There are casual conversations with other artists, dancers, and exhibition artist and installers in the swimming pool next door to the female changing room.

I start to use the Belsize Body Clinic, Physiotherapy & Wellbeing Spa's treatment room as my studio.

Found a stack of old paper advert/pamphlets about the Beauty Day Spa: it features a face of a white woman with her hands in a prayer's position on the right-side of her chin, with all her hair combed to the back; and a line of enlarged text that says: 'Relax & have some YOU TIME'.



The changing room has multiple doors next to each other, which creates a 50cm * 50cm * 1.8m cubicle in between the white doors. Customers use door to go into another space within the context of a venue.

Girl Lived in a Closet, California Police Say

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif., Oct. 25 (AP) — A 12-year-old girl has been found locked in a filthy closet, where, the police say, her parents kept her confined for much of her life.

The girl was found Monday night in the reeking, cockroach-infested closet, which was kept closed by a bent nail, said Sgt. Jenifer Kauffman of the San Bernardino police.

Her parents, Joseph and Sandra Sauceda, were charged Wednesday with felony child endangerment, and the father also was charged with felony child abuse, Ms. Kauffman said.

The police were tipped by a relative. When they asked the Saucedas to show them the girl, they took officers to the closet, Ms. Kauffman said.

Officers said the girl was lying in her own feces and wore a urine-stained sweatsuit.

Investigators say the child rarely left the closet and had probably been kept locked up at other homes where the family lived during the past decade, Ms. Kauffman said.

"Obviously, it's a terrible, traumatic condition," said Sgt. Bob Evans. "It will probably take years to recover from"

The couple was held in this city 60 miles east of Los Angeles in lieu of \$50,000 bail each.

The girl, whose name was not disclosed, and her six brothers and sisters, ages 2 months to 15 years, were turned over to the county Child Protective Services. There was no evidence that the other children were abused, Ms. Kauffman said.

Joseph Sauceda, 33, denied that he and his 31-year-old wife abused their daughter. He said the closet was not a cell and that his family was a loving one.

'Trace' in the field of drawing has the meaning 'to copy a drawing or pattern, etc. by drawing over its lines through a thin piece of transparent paper' or 'to draw a shape by showing the main or outer lines'. As a noun, 'trace' means 'a sign that something has happened or existed', 'an act of finding information about something electronically, or the record of the information found in this way', or 'a very slight amount'. By contextualizing the meaning of the word 'trace' with 'body', I mean that I would like to find the body that was lost, to find the origin of the body, to discover the causes or origins of the body by examining the way in which it has developed, to describe the way in which something has developed and to copy the imprint of the body by following the journey it has taken. So that I could be able to respond to the signal that the body has happened or existed, and to present an act of finding more information about the body physically and historically. It doesn't matter that there is only a very slight amount of the traces of the body. Because the purpose of finding the traces of the "body" for me is not to recreate the "body" as a doppelgänger of the original "body". I want to use the traces of the "body" to imagine what the

"body" is like, where would the "body" have been to, how the "body" would act and what the "body" will do.

And then, I would like to contextualize the imagination of the "body" by following its traces, like sheds and remains in a space, with the copies of my consciousness, of what I would do as if I become the "body" in a translocated time and space.

A concerning egoistic thought experiment to work out the construct of future around me. I can think of myself in the future. But I cannot think for others in the future. If I know that someone close to me is going to be in apathy in the future, I will care much more about the future for this someone. However, I cannot anticipate this close someone's apathy in the same way that I anticipate my own. If this close some is me, then it makes me care more about this person in the present. My identity is important. However, it's more important to consider the relationship of me with other people in this egoistic thought experiment.

If you don't feel any discombobulation, then there's no function overlap between you (the replica) and me (the original).

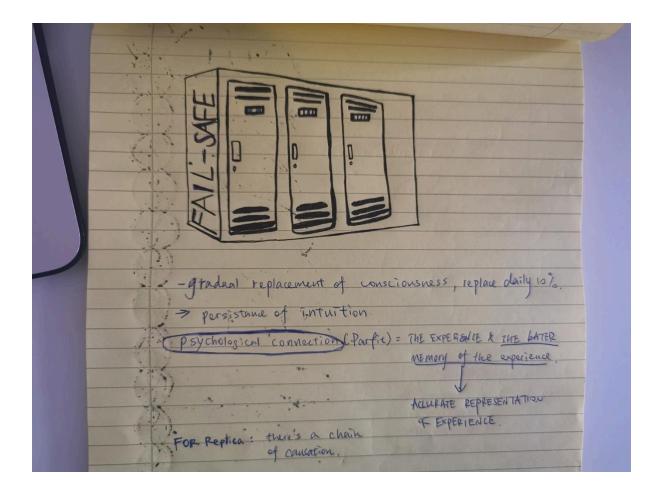

The video performance cycles between 3 shots. The first one has Jill with a headphone on marking dots and connecting lines on a paper like a painting hanging on the wall, while a voice-over is narrating the directions for the body from one dot to another, like: 'Put your left foot down on one, and right foot down on two. Walk crouching down, put your hand on 6, your

right hand on 6, and slide to 7. Put your left knee on 8, and your left knee on 9, reach out and reach your left hand on 10, and slide to 11. Put your left foot on 12, and your left foot on 13. Put your left knee down on 23, then your right knee down on 24. Place your right hand down on 25, and your let hand on 26. This should be the shape of your position now. Now, 40, check your position, we seem to be finished. You should be facing this way.' The second shot is a close up of the body move as told by the direction. The third shot features a body standing in front of the double screen tv at eye level, while another body is moving from one dot to another as the directions continue in the voice over. The third part is set in a space that looks like an artist studio or an exhibition in a gallery.

