Over the last decade, India's performance in international sports has improved steadily. The medal count has shown a consistent upward trend, reflecting better infrastructure, training, and recognition of diverse sports beyond cricket.

While cricket still dominates, the younger generation is increasingly exploring other sports, especially badminton, football, and athletics. The government’s *Khelo India* programme and private academies have helped identify rural talent.

According to a survey by the *Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports (2024)*, nearly **68% of school students** now participate in at least one sport activity each week. Experts believe that the growing sports culture contributes not just to fitness but also to teamwork, discipline, and national pride.

Rising Heatwaves in India: The Scorching Reality of a Warming Nation

(1) Once known for its rhythmic monsoons and diverse climate, India is now becoming synonymous with relentless heat. The summer of 2025 has been one of the hottest on record, with temperatures soaring past 48°C in many northern and central states. According to the India Meteorological Department (IMD), the country experienced nearly twice as many heatwave days between March and June compared to the previous decade. "We are witnessing a dangerous new normal," said IMD chief scientist Dr. M. Rajeevan. "Heatwaves that used to occur once every 30 years are now happening almost every other year."

(2) The impact of these rising temperatures has been devastating. In May 2025, parts of Delhi, Rajasthan, and Madhya Pradesh recorded night-time temperatures above 35°C, offering little relief from the searing days. Hospitals in several cities reported a surge in cases of dehydration, heat exhaustion, and stroke, while the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) confirmed over 2,000 heat-related deaths nationwide — the highest toll in more than a decade. For outdoor workers, farmers, and street vendors, surviving the day has become a battle against nature. "It feels like the air itself is burning," said Meera, a daily wage worker in Jaipur. "Even the water from the hand pump is too hot to touch."

(3) Beyond human suffering, the heatwaves are inflicting severe economic and environmental damage. Crop failures are becoming common, especially in wheat, rice, and sugarcane belts where prolonged dry spells and soaring heat reduce yields. The Indian Institute of Agricultural Research (2025) estimates that every 1°C rise in temperature could cut wheat output by nearly 6%. Power

grids are under immense stress as electricity demand for cooling spikes, causing frequent blackouts. Meanwhile, shrinking reservoirs and groundwater depletion threaten both rural livelihoods and urban water supplies. Cities like Bengaluru and Nagpur have already faced “Day Zero” warnings this year — when taps are expected to run dry.

(4) Scientists attribute the increasing frequency and intensity of heatwaves to a deadly combination of climate change, rapid urbanization, and deforestation. Concrete jungles trap heat, while declining tree cover reduces natural cooling. The IMD’s 2025 climate analysis shows that India’s average temperature has risen by 1.2°C since 1901, but the rate of increase has accelerated sharply in the past two decades. Climate experts warn that if global emissions continue unchecked, India could experience over 100 extreme heat days per year by 2050. “What makes Indian heatwaves deadly is not just their intensity but their humidity,” said climatologist Dr. Anjal Prakash. “High humidity prevents sweat from evaporating, which makes the human body unable to cool down naturally.”

(5) In response, state governments and researchers are experimenting with adaptive solutions. Cities like Ahmedabad and Bhubaneswar have implemented Heat Action Plans, which include early warning systems, cool roof initiatives, and public awareness drives. NGOs are promoting community cooling shelters, while urban planners advocate for green corridors and reflective building materials. Yet experts caution that these are short-term measures. “Unless we cut carbon emissions and protect green spaces, adaptation alone won’t save us,” said Dr. Rajeevan. “Heatwaves are not isolated weather events anymore — they are the visible scars of a planet in crisis.”

As the blazing Indian summer of 2025 continues to rewrite records, one thing is clear: the fight against heat is no longer seasonal — it’s existential.
