Ms. LANAUX introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on May 10, 2011.

A BILL

The purpose is restated here: To control illegal immigration into the United States across the southern border.

Be it enacted by the Senate and the House of Representatives in Congress assembled,

SECTION 1. AMERICAN LINES FOR INCREASING ENFORCEMENT NOW

SECTION 2: FINDINGS

Annual costs of illegal immigration are estimated to be \$113 billion from our nation's taxpayers

Twelve Americans are murdered every day by illegal aliens

Illegal immigrants who drive under the influence of drugs or alcohol kill thirteen people per day

Two out of every three "undocumented immigrants" in the United States receive their salaries in cash to evade paying taxes

Education for the children of illegal aliens represents the single largest public expenditure at an annual cost of \$52 billion; these costs are almost entirely absorbed by state and local governments

The average family pays \$1117 to support illegal immigrants

For every house of illegals the government pays \$2700

More than half of Mexican immigrant households use at least one major welfare program

 Around a third of illegal immigrants use more than one major welfare program

Arizona's annual cost of illegal immigration is \$2.5 billion

SECTION 4: TERMS AND BENEFITS

The Secretary of Homeland Security will deploy a base number of 5,000 National Guard troops to the United States-Mexico border.

Support Operation Streamline by holding a zero tolerance policy for immigrants caught crossing the border.

Replace borders where they are inadequate or deteriorating.

Reinforce borders in high-risk areas.

Add a double-layer fence, including electric fencing, to high-risk areas.

Increase the number of mobile and other surveillance systems along the United States-Mexico border.

Add helicopter pads along the border every seventy-five miles.

Provide funding for radio communications between Customs and Border Patrol and state, local, and other law enforcements.

Provide tax-cuts for members of the United States who volunteer with, or create their own border patrol vigilante groups.

Adopt dogs from the animal shelter of Phoenix and have them trained so that they may serve alongside our patrol men and women.
