efforts worldwide.
