The article is typed in single spacing and the article must be in the range between **15-25** pages, not including title, abstract, keywords, and bibliography, on A4-paper size, with font of "Times New Roman" 12 pt with transliteration<sup>3</sup>.

In Introduction, authors should state the objectives of the work at the end of introduction section. Before the objective, authors should provide an adequate background, and short literature survey in order to record the existing solutions, to show the differences from previous researches, to show the main limitation of the previous researches, to show what you want to achieve or solve the limitation, to show the novelties of the paper, and to show theoretical construct (if needed) of the research. At the end, if the articles are results of a research, authors should state the methods used. Acronyms should be written out at their first appearance.

Table headings should be in 10 pt. Tables are referred in the text by the table number, e.g., Table 1. Do not show the vertical line in the table. There is only horizontal line should be shown in the table. Figures should, preferably, be included in the electronic version of the manuscript in an appropriate format as follows; JPG, PNG.
