Finland's education system is thought by many people to be one of the best in the world.

- 1. How is Finland's system the same as or different from the one you grew up with?
- 2. What aspects do you think are good? Bad?
- 3. What questions would you like to ask a Finnish educator about their system?

## In Finland:

- 1. Children don't start school until age 7.
- 2. Children are not measured at all during the first 6 years of school. They only have a <u>centralized exam</u> once, at age 16.
- 3. All children, regardless of capability, are taught in one classroom with class assistants.
- 4. Elementary school students get 75 minutes of recess a day. They also get a 15-minute break after every lesson.
- 5. 66% of students go to college.
- 6. 43% attend <u>vocational</u> school. At age 16, students can decide to attend high school to prepare for university or to enter vocational training.

## **Teachers**

- 1. Teachers only spend 4 hours a day in the classroom. They take 2 hours a week for <u>professional development</u>.
- 2. All teachers must have a master's degree, which the government pays for.
- 3. The national curriculum is only a guideline. Teachers may decide the best educational methods for their students.
- 4. Teachers are <u>selected</u> from the top 10% of graduates.
- 5. Teachers are effectively given the same status as doctors and lawyers.
- 6. A teacher stays with the same group of students for five years.
