Dr. Brian D. Earp is a Senior Research Fellow in the Uehiro Centre for Practical Ethics at the University of Oxford, Co-director of the Oxford Experimental Bioethics Lab, and Associate Director of the Yale-Hastings Program in Ethics and Health Policy at Yale University and The Hastings Center. Brian has more than 10 years of experience working in psychedelic ethics. With Professor Julian Savulescu, Brian wrote the first mainstream academic book geared toward a general audience on the philosophical, ethical, and social implications of psychedelic-assisted therapy for couples: [Love Drugs: The Chemical Future of Relationships](#) (2020, Stanford University Press). The book calls for a more relational approach to psychedelic ethics, focused on the improvement of personal, interpersonal, and societal well-being over an exclusively individualistic and potentially pathologizing medical model.

He is a co-developer of the [EMBARC approach](#) to psychedelic-assisted therapy. He has served as a clinical supervisor and fidelity rater for clinical trials of psychedelic-assisted therapy. He is a core faculty member of the EMBARK psychedelic facilitator training program, which has trained over 30 facilitators for clinical trials to date. He has been the lead author on five psychedelic-assisted therapy treatment manuals, one of which is currently in press at Oxford University Press.

He previously served on the ethics working group of the [American Psychedelic Practitioners Association](#). He is currently a board member of [New Yorkers for Mental Health Alternatives](#), a group that works toward the decriminalization of psychedelics. He has written and taught on the topic of relational harm prevention in psychedelic-assisted therapy and is committed to making psychedelic healing more responsive to systemic and collective dimensions of well-being. An essay of his entitled "The Revolution Will Not Be Psychologized: Psychedelics' Potential for

Systemic Change” was recently included in the edited volume *Psychedelic Justice: Toward a Diverse and Equitable Psychedelic Culture*.