Left hand on 1, right hand on 2, left foot on 3, right foot on 4. As you push yourself off the ground, stand up, breath.

Jill Scott names this studio practice as 'Accidents for One'. When we walk outside in the world, our hands follow our body, they rarely direct our body. When we point at directions, we use our hands to stretch away from the body. What if we use our feet to point out direction, and let our bodies follow our hands for direction? What if we mix match our limbs to point out direction and direct?

A crisis mentality: Corona Stress, Pandemic Panic

'Anomie: increased suicidality because things become pointless when your daily structure is destabilised. Alternatively, the virus might offer you perspectives in your life about what does and doesn't matter though it might also bring up regret about past decisions.' The regret that comes after the quarantine is brought up because of physical immobility. I wish I could do that, go there, meet this friend and shop whenever I want. The pandemic brings up anger, fear, boredom, disbelief of self, self-indulging social media posts, stress, inequalities that have being embedded in the society, etc.

We could be working on something in this quarantine. However, there's physical stagnation that will eventually catch up with us. Imagine this: Would the prisoner adapt to the situation of being trapped inside the high wall for the first month of imprisonment? As our home become the new heterotopia, as number of dead bodies makes up a cemetery, the prostitutes make up a brothel, refugees make up a camp, prisoners make up a prison, us in the quarantine are the unwanted bodies from the post-anthropocentric world view.

Viruses depend on the host cells that help them to reproduce. As one host body coming into contact with the virus, it can take over the host body's function and direct the host body's cell machinery to reproduce more viruses. It is like a parasite. It doesn't reproduce itself.

Our fetish for busyness and productivity provides the unlimited resource for our subliminal mental pressure. I feel that I'm inadequate to cope with the massive level of uncertainty, while I'm happy that everything is on a pause. I feel ashamed that I have a gigantic materialistic desire for being a human. I have lost my income from my part time job, I have got new daily structure, I'm imploded with anticipation, disappointment, frustration, devastating loss for unforeseen future.

The interconnectedness has become virtual and more accessible in front of my desk. We could do this, we could do that...

Trying to make ersatz versions of things that used to be important in the daily life. **Duplication, ersatz, copies, double**

Am I a vector?

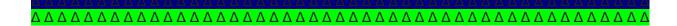

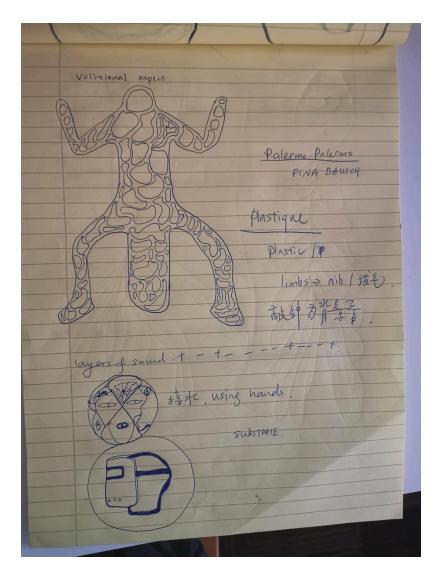

How audiences can view performance over virtual screen?

- The work takes the format of the music score.
- Performance and liveness: different kinds of screens: LED, computer, phone
- Playwright writes play, the performance is an interpretation or a spin off of the words in the theatre setting. 'Moving words' improvise performance by working with fragments of language (Phrases, narratives that Tim has been collecting daily.)
 - There's a recorded stream of consciousness as performance materials.: a fragment
 of language that is informed by news, writings, thing overheard, things get written
 in the media.
 - o Recorded stream of consciousness sit in the sediment aisle.
- 'Rough draft' is a precursor of the 'music la dance
 - The develop strategies is to work with the "sediment aisle", the set of fragments, an accumulating sediments, in order to test language by speaking out loud, yelling, or in conversation with others. What such tests can open up in a situation when encounter with another audience, another body?
- Online flowing audience
 - o Art audiences knowing that what this performance could evolve
 - o People just wander in and out by a click
 - When thinking about the internet situational performance, how to mimic the similar structure of a live performance in the physical space?
- There's an impulse to use the language as a tactic to play with the possibilities of the possible and impossible
- Playing and pushing the boundary of the language
- I'm activating this language, I have my presence, my body, my race. What if I transfer the presence with another body? 13 phrases in my work become a material, which could be activated by other people at another time, in another space, or in the same space. The language become a score. Strength of the work becomes how other people could manifest.
 - Different people manifest the same thing in different ways: they could open up a new realm of understanding of this set of sediment.

Performance conservation

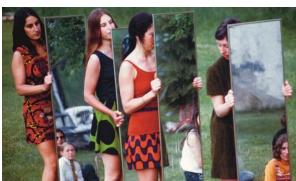
Challenging question for the performance re-creation/virtual interaction with audiences:

- Where do you position yourself between the forensic evidences and the work?
- How to develop tools for audiences and other artists, who want to experience the performance, to work with, thus allowing the performance process to take place?
- For action-based performance, the complexity of the improvisation also needs to be taken in consideration.
- The artist has to specify: How much foes the manifestation of details matter in the performance?

