

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This Report highlights the progress, major achievements and challenges of the Department during the year 2023. In fulfillment of the Local Government Service's mandate of rendering quality services, the Department is responsible for the integration of the Disadvantaged, Vulnerable and the Excluded into the Mainstream of Development and to contribute towards the improvement of the standard of living of the people in the District.

Activities undertaken over the last three (3) months include home assessment and reintegration of rescued children, education and sensitization on child labor/ child trafficking, teenage pregnancy, adolescent reproductive health, case work, court work, monitoring of NGOs and CBOs activities, implementation of ISS activities, group monitoring and visits, monitoring and registration of NGOs and associations monitoring of beneficiaries of the Livelihood Empowerment Against Poverty (LEAP), group meetings, monitoring of cases, among others.

Untimely receipts and release of GOG and UNICEF funds to undertake planned activities of the Department.

Way forward

Funds for the implementation of departmental activities should be released on time.

SOCIAL POLICY AND SOCIAL PROTECTION

CHILD RIGHT PROTECTION AND PROMOTION

During the year, as part of the implementation of the UNICEF ISS programme being undertaken in the district, a one-day training on ISSOP was organized by the department for relevant stakeholders who directly handle issues of children. The training sort to strengthen collaboration and also equip stakeholders on the usage of the child protection tool kit and Standardized forms. It was also a forum for idea and field experience sharing by stakeholders. This training was facilitated by officers of the Social Welfare and Community Development Department of the district and participated by stakeholders from GES, GHS, NCCE, CHRAJ, NGOs, CCPC members, staff of the department, media the district coordinating director among others. A total of thirty -seven (37) persons made up of 12 females and 25 males.

Also, representatives from the MoGCSP and LGS trained staff of the department on the usage of the child protection tool kit application to report all sensitization activities carried out. This application was to give access to the ministry on sensitization exercise to know the progress and number of persons reached for the purpose of data sharing and also to inform subsequent decisions on the issues discussed. A total of 10 persons made up of 2 females and 8 males were trained. SOS Village is also assisting financially to empower families of trafficked children and families at risk of trafficking. In the fourth quarter, 120 families have been vetted and hopefully in the coming quarter, the qualified ones will be supported to empower them economically.

The department also organized sensitization on radio (Okorli FM) and Wokumagbe on child labour, trafficking and also mandates of the department to the citizenry. This sensitization was done in collaboration with the CCPCs and Ghana Survival Network- Ada West Branch members. This exercise was to throw more light on the dangers of trafficking and the relevance of the institution of the department in the district.

Additionally, with collaboration from GES and GHS, there were series of education on teenage pregnancy, child trafficking, child labour and other adolescent reproductive health held in 15 selected schools in the district. This activity was essential as it was to part of strategies to help curb the menace of the increasing number of teenage pregnancy cases in the district. A total of **1,603** pupils made up of **545** females and **824** males were reached during this exercise.

The department in collaboration with S.O.S Village assisted the Lolonya Community (a community that is prone to trafficking) to develop a **community action plan** to guide the community on interventions to undertake on their own to augment the efforts of the department and other collaborating agencies to curb the menace of trafficking in the community. The exercise was successful with the chiefs, opinion leaders, CCPC members, assembly members, unit committee members and community members coming on board to participate in developing the action plan. The department will assist the community in subsequent quarters to implement all activities tabled in the plan. A total of 170 community members made up of 79 females and 91 males were involved.

The Department also collaborated with the NHIA to enroll 381 OVCs (school pupils) in selected basic schools in Sege. This activity was to enable them gain free access to health care and reduce the financial burden of medical bills on their parents and caregivers.

Monitoring of CCPCS and Home visits of Reintegrated Children

The Department in collaboration with S.O.S and International Needs Ghana (INGH) monitored activities of CCPCs and other Child Protection related activities in some selected communities in the district.

JUSTICE ADMINISTRATION

Final judgement on the juvenile who stole bags of pepper in the previous quarter was passed during first quarter. He is currently serving a six months' probation period in the district. Monitoring will be done by the department to ensure other rulings from the court with regards to his probation would be followed accordingly to enable him become a better version of himself.

