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ABSTRACT (10PT)

1. Introduction (Spasi 1,15 Book Antiqua, 11 Pt)

The Introduction section should explain the background and significance of the issue addressed in the manuscript, particularly in the context of community welfare and community engagement. This section must clearly describe the social problem or community need that motivates the implementation of the program. The explanation should be supported by empirical data, field observations, or scientific evidence derived from relevant previous studies. The research problem should be formulated based on real conditions in society and presented objectively to demonstrate the urgency and relevance of the study.

Community engagement refers to activities that aim to serve society by applying knowledge and technology based on the authors' academic expertise in order to improve community capacity and promote sustainable community empowerment. In this manuscript, theoretical perspectives are integrated within the Introduction rather than presented in a separate section. The theoretical framework should be developed from credible academic sources such as peer-reviewed journal articles, scholarly books, and other scientific publications. In the context of social welfare studies, the primary theoretical perspectives should relate to community engagement, community development, social empowerment, or community service, while additional supporting theories may be incorporated to address specific community issues discussed in the study.

Furthermore, the Introduction must present the state of the art by reviewing relevant previous studies and community engagement initiatives in order to identify the research or practice gap. This discussion should highlight how previous studies have addressed similar issues and what limitations still remain. Based on this gap, the authors should clearly emphasize the novelty and contribution of the present study, explaining how the proposed community engagement activity provides new insights, approaches, or solutions to existing problems. Finally, the Introduction should explicitly state the purpose of the study and its expected contribution to community welfare and community development.

2. Method

The Methods section describes the procedures used by the authors to address the identified research or community problems. This section should clearly explain the location and time of the activity, the target population or participants, and the data used in the study. In addition, the methods section must provide a detailed description of the design and implementation of the community engagement program, including the stages of the activity, the techniques used for data collection, and the approach applied to achieve the program objectives. A clear explanation of these procedures ensures transparency and enables other researchers or practitioners to understand and potentially replicate the program in similar contexts.

3. Results and Discussion

Results and discussion contain results obtained by the author during the research. The results of the research are submitted in advance as a whole, which continues by doing the process of discussion. The discussion is presented systematically from general, then leads to the specific. Presentation of the research can be done with the help of tables, drawings/graphs, maps/plans, and schemes.

Results and discussion of your manuscript are also interconnected with your theory that was used, including the novelty of your manuscript about community engagement. Also, your manuscript is based on the result of your community engagement program and what is the implication of this community engagement program to the community. The minimum of your explanation in this chapter is range from 40% to 50% of your manuscript.

3.1 Section

The Introduction section must consist of at least three paragraphs. It should clearly present the research problem, supported by at least five relevant references, and the proposed solution, also supported by at least five relevant references. In addition, the Introduction must include the state of the art, the novelty of the study, and a comprehensive review of previous research with a minimum of twenty references. This review should highlight the development of existing studies and identify the research gap that the present study aims to address. The Introduction must also clearly state the research contribution, which represents the most important element of this section.

The research problem and the proposed solution must be stated clearly and explicitly. At least one research contribution must be articulated in the Introduction, for example: *"The contribution of this research is..."*. Furthermore, the references used in the manuscript must be

up to date, with at least 70% of the total references published within the last five years to ensure the relevance and timeliness of the study.

The manuscript should follow the IMRaD structure, which consists of the following main sections: Introduction, Method, Results and Discussion, and Conclusions. Each section should present the content in a logical and systematic manner. The Method section describes the procedures used to conduct the study or implement the community engagement program. The Results and Discussion section presents the findings of the study and provides an interpretation of the results in relation to existing theories and previous studies. Finally, the Conclusions section summarizes the main findings of the study and highlights their implications.

The manuscript must be organized into clearly defined sections, with sub-sections included when necessary to improve clarity and organization. Section titles must be written in title case and in bold, while sub-section titles must be written in sentence case and formatted in bold italics. All sections and sub-sections must be numbered consecutively and aligned to the left to maintain consistency and readability throughout the manuscript.

3.2 Figures And Tables

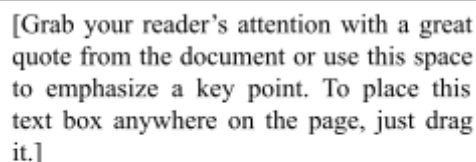
Figures and tables must be embedded within the main body of the manuscript and placed as close as possible to the first reference in the text. Each figure and table must be clearly numbered consecutively (e.g., Figure 1, Table 1) and accompanied by a descriptive caption.

Figure captions must be placed below the figure, while table titles must be placed above the table, in accordance with APA style guidelines. All figures and tables must be referenced explicitly in the text prior to their appearance. Upon acceptance for publication, author(s) are required to submit all figures as separate .jpg files with a minimum resolution of 300 dpi to ensure high-quality printing and digital publication. Tables must be submitted in editable text format (not as images) to allow proper formatting during the production process.

If figures, tables, or excerpts are reproduced or adapted from copyrighted sources, the author(s) must obtain written permission from the copyright holder and provide appropriate acknowledgment in the caption. During the initial submission process, lower-resolution images may be used to reduce file size; however, blurred images, distorted graphics, or low-quality scans will not be accepted.

a. Figures

All figures should be numbered with Arabic numerals (1, 2, 3). Each figure should have a caption placed above it in a centered manner. All images (photographs, graphics, drawings, diagrams, maps, and schemas) are considered figures.

The figure number and caption should be typed below the figure in 12 pt and centered. If the figure is sourced from other materials, provide the name of the source below the figure, left-justified (Figure 1).

b. Tables

All tables in the manuscript should be numbered with Arabic numerals. The text should be in English and of a reasonable size that allows for easy reading. Each table should have a caption placed above it and centered. See the example below (Table 1) for the proper table format. It is crucial to use primary data from the research. If the data is sourced from another entity, the source should be clearly stated underneath the table and left-aligned.

3.3. Equations

Line drawings must be provided as high-quality scans or precise electronic outputs to ensure clarity and readability. All figures should be embedded within the main body of the manuscript and must not be submitted as separate files during the initial submission.

In-text citations (Amin & An Ras Try Astuti, 2023) and the reference list must conform strictly to the APA Style, 7th edition, as illustrated in the reference examples provided at the end of this template. Any citations or references to the authors' own previously published work must be anonymized to maintain the integrity of the blind review process (Author, 2024).

3.4. Citation and Footnote

The reference list must be placed at the end of the manuscript and must not be presented as footnotes. The use of footnotes for citation purposes is strictly prohibited in this article. All in-text citations (Adisaputra, 2023; Atiya et al., 2024; El Rizaq & Sarmini, 2025; Pratiwi et al., 2024) and the preparation of the reference list must consistently follow the APA Style, 7th edition, as exemplified at the end of this template. To maintain the integrity of the double-blind review process, any citations or references to the authors' previously published work must be anonymized, for example, written as (Author, 2012). The authors' identities will only be disclosed after the manuscript has been formally accepted for publication.