For example, when **Joan Jonas** was recreating her mirror piece with new dancers and people with no dance background, she first went into the performance space and show the dancers how she worked with the objects and mirrors. She showed her attitude toward the work and materials she performs with.

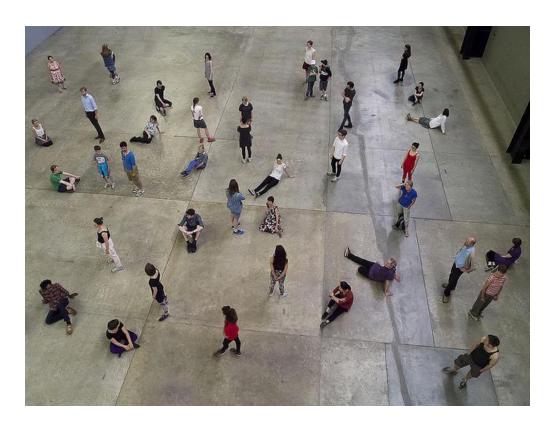

- Renowned as one of the most important artists of his generation, Tino Sehgal's critical acclaim derives from his radical artistic practice that takes the form of "constructed situations": live encounters between visitors and those enacting the work. Their ephemeral beauty rests in the fleeting specificity of the encounter, where players often engage the visitors with their active participation in constructing the piece. Sehgal's abandoning of material production in favor of lived experience is nevertheless achieved with a sensitivity to classical considerations of form, composition and space, grounded not only in the history of dance but also western traditions of sculpture and painting.

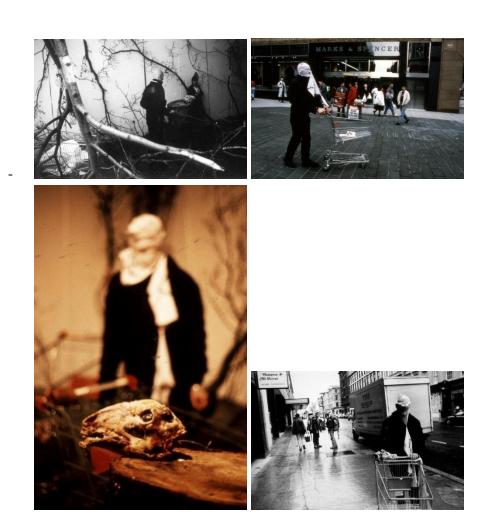

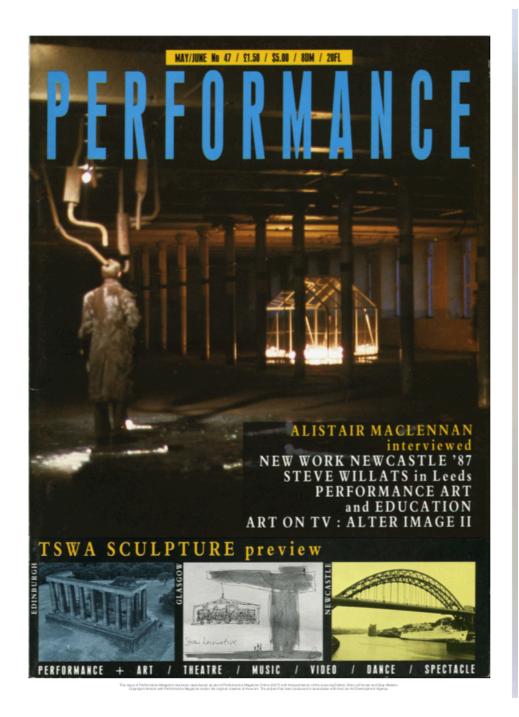

In Alaistair's performance, audiences come and go. There's no one knows what's gonna happen:

- Except the audience (Authoritarian)
- Including the audience (Democracy)

Audiences show up at "appointment time" in theatre setting. During the "appointment time", audiences are scheduled to sit through the show from the beginning to finish. The actors in theatre setting use dramaturgy to control the audience by sculping the space.

Audiences show up for "gallery time" in performance. During the "gallery time", audiences can come in and go out of the gallery. There's no clear beginning and end.

The artists in performance art setting are liberated from the "control" of the space or the audiences. However, this doesn't mean the artists don't have control for the space they perform in. Since the audiences have their own freedom to wander in the space, when they enter a gallery, they are more likely to realize the change of time, space and other people moving in the space?

Have a good day, 2017 Opera for 10 cashiers, supermarket sounds and piano By Vaiva Grainyte, Lina Lapelyte, Rugile Barzdziukaite https://vimeo.com/205659461

'The opera focuses on the inner lives of cashiers in a shopping centre: showing what lies behind their mechanical "Good afternoon!", "Thank you!", "Have a good day!", and fake smiles. Faceless, robot-like shop workers found in everyday life are transformed into unique and lively characters. Their secret thoughts and biographies are turned into short, personal dramas. The

characters of different sales clerks, embodying universal archytypes, convey the predominant social landscape. The libretto is a revealing mosaic of spoken literary language and documentery. The atmosphere of the supermarket is established through the glimmering and buzzing installation of daylight lamps and environmental sounds, connecting the audience to the stage and the 10 cashiers. The set itself is very minimalistic. Real goods – the recognizable décor of a shopping center – exist only in acoustic and verbal form. The monotonous beep of each item being scanned is a key sound through the whole opera. It gets louder and quieter, but it is always present. Songs that accompany the beeping are as monotonous as the process of shopping and selling. Instead of becoming the main point of the opera, music serves the thoughts of the cashiers – it facilitates their voice.

