

AFSF Online Mentoring Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) 2022

Expectations and Recommendations for guiding youth remotely

Thank you for mentoring AFSF youth! Our students consistently say that personal interactions with design + build professionals is the most impactful aspect of our programs. You will have a profound effect on how they see a future for themselves in whatever they choose to pursue.

I. When would I mentor?

- A. For Summer 2022, we are seeking mentors for the following programs:
 - 1. Summer Design Institute: June 13 July 1 + July 11-29
 - mentor a student twice a week
 - two 3-week sessions (6 weeks total): a different student each session.

2. AFSF Build Antioch Summer Program:

- July 25 August 12: once a week for 4 weeks
- B. Each session is...
 - 1. one hour, online
 - 2. scheduled to match your availability with that of our participating students a) Evenings and weekends are possible.

II. Who can mentor? Anyone in the design + build world

- A. We welcome any professional working in architecture, engineering, construction trades, construction management, landscape architecture, interior design, graphic design or related fields.
- B. Mentors can work individually, in pairs, or as a team.
 - 1. Most mentors work alone
 - 2. We ask everyone to introduce their student(s) to some of their colleagues.

III. Who are these students?

- A. AFSF participants are typically high school students aged 14-18.
 - Spring Session and Summer Design students are high school students, mainly from the SF Bay Area. Some participate from across the US and around the world.
 - 2. AFSF-MYEEP and Future Grads interns are enrolled in SF high schools, and are from underserved communities.
 - 3. AFSF-Antioch participants are East Bay teens or transitional-aged youth (18-24) in high school, community college, or pre-professional programs.
- **IV.** What will I do with them? Mentoring a high school student with AFSF entails the following 3 (or 4) components:

A. Share your own professional experiences:

- 1. the field you're in, the scope of work you do
- 2. what a typical year / week / day looks like for you
- 3. the arc of your education and career
- 4. how you made your choices, lessons learned along the way

B. Introduce your intern to the specifics of your work and your firm

- 1. samples of projects you've completed and ones you are working on
- 2. samples of specific tasks / products
- 3. show / share tools (digital and otherwise).
- 4. scope and arc of project work within your firm
- 5. virtual tour / site visit of work space, work sites, completed projects
- 6. introduce others at the firm

C. Provide feedback on work the intern is doing with AFSF

- 1. digital designs
- 2. research projects
- 3. compiling their portfolio

D. OPTIONAL: Assign a small project or task(s) they can complete for you

- 1. work with images or files, labeling, etc.
- 2. graphic design, flier, map, etc.
- 3. design / sketching / modeling practice

V. How will mentoring take place?

- A. Mentoring will occur remotely, like all aspects of AFSF programming.
- B. Connect with your intern via the online platform you regularly use for work
 - 1. Zoom, Meet, Skype, BlueJeans, etc.
- C. You will send your student a link for them to connect with you.

VI. What other expectations are there?

- A. Model professional habits and behavior
 - 1. Communicate consistently with your student
 - a) e.g. if you need to reschedule a session
 - 2. Maintain professional and school-age-appropriate language & decorum
- B. Keep us updated on your student's progress
 - 1. Complete a SHORT weekly survey on their participation
- C. Show up to your student's final presentation, if you can
 - 1. Mid/late April: TBD
- D. Spread the word! We're always looking for more mentors for our youth.