During the year, the department received three letters from the Magistrate court to conduct a Social enquiry on three juveniles. One who had stolen some items, the other being part of adults who had stolen items whiles the third involved a juvenile who murdered another child respectively. Social enquires reports on these cases were duly prepared with necessary recommendation in the best interest of the juveniles made, awaiting subsequent hearings and final judgment form the court whiles the other involving a juvenile who is murdered another child.

After three court hearings of the murder case, the juvenile offender has been granted bail to appear in court again on 22nd January 2024 by which the court would have received the autopsy report from the Ghana Police Service to assist in the case. The unit visits the home of the juvenile to counsel her as it was noticed in court that she was psychologically affected by the incidence.

COMMUNITY CARE

Livelihood Empowerment Against Poverty (LEAP)

During the year, 81st and 82nd, 83rd and 84, 85th and 86th payment cycles grants were paid to a total number of four hundred and thirty - two (435) households at the 10 designated pay points in the communities within the district. There was a 3 member team from the Ministry of Gender, Children and Social Protection to monitor the payment and interact with beneficiaries and focal persons to ascertain the impact of the grant. The Honorable Lariba Zuweira, Minister for Gender, Children and Social Protection was in the district and monitored the 85th and 86th cycle payment exercise. Due to the ezwich device developing a fault, the 87th cycle payment was put on hold.

The head of Management Information System Unit at LEAP Secretariat, Mr Jerry Yarney joined staff of the department in monitoring beneficiary households in the districts to assess the impact of the programme on the livelihood of the beneficiaries and challenges of the LEAP programme.

The department collaborated with the District NHIS to renew the cards of 372 beneficiaries to enable them have access to free medical health care.

EDUCATION AND SENSITISATION

The Department collaborated with the HIV Focal Person of the Ada west District Assembly and Ghana Education Service to embark on HIV/AIDS education, adolescent and reproductive health issues and teenage pregnancy at Anyamam Community Junior High School, Anyamam Presbyterian No.2 Basic School, Adjumanikope D/A Basic School and Agbedrafor D/A Basic School. This exercise was to conscientize the pupils on the existence of HIV/AIDS and the need to keep good personal hygiene as well as some preventive methods to curb teenage pregnancy.

DISABILITY

During the year, funds, items and equipment were disbursed to over 108 beneficiary PWDs in areas of economic and business, health, assistive devices (wheel chairs), cash, education, apprenticeship and equipment. Beneficiaries were educated and cautioned to put into good use the support received so it would serve its purpose of equipping them and improve upon their living standards.

The department monitored **10** beneficiaries of the fund from the previous quarters (from Lolonya, Sege, Amuyaokope, Caesarkope, Anyamam, Amuyaokope, Koluedor) to find out whether they were judiciously making use of the resources they were equipped with. At the end of the exercise, it was recommended that suggestions should be made to the common fund administrator to release the funds on a quarter base consistently to serve beneficiaries and meet their needs on time. Fourteen (14) members of the Ghana federation of the disabled (GFD) in the district were also supported to participate in the national disability day celebration that took place at the Accra Rehabilitation Centre on 23rd June 2023.

The Department during the year partook in one meeting of the Physically Challenge Persons with Disability in the District. Members of the Association were taken through the right process seeking financial support from the assembly by writing to the District Disability Fund Management Committee. They were also educated on the need to put the fund into a productive venture to enable them to be self-reliant.

The secretary of the association in addressing the members admonished them to take their lifestyle serious as some of them are fond of living lifestyles characterized by drunkenness. Also, participants were encouraged desist from seeking alms but rather venture into businesses like learning a trade, petty trading or crop or animal farming.

A total of 88 persons were present at the meeting. Out of this number, fifty (50) twenty – three (23) males and twenty – seven (27) females NHIS membership numbers were taken, forwarded to District Office of NHIA and have been renewed.

GENDER EQUITY AND WOMEN EMPOWERMENT

During the year, the Business Resource Centre in the district collaborate with the department to organize week long trainings on business management and entrepreneurship for women groups in the distinct. The training was participated by women traders, entrepreneurs, dressmakers, hairdressers, beauticians, and apprentices, small scale manufactures, farmers among others. The training was to equip them on how to manage their businesses and improve upon their services to maximize profit. A total of 150 women participated in this training.

The department also participated in some of the weekly meeting of the Anyamam Branch of the Tailor and Dressmakers Association and the Beauticians and Hairdressers Association, Sege Branch respectively.