To avoid any moral or condemnatory suggestion, a critical attitude towards capitalism is expressed through humor, paradox, irony and poetry. The mosaic of different destinies is transformed into one poem suggesting the pleasure of consumption.'

Reading today: House Taken Over (Casa) By Julio Cortazar

'(Whenever Irene talked in her sleep, I woke up immediately and stayed awake. I never could get used to this voice from a statue or a parrot, a voice that came out of the dreams, not from a throat. Irene said that in my sleep I flailed about erroneously and shook the blankets off.'

What are voices that are not from a throat? Is that voice from a dream, imaginary non-existent beings, ghosts, or a parrot?

Delusions of reference—A neutral environmental event is believed to have a special and personal meaning. For example, a person with schizophrenia might believe a billboard or a person on TV is sending a message meant specifically for them.

Trip, Taken, Over.

I have been noticing that there are mixed messages sending to me, through graffiti words written on the buildings. Not the middle-class graffiti drawn with chalk on the pavement, I mean the kind of graffiti drawn on the surfaces of desolate heterotopic spaces - like those coded words and drawings on the tipping edge of rooftops, under the railway bridges - surfaces and boundaries for the ephemeral practice of parrhesia under the temporary absence of surveillance. For example, today I saw that, on the top right corner of a council house on a main road that says: "TRIP".

"Is that a message for me?"

The coded practice of parrhesia requires careful observation of the mundane. My partner didn't notice it. Or he did but ignored it. However, I couldn't let it go. I like to hang on to the meaning of words, even when they don't fit the sentence they are put into. Because that's how I could explain my imaginary fear that curate my actions.

"Why he couldn't not notice that? How come he hasn't got the message like I have? Is it predicting my future? Is it saying that I'm about to go on a trip to somewhere?" I was on a trip at the time, from home to the outside for a daily exercise during the quarantine. I was about to go on a trip on the day to Japan if the quarantine hadn't started.

"Is it a warning for me to not trip on my own feet while walking? Is it telling me to not look at it and focus on my own walk? Is it referring to the reality that I have just tripped on the pavement before I turn into this road?"

I shouted quietly when I tripped upon an uneven surface on the pavement just a moment before.

"Is it saying that I could trip if I were to be on the edge of the building? Is it saying that I should go up to the edge of the building? Is it a surveillance watch point for drug dealing? Is there a secret number written on the roof for me to contact with? Is there someone who tries to communicate with me over these coded characters? Should I go up there and wait for a meeting with someone? If I don't go up there now, what if I miss the chance to connect with the messenger?"

Shall we go up there? Why?
To see what's behind.
Why?

"Should I go up there? Is it saying that I should be tripping, as taking narcotics? Is it saying that I'm tripping? Am I? Is it ok to notice these codes and not commit any response to them? Is it ok to see something and not react to them? How do they know that I see them, if I don't? How to explain why I lock myself out of my own home when I have the keys in my pocket?" I did not go up there, neither did I commit to any of the messages and predictions that were indicated by the "TRIP". I was tempted. I still am. I'm tempted to trip, to step on the edge of the roof and look down. So that I can connect with people who also shed their lenses to these coded characters.

"Opps."

I tripped, again, on another uneven surface of the pavement.

Are you ok? Yes, I'm ok.

Maybe I will visit the roof tomorrow by myself, when there's no one asking me about my intension. Maybe I can find a reason to go up there by myself. 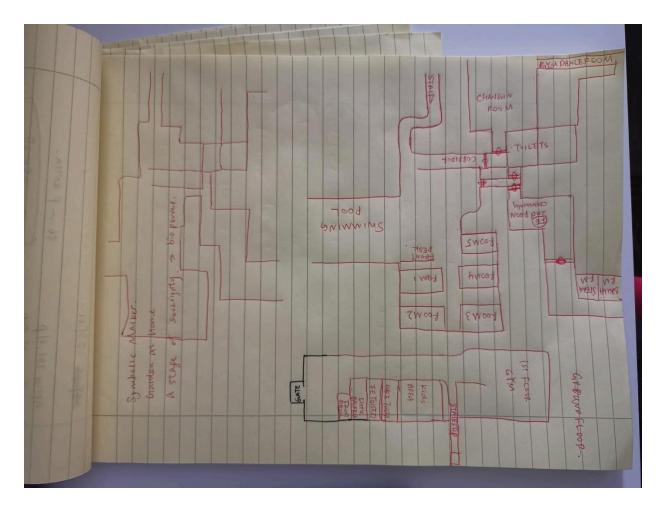

In Bestiario, the Argentinian writer Julio Cortazar wrote a short story, called "Casa Tomada" in 1951. 'The story offers a parable for contemporary conundrums regarding territory and legitimacy.' (Fokianaki) Who are defending whom in the story "Casa Tomada"? Who are the occupiers in the inherited house? The siblings or the unknown "occupiers"? As artists taking over the abandoned spaces as art studios to develop their artistic practices, are they occupiers or possessors? 'The story also brings up questions about the imaginary fear that creates the dichotomy between "the native" versus "the Other."

At a time when most of the law-aiding citizens are staying at home, minding their own business, isn't that a liberation from engaging at all with the Other? Living in the contemporary society enriched with polarized political ideologies, are we the occupiers or the hatchers for the neoliberal vision? People living the age of globalization and technological advancement are like the eggs being hatched outside of the shell, and inside of the experimental incubator under the high intense pressure of being born into the skin of up-standing well behave citizen. There's no place for the Others. The feeling of exclusion is seen as the result of subjective self-isolation. Where else would you go if you don't want to be with other people? What else can you do if you can't handle the pressure of co-habitancy? If you have the financial support, you could go somewhere that's the most similar to your imaginary utopia. If you can't afford the beach house

or a holiday home, where would you go? You eventually find yourself staying at home to avoid

any social contact with others.

This proposal emerges from my recent field research in the Quaker's Friend House meetings and working in market research offices, in response to a question arises in my practice: can I self-isolate in the public space without being alienated? If so, how to use fiction as a method to become a "spy" in public space as an observer without arousing the attention drawn to oneself? How to convey this voyeuristic and dishonest act in the artist practice as a way to collect information and materials by observing the Others physically, instead of relying on the layers of meditated information like news, media, and word of mouth?

Describe your proposed project and its artistic rationale (i.e. What is your project about, and why? (300 words

As a performance artist, I have my language, my presence, my body, and my identity. What if I could transfer this presence with another body? Would I become another body temporarily? Would a collective of bodies become one body if they were to manifest from the same experience of the one body? My main research question is: What is the possibility of creating new subjectivity and encountering new ones through the trope of self-multiplicity as a creative source: 'self as material body' - an autobiographical corporeal machine- and 'self as a body of archive'— an embodiment of the material body's lived experiences - in site-specific performance situations? I have been visiting a Quaker's Friends House in Hampstead Heath. When I told them my intension of visits, they told me that I don't have to be a believer to come to these meetings. I realize that it's my self-legitimization -that I'm here for research- allows me to investigate the possibility of encountering new subjectivity by submerging myself into an identifiable group. I also was working in a marketing research agency during that period of time for research reasons. This marketing agency is set up to do marketing research for tech companies, finance firms, medical and scientific researchers. I was interested in the see-thru mirror rooms that allow the "clients" to observe the "participants" under the consent of the participant. However, the participant also won't know how these collected data would be used for. The participants in this

situational rooms are very performative when they think they are being watched. For this DIY, I would like to liberate the individuals from the guilt of being a voyeur, while transferring one's everyday presence with the other bodies.

What is your proposed methodology (what and how)?: Please include a proposed schedule of activity for the DIY project.

For this DIY, I would like to translate my process of practice through group workshops, a collective role-playing game – gathering like how Quakers meet weekly for their communal worship, consisting of silent waiting and observing with participants contributing as they wish to. Instead of waiting for the God spirit that moves one to speak, during each gathering, one of the participants will lie down in the middle of the room inside of the 3D hologram device I have made with transparent Perspex. For each participant, they would be providing a body of diary, which consists of their self-documentation through writing, the text they overheard in conversations, newspaper clipping, video recording of random moments in their life, news that they have read that resonates, all of which are "heterotopic materials" -abundant layered information they would have recorded over a week before the meeting. During the meeting, all materials will be projected, scattered in the panopticon-like room as they would like to. The other participants would come in and read or perform and manifest these materials in their own ways, while the ones who devise these materials will be lying inside of the 3d hologram, with their face floating in the middle of the 3d hologram.

The workshop will happen weekly over 8 weeks, with 8 participants (including myself). Each workshop will last 2 hours. And there will be a discussion after each workshop, over snack and drinks.

This DIY is for artists who use their own subjectivity as the creative source in their process-based practice. For examples like artists who use role-playing at the boundary of a human body in order to look outward – into fantasies of 'becoming' an avatar of the self, in addition to looking inward of the body, in support of fragile identity and curated self-representation.

Ideal number of participants would be 8 (including myself). The artists will be selected based on their interest in sharing their practice and personal life with a selected group of people; if they use role-playing (the definition of role-play is not limited to playing another body, role, object or material, but accentuate on the idea of 'becoming') in their practice; how much does it matter for the artists to record and document their process of practicing.

Please indicate the imagined outcomes and benefits to you/your practice:

As different people manifest from the same experience, how much more narrative could one body incorporate into the self-subjectivity? This DIY will be a test to my rationale behind this project: if one could archive the embodiment of self-subjectivity as a creative performance source - such as autobiographical writing, documentation visual archive of everyday life, and creative fiction writing - that is triggered by loneliness and living in the modern community that is remote from home and other people? And if the participants (include me) would start to question the authenticity of our own practice when undergoing these workshops. I hope to see how does the collection of voyeuristic encounters situated between the artists and other artists' materials will be reviewed in conjunction with "forensic" material evidence of the creative process, documentation of real-life events, accompanied writings, interviews, and archival matters, all of which resonates with loneliness and living in the modern community that is remote from home and other people.

Please indicate the imagined outcomes and benefits for your participants/their practice:

For the participants, I hope they could use these workshops to expand their practice through observing others' working processes as if they were in someone else's studio/home, and also through the listening of how other people manifest from their creative raw materials in another voice, that might not come from the throat. The participants could also incorporate other voices more openly, as an answer to a question for all artists: When different people manifest from the same experience, how much more narrative could one body incorporate into the self-subjectivity?

Please provide a short biography including your (and/or your collaborators') experience or interest in leading similar initiatives to DIY: *

I'm a performance artist who creates sound, video, performance, and installation. My fictional narrative based works cycle through different modes of aliveness as they simulate with my self-counter-intuitive attempts to create a multiplicity of identity in flux. I have led multiple workshops and live events under working as the curator and producer for the pseudonym collective, PAPRIKA Collective, which includes Longtable discussion with performance artists at Raven Row, various live events featuring artists doing live performances in situational heterotopic spaces and art spaces, and public engagement workshops for children with MIRROR MIRROR Production and VITRINE Gallery.

Trip, Taken, Over.

I have been noticing that there are mixed messages sending to me, through graffiti words written on the buildings. Not the middle-class graffiti drawn with chalk on the pavement, I mean the kind of graffiti drawn on the surfaces of desolate heterotopic spaces - like those coded words and drawings on the tipping edge of rooftops, under the railway bridges - surfaces and boundaries for the ephemeral practice of parrhesia under the temporary absence of surveillance. For example, today I saw that, on the top right corner of a council house on a main road that says: "TRIP".

"Is that a message for me?"

The coded practice of parrhesia requires careful observation of the mundane. My partner didn't notice it. Or he did but ignored it. However, I couldn't let it go. I like to hang on to the meaning of words, even when they don't fit the sentence they are put into. Because that's how I could explain my imaginary fear that curate my actions.

"Why he couldn't not notice that? How come he hasn't got the message like I have? Is it predicting my future? Is it saying that I'm about to go on a trip to somewhere?"

I was on a trip at the time, from home to the outside for a daily exercise during the quarantine. I was about to go on a trip on the day to Japan if the quarantine hadn't started.

"Is it a warning for me to not trip on my own feet while walking? Is it telling me to not look at it and focus on my own walk? Is it referring to the reality that I have just tripped on the pavement before I turn into this road?"

I shouted quietly when I tripped upon an uneven surface on the pavement just a moment before.

"Is it saying that I could trip if I were to be on the edge of the building? Is it saying that I should go up to the edge of the building? Is it a surveillance watch point for drug dealing? Is

there a secret number written on the roof for me to contact with? Is there someone who tries to communicate with me over these coded characters? Should I go up there and wait for a meeting with someone? If I don't go up there now, what if I miss the chance to connect with the messenger?"

Shall we go up there? Why?
To see what's behind.
Why?

"Should I go up there? Is it saying that I should be tripping, as taking narcotics? Is it saying that I'm tripping? Am I? Is it ok to notice these codes and not commit any response to them? Is it ok to see something and not react to them? How do they know that I see them, if I don't? How to explain why I lock myself out of my own home when I have the keys in my pocket?" I did not go up there, neither did I commit to any of the messages and predictions that were indicated by the "TRIP". I was tempted. I still am. I'm tempted to trip, to step on the edge of the roof and look down. So that I can connect with people who also shed their lenses to these coded characters.

"Opps."

I tripped, again, on another uneven surface of the pavement.

Are you ok? Yes, I'm ok.

Maybe I will visit the roof tomorrow by myself, when there's no one asking me about my intension. Maybe I can find a reason to go up there by myself. Maybe I will look at where I'm going instead of looking around while walking forward. Maybe I should stay at home and not go outside. Maybe I should have hidden my keys, so I wouldn't have gone outside.

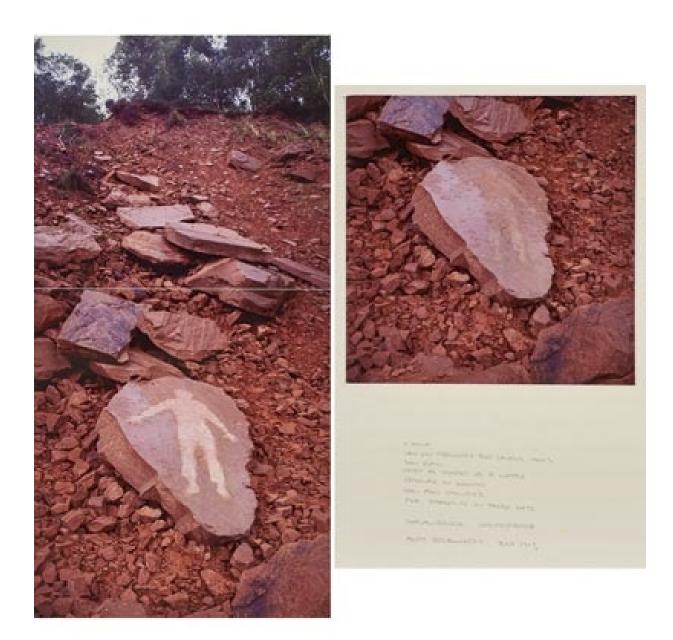

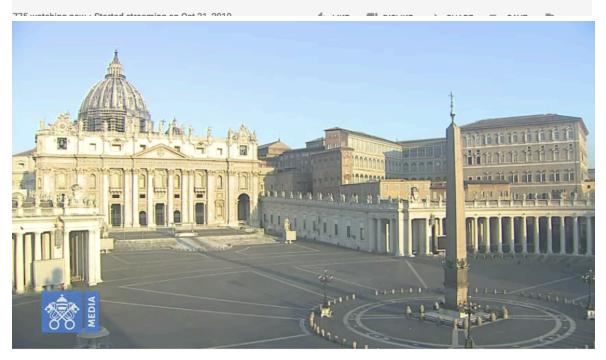

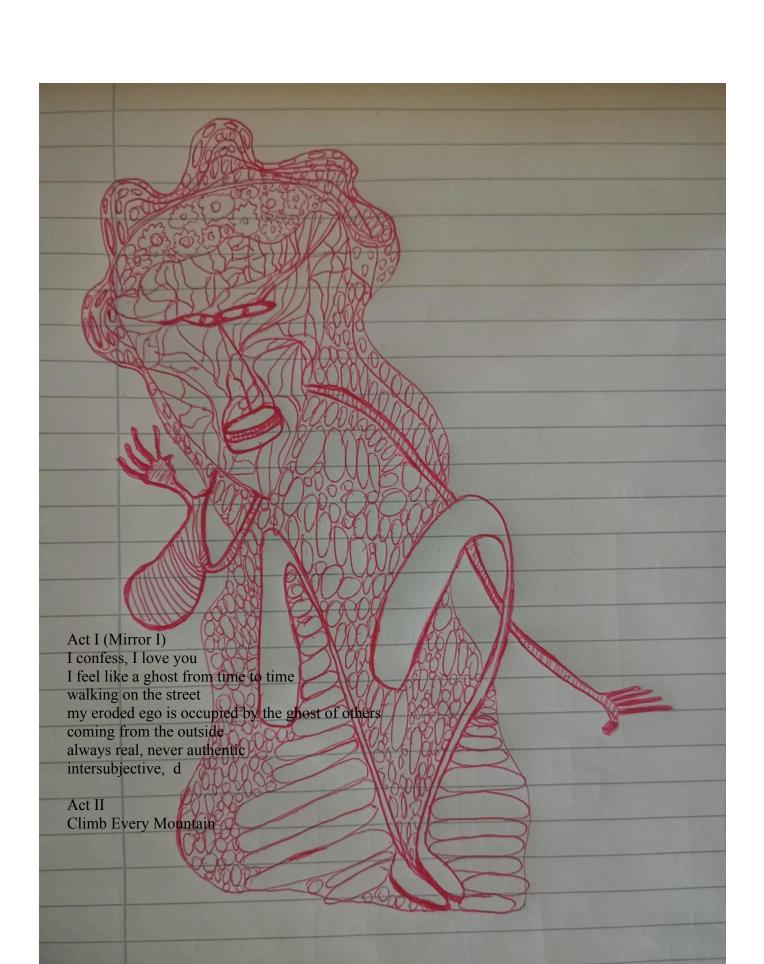
WATCH THIS SPACE

Artist Bio

I'm a performance artist who creates sound, video, performance, and installation. My work is often based on fictional narratives and characters that cycles through various embodiment and technological medium for their liveness, as they simulate with my own counter-intuitive attempts to create multiplicity of identity in flux. I'm currently in my second year for my practice-based Fine Art PhD titled: 'Becoming plural in

a play of characters: Performativity, Intersectionality, and Subjectivity in Performance Art Practice', at University of Brighton. This practice-based Ph.D. of predominantly non-object-oriented materials – performance, video, and visual tropes - explores an ephemera of different characters constructed through role-playing. My main research question is: What is the possibility of creating new subjectivity and encountering new ones through the trope of self-multiplicity as a creative source: 'self as material body' – an autobiographical corporeal machine- and 'self as a body of archive' – an embodiment of the material body's lived experiences - in site-specific performance situations? My second research question is: Encapsulating the trajectory of the performance art history from the 1960s to the present day, across artists who work with the screen, what performative roles, disguises or avatars have artists taken on, shed, or become, in order to situate themselves for site-specific performances and liveness? My third question is: How to illuminate the possibility of 'site-specific heterotopia liveness' as an ephemeral liminal interface body to transfer and transpose their fragmented subjectivities in the contemporary city?

Work proposal

I would like to submit a film that I have been working on since the start of my recent residency (Feb 2020) in the female changing room located within Spring Health: formerly a boutique healthcare/gymnasium built in 1930s and left in an abandoned state with a sudden closing in 2017. The open studio was cancelled due to the COVID-19 and the work produced was not able to be shown to the public, and I have been kept developing this work since the lock-down. The title of this film is 'Tropes of death, Ghost in the locker, I'm the voyeur shedding tears in the mirror', a fictional tale about a girl, Rye Forth, who is a ghost whisper. She has a condition that brings other people's patience to exhaustion until a different level of attention emerges as a new "voice" that possesses her body to become a chamber for breath and confession. The girl's memory is constantly restored to revel the memories of others, while her body has retained its appearance, her memory produces something completely other than herself. This film voyeuristically shows the journey of how a girl renders the collective silences that she has encountered by becoming a vessel to accommodate others' voices. By the end of the film, the girl transforms into a surveillance device that is installed in the female changing room. The audiences who watch to the end of the film will be linked to a site that they can see the real-time live streaming of the empty female changing room in Spring Health with muted sound. They could type in their words, memories and confession, which are then transferred into the real-time speaker projecting into the empty female changing room that is unattended and muted during this time of quarantine.

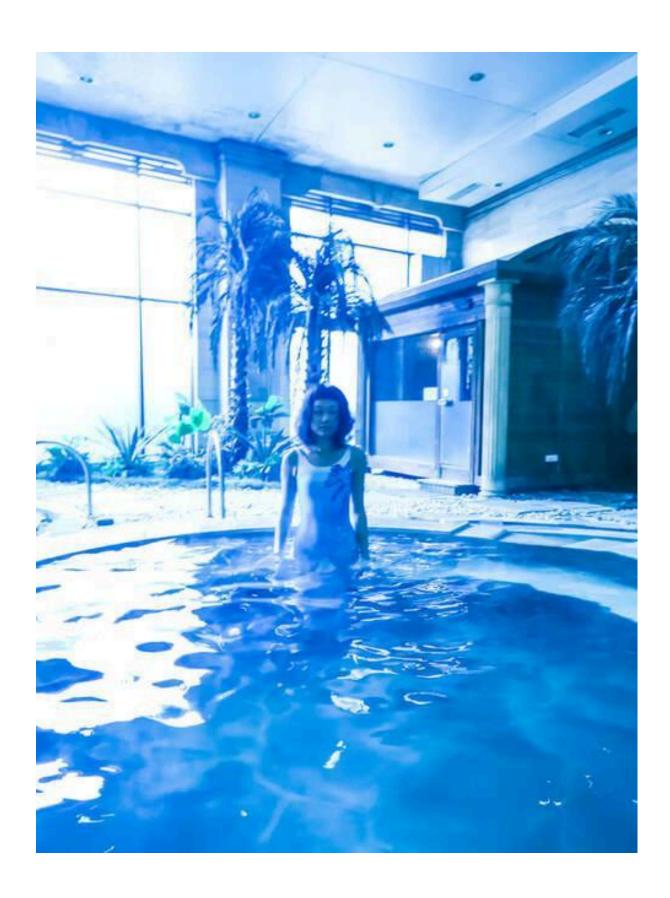

I have been kept developing the work since the lock-down, under the working title: 'Tropes of death, Ghost in the locker, I'm the voyeur shedding tears in the mirror', a fictional tale about a girl, named Rye Forth, who is a ghost whisper. She has a condition that brings other people's patience to exhaustion until a different level of attention emerges as a new "voice" that possesses her body to become a chamber for breath and confession. The girl's memory is constantly restored to revel the memories of others, while her body has retained its appearance, her memory produces something completely other than herself.

I'm working toward a film that voyeuristically shows the journey of how a girl renders the collective silences that she has encountered by becoming a vessel to accommodate others' voices. By the end of the film, the girl transforms into a surveillance device that is installed in the female changing room.

I'm thinking of ways to interact with audiences more than the over-saturated Instagram live and zoom performances. Currently, I'm researching ways to adapt the film to an interactive digital book. Ideally, readers (audiences) will enter a digital interface that interacts with their real-time location, time, weather and device's camera. All these real-time information will be weaved into the story. The outcome for this interactive experience will give each viewer a personal digital story as a copy. In the story, there will be linked to a site that they can see the real-time live streaming of the empty female changing room in Spring Health with muted sound. They could type in their words, memories and confession, which are then transferred into the real-time speaker projecting into the empty female changing room that is unattended and muted during this time of quarantine.

Would the eyes create limit that the mind craves? Is it possible to use trope of self-multiplicity as a creative source to create new encounters for an organism of new subjectivities? I would like to liberate the individuals from the unsettling voyeuristic feelings in the age of hyper-surveillance, by accommodating the silence "performing eyes" with the power of looking.

This project is a group role-playing game rooted in Quakers' meeting-like gatherings. Each participating artist will provide a body of "diary" consisting of their

"self-sedimental-documentation", such as writings, the texts they overheard in conversations, newspaper clipping, experimental films, ideas never been realized, and news that resonates, all of which are "heterotopic compound materials" - abundant layered mixture of information and materials recorded and collected over a month period before the gathering. During each gathering, materials of each participant will be forensically exhibited in the panopticon-like room. The rest of participants would come in the room, without any context of these materials, observe and manifest these materials through performance, sound and playful tactics. Meantime, the one who devises these materials will be lying inside of the 3d hologram in the middle of the room, their face projected in the air, with solely auditory senses to perceive others' manifestations of their "self-sedimental-documentation". Public audiences will be able to watch it from a live stream ty in the room nearby.

There'll be 6 gatherings with a group of 6 artists. Each gathering will last 2 hours. The outcome of this gatherings will be available online accompanied with the artists & audiences' feedbacks.

As different people manifest from the same experiences mediated by the media, I want to ask: Could eyes create limits for the mind? How do we liberate the individual narrative from the perpetuation of utopian neo-liberal ideals, especially when we suffer from the post-traumatic experience of loneliness triggered by self-isolation? This proposal emerges from my experience as a former Deptford resident and recent field research in the Quaker's Friend House meetings and working in market research offices - all theatrical sites accommodates collective silences and voyeuristic surveillance that allows others to spectate the act of looking while looking over the normalization of ignorance. In the context of Deptford X, I would like to explore the paradoxical encounters of both protection and exposure, interconnection and division, nature and culture staged in artistic collectivistic practices. As a former Deptford resident, I witnessed local residents' fighting for their living space, which make me question my contribution to the artistic gentrification. Situated in a home-cinema like environment, public audiences are able to not only survey the process of artistic practice, but also to be exposed to a cultural experience that is subjected by nature (the contemporary urban society).
